CECAL COCCIDIOSIS THREAT IN SPRING

An extremely prevalent diof year is cecal coccidiosis an acute infection caused by microscopic, one-cell organisms coccidia. This disease attacks chicks and growing birds on what is practically a nation-wide scale. Occurence of cecal coccidiosis is most frequent in the spring and early summer.

This acute form of coccidiosis appears in the flock suddenly, Affected birds may lose appetite, appear listless, huddle where it is warm, and show other general symptoms of coccidiosis is bloody droppings; these come from hemorrhaging of the ceca (blind intestinal sacs), where the infection localizes.

Cecil coccidiosis may spread swiftly through the flock. In the event of an outbreak, the flockowner should act immediately to check the spread. This may be accomplished by giv-ing the flock certain arsenic compounds (such as 3-nitro 4-hydroxy phenylarsonic acid) or certain sulfas. Both of these families of drugs have proven effective in controlling cecal

Sanitation Important

Sanitary measures are highly important in controlling outbreaks of cecal coccidiosis as well as in preventing them. In either case, the poul-try house or yard should be kept as clean and dry as possible. Although the importance of moisture in the development of the disease is disputed by some poultry disease specialists, dampness does seem to be a predisposing factor in

Water founts and feed heppers should be kept clean and sanitary. During an outbreak, disinfect them at least once daily. Stir up the litter of the house. Stimulate consumption

Although cecal coccidiosis is certainly one of the leading deadly diseases of young chickens, it can be rather effectively controlled through careful sanitation and manage-

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

There will be a storm of protest over the provisions of the oill, and I shall join with others who are interested in agriculture in seeking to prevent unwarranted reductions in certain programs for

Funds for agricutural research have been slashed. This seems to me to be false economy at its worst. Research and development in weapons and airplanes played a major part in our military victory. Agricultural research should play a major part in promoting peace-time agricultural prosperity.

Funds for soil conservation districts have also been greatly reduced. This does not make sense to me. I think we need greater emphasis on soil conservation, and I shall support an amendment for the expansion of this activity. The bill drastically reduces the

funds for the AAA payment pro-gram. The President requested three hundred million dollars for three hundred million dollars for this purpose in 1947 and producers have proceeded with the 1947 crop on that basis. As I see it, Congress in fairness is bound to follow through on this program for the 1947 crop, and any changes pro-posed