Large Crowd Attends FFA and 4-H Boys Fat Stock Show Saturday

Approximately 400 people were in attendance at the Junior Livestock Show held here Saturday, March 22, on the Athletic Field in the city park. The inclement weather no doubt prevented the attendance from being greater and prevented the entries from appearing at their best. There were 153 animals entered in the show including 42 calves, 67 hogs, 27 sheep, and 17 dairy cattle.

J. R. Bridges, Lubbock Future Farmer, owns the fat calf which was named grand champion at the show.

He is the owner of both the prize winning lightweight fat calf and the first place heavyweight calf, and the two were in competition with each other for the grand championship.

Wayne Hackney, also of Lubbock, exhibited the grand champion dairy animal, choice of which lay between his dairy heifer which won first and his first place dairy cow.

The grand champion fat barrow was shown by Merwin Igo, Future Farmer of Frenship, while Carlton Wilke of Wilson, exhibited the grand champion female hog.

CHICK CHATS
by Robert Huser of Huser's Hatchery
GOOD START IS VITAL TO CHICKS

Chicks are babies—treat them as such. This is important to keep in mind during the first few days and weeks of chick raising. Give your chicks all the essentials—space, warmth, water, feed, light, and clean quarters. Let's take these up, point by point.

If you have allowed sufficient space when you obtained your chicks (half a square foot per chick) this should continue to be enough until about six weeks pass. Then, if the weather permits, the pullets may be put on the range, while the cockerels, if any, may be kept in the brooder house for feeding-out.

Enough heat—but not too much—is a secret of successful brooding. You should have reliable brooder; which type depends on your preference. Keep a thermometer about two inches above litter at the hoverer's edge. Check the temperature often. Keep brooder house warm at the start—90 to 95 degrees—and gradually lower temperature each week.

WATER IS IMPORTANT
Often chicks are neglected by their owners in the amount of fresh clean water furnished them. There is no good reason for this neglect; water is cheap and it is vital to the chicks' development. Give them water from which the chill has been taken, and give it to them often during a day. Make sure that each chick is getting to the water founts. One hundred baby chicks will consume as much as one gallon of water daily, and as they grow, their consumption rises.

A complete ration is essential, of course. This will include carbohydrates (starch, sugar, fat), proteins, minerals, and vitamins. There are many good rations. Your experienced feed dealer is a competent adviser on this matter.

Don't forget the necessity of light in the brooder house. It encourages the chicks to eat, drink, and be active. It is a good idea to leave a small light burning at night. Of course, as soon as you can allow the chicks outdoors, they can derive the benefits of sun light, among which is the stimulation of Vitamin D.

The final essential of good living for chicks is clean quarters. Try at all times to maintain a sanitary brooder house. Keep litter dry and clean as possible; daily stirring helps it. Don't track germs into the house on your overshoes or rubbers—leave 'em outside. Clean and disinfect equipment regularly. Careful attention to sanitation will pay in greater freedom from disease among your chicks.

Irrigation And Rotation Pays

What El Paso farmers are doing with long-time planning in cotton production is something that County Agricultural Agent W. S. Foster believes will be of interest to all West Texas irrigation farmers.

According to figures released by the El Paso County office of the Production and Marketing Administration, farmers of the county averaged 1.93 bales of cotton to the acre in 1946. The 43,774 acres planted in the county produced 86,684 bales, or 965 pounds per acre.

Thirteen years ago, Foster recalls, the official five-year average yield for El Paso County was 404 pounds. The county agent says that this climbing production is due for the most part to the steadily increasing practice among the county's farmers of rotating alfalfa with cotton, applying commercial fertilizer and leveling land to make irrigation better and easier.

FARMERS LAZINESS PROVES PROFITABLE

A faulty foundation in a hog farrowing house in Kentucky has paved the way for swine breeders in saving the lives of little pigs.

It happened like this: Way up in Kentucky, a foundation in a swine breeder's house gave way, and let one side of the floor down. A few days later, a litter of pigs were born in the house, and the slanting floor proved a life saver for a lot of them. It cut down the danger of the young pigs being crushed by their mother.

E. M. Regenbrecht swine husbandman of the Texas A. and M. College Extension Service, says that the idea proved sound enough, and that a slope of an inch and a half to the foot on a farrowing house floor works well.

The idea takes advantage of two simple facts in the behavior of pigs. One—on a sloping floor, a sow prefers to lie with her back to the high side. Two—clumsy little pigs stagger a bit the first few days, and even on a slightly sloping floor tend to tumble to the low side. The life saving is as simple as that. When the mother pig is ready to lie down, she usually chooses the high side of the pen, and the little pigs are just as likely to be bunched up on the low

WESTERN MARKET NEWS
As Of March 22

Grain prices fell, carrots weakened, and uneasiness developed at some livestock markets last week. Other southwest farm products held steady to strong, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Grains opened the week with all their recent vigor last Monday but fell rapidly on succeeding days to net losses of 3 to 15 cents. Wheat and grain sorghums, spearheads of past advances, felt most heavily the weight of new bearish onslaughts. At Fort Worth and Galveston, bulk carlot sales of No. 1 hard ordinary wheat moved Friday at \$2.87 per bushel; and No. 2 milo at \$2.90 to \$2.93 per hundred pounds.

Early week strength at cotton we way to pressure of Yerings later on.

Closing spot quotations last Friday showed net losses of 25 to 50 cents per bale at some markets, to gains of 25 to 60 cents at others.

Egg and poultry prices continued firm. On the round of southwest markets, heavy hens brought 28 to 30 cents per pound; fryers and broilers 30 to 32. Eggs sold on the average of 36 cents per dozen at Topeka, Amarillo, and Wichita Falls; 37 at Denver, Austin, San Antonio, and Waco; 37½ to 38 at Ft. Worth and Dallas; 39 at Houston, 40 at Corpus Christi, Baton Rouge, Shreveport, and El Paso; and 41 at New Orleans.

Cattle sold at prices as high or higher than the week before at most southwest markets, but steers and yearlings closed lower at Oklahoma City, as did yearlings at Fort Worth. Beef cows sold up to \$17 at Oklahoma City; while medium to good kinds brought \$13 to \$15 at Fort Worth; and \$14.50 to \$16.75

NOTICE OF BOND ELECTION

THE STATE OF TEXAS COUNTY OF LUBBOCK CITY OF SLATON TO THE RESIDENT QUALIFIED VOTERS OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, who own taxable property within said city, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation: Take notice that an election will be held within and for the City of Slaton, Texas on the first day of April, 1947, the same being the first Tuesday in April, 1947, on the propositions and at the places more particularly set forth in the election ordinances adopted by the City Commission on the 10th day of March, 1947, which election ordinance is substantially as follows:

AN ORDINANCE BY THE CITY COMMISSION OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, DETERMINING THE NECESSITY FOR THE CONSTRUCTION, IMPROVEMENT AND EXTENSION OF THE WATERWORKS SYSTEM AND SEWER SYSTEM OF THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS, AND THE ADVISABILITY OF THE ISSUANCE OF BONDS FOR THE PURPOSE OF DEFAYING THE COST THEREOF; CALLING AN ELECTION FOR THE PURPOSE OF DETERMINING WHETHER OR NOT BONDS OF SAID CITY SHALL BE ISSUED IN THE AMOUNT OF \$40,000.00 FOR THE PURPOSE OF EXTENDING AND IMPROVING THE WATER SYSTEM OF SAID CITY, AND \$15,000.00 FOR THE PURPOSE OF EXTENDING AND IMPROVING THE SEWER SYSTEM OF SAID CITY; FIXING THE TIME AND PLACES FOR HOLDING SUCH ELECTION; APPOINTING THE JUDGES OF SAID ELECTION; PRESCRIBING THE FORM, TIME AND MANNER OF GIVING NOTICE OF SUCH ELECTION; PRESCRIBING THE MAXIMUM MATURITY AND INTEREST RATE OF SUCH BONDS AND THE METHOD OF HOLDING THE ELECTION; AND DECLARING AN EMERGENCY.

WHEREAS, The City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, in Lubbock County, Texas, has determined that it is to the best interest of said city and for the protection of the health and well being of the citizens thereof that certain improvements and extensions be made to the waterworks system and to the sewer system of said city, and that the negotiable interest bearing coupon bonds of said city should be issued for the purpose of paying the cost of such extension and improvements, and that an immediate necessity exists for the extension and improvement of such systems for the proper prevention of the health and safety of the citizens of Slaton, which requires the suspension of the rule requiring ordinances to be read more than at one meeting of the City Commission;

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDERED BY THE CITY OF SLATON, TEXAS:

That an election be held within and throughout the boundaries of the City of Slaton, Texas on the first day of April, the same being the first Tuesday in April, 1947, and said date being not less than fifteen, nor more than thirty days from the date of this ordinance, at which time there shall be submitted to the resident qualified property tax paying voters of Slaton, Texas, who own taxable property therein and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, for their determination thereof, the following propositions:

PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE Shall the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of Slaton, in the amount of \$40,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three percent per annum from their date, and maturing at such time or times and in such amounts as may be deemed most

expedient by the City Commission of Slaton, Texas, serially, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, extending and improving the Waterworks system of the City of Slaton, Texas; and shall ad valorem taxes be levied annually on all taxable property within the said city at a rate sufficient in amount to pay the annual interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO Shall the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas be authorized to issue the bonds of Slaton, Texas in the amount of \$15,000.00, bearing interest at a rate not exceeding three percent per annum from their date, and maturing at such time or times and in such amounts as may be deemed most expedient by the City Commission of Slaton, Texas, serially, not later than twenty years from their date, for the purpose of constructing, extending and improving the Sewer system of the City of Slaton, Texas; and shall ad valorem taxes be levied annually on all taxable property within the said city at a rate sufficient in amount to pay the annual interest on said bonds and to provide a sinking fund to pay the bonds at maturity?

II. Said election shall be held under the provisions of the charter of the City of Slaton, and Title 22, Chapters 1 and 7 of the 1925 Revised Civil Statutes of the State of Texas and all amendments thereto, and under the general election laws of the State of Texas, when not in conflict with the statutes and the charter aforementioned.

All persons who are legally qualified resident property tax paying voters of Slaton, Texas and who own taxable property therein, and who have duly rendered the same for taxation, shall be entitled to vote at said election; and the ballots for said election shall have written or printed thereon the following:

OFFICIAL BALLOT PROPOSITION NUMBER ONE "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE WATERWORKS EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF." "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE WATERWORKS EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

PROPOSITION NUMBER TWO "FOR THE ISSUANCE OF THE SEWER EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF." "AGAINST THE ISSUANCE OF THE SEWER EXTENSION AND IMPROVEMENT BONDS AND THE LEVYING OF THE TAX IN PAYMENT THEREOF."

As to each of the foregoing propositions, each voter shall mark out with black ink or pencil one of the above expressions, thus leaving the other as indicating his vote on the proposition.

III. The polling places and presiding officers of said election shall be respectively as follows:

In Ward No. 1, in the South West corner of the city hall building in Slaton, Texas, with L. A. Harra as presiding Judge; In Ward No 2, in the North West corner of the City hall building in Slaton, Texas, with J. H. Brewer as presiding Judge; In Ward No. 3, in the North East corner of the city hall building in Slaton, Texas, with Chas Whalen as presiding Judge; In Ward No. 4, in the South East corner of the city hall building in Slaton, Texas, with W. A. Robertson as presiding Judge.

IV. Each presiding Judge is authorized to appoint sufficient clerks to assist in holding said election; that notice of said election shall be given by posting a substantial copy of this ordinance in each of the election precincts of the City of Slaton, Texas, and at the city hall building, and such notice shall also be published on the same day in each of two successive weeks, in the Slatonite, a news-

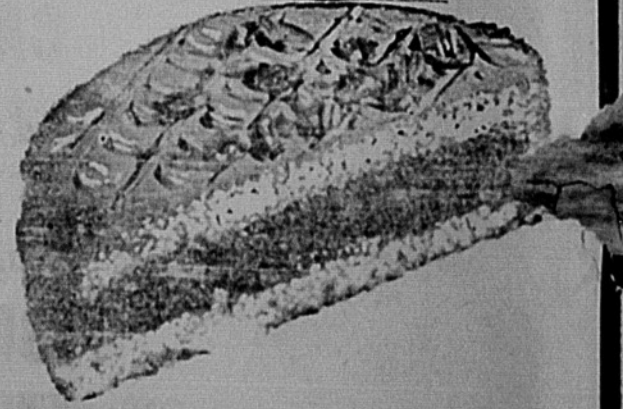

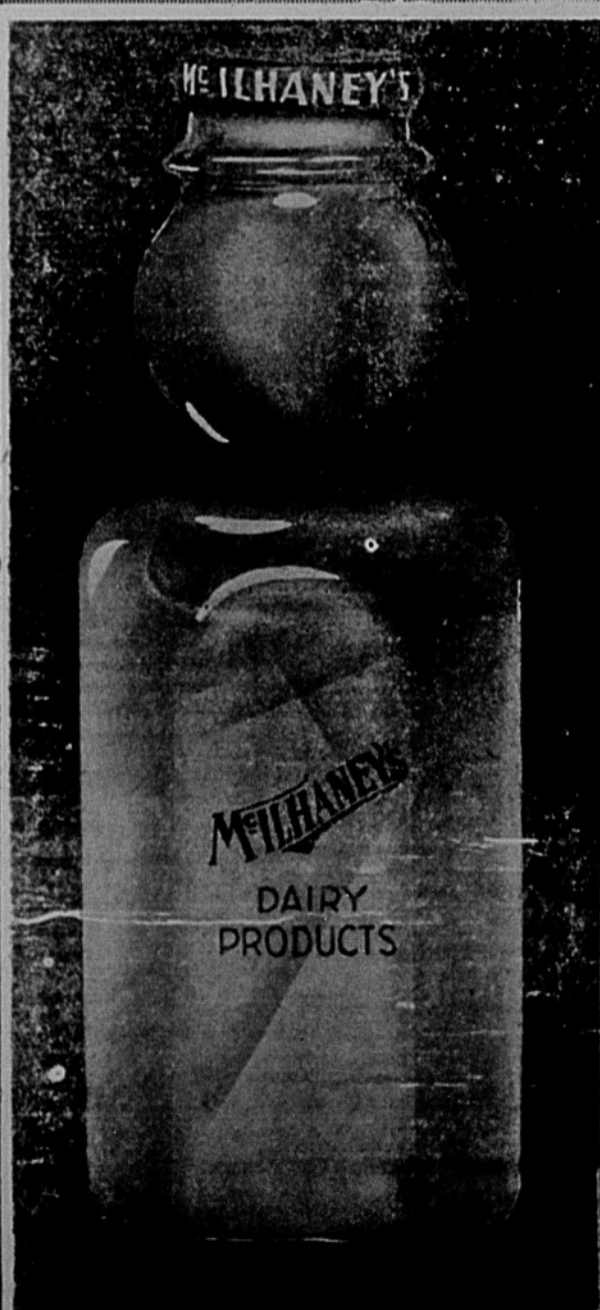

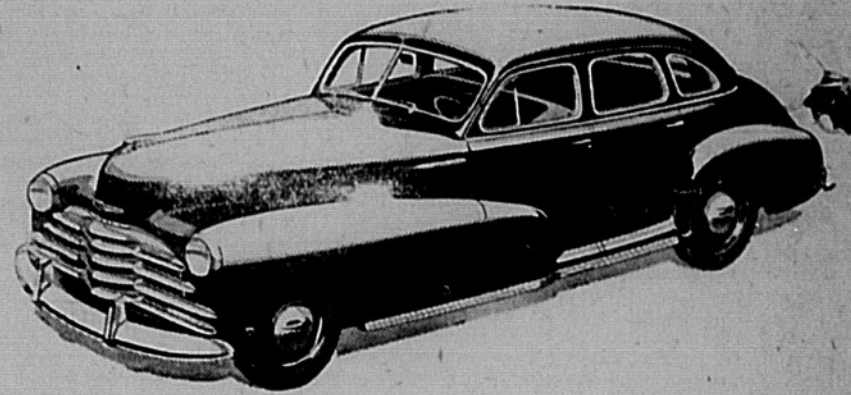

Jesus declares in Matt 10:32-33, "Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in heaven. But who ever shall deny me before men, him will I also deny before my Father which is in heaven." And in Romans 10:10 we read, "For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness: and with the mouth confession is made unto salvation." Thus we see the absolute need for the sake of our souls of confessing Christ with the mouth. Only, it is the truth upon which which reference is here made? So-called confessions are virtually as numerous as are creeds of men. But, dear reader, when we find the Bible confession that will eliminate all others: for faith comes by hearing the Word of God, Romans 10:17; and whatsoever is not of faith is sin, Romans 14:23. And he answered and said, I BELIEVE THAT JESUS CHRIST IS THE SON OF GOD." In Matt. 16:16 we find that Peter made the same confession. Whereupon Jesus said, "Blessed art thou, Simon Barjona." This, then, is the Bible confession. What is the significance of the confession that Jesus Christ is God's son? First of all, it acknowledges the divinity of Christ—His messiahship. In this we recognize the essence of all scriptures, the central truth of the Bible. The Old Testament looks forward to it: the New Testament looks back to it. Secondly, it is the truth upon which the Lord's church is founded, Matt. 16:16-18 and Acts 4:11. And thirdly, it sets forth the only name in which there is salvation, Acts 4:12. "God also hath highly exalted him, and given him a name which is above every name; that at the name of Jesus every knee should bow, of things in heaven, and things in earth, and things under the earth; and that every tongue should confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father," Phil. 2:9-11. Yes, every tongue should make this confession—and will, sooner or later! If not before, it will be done when "we shall all stand before the judgement seat of Christ. For it is written, As I live, saith the Lord, every knee shall bow to me, and every tongue shall confess to God," Romans 14:10-11. But too late, too late will be our cry when mercy's day has passed us by. If we wait till then, we will confess that our life has been lived inconsistent with the truth. We will have lived a lie! Consider the map below. Find the Church of Christ in your neighborhood. Follow the eunuch's example, Acts 8:36-39; make the Bible confession and be baptized into Christ.

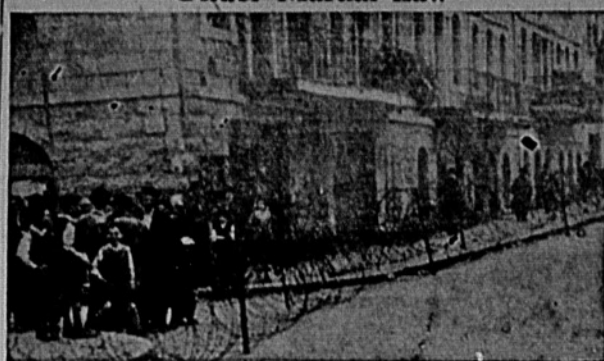
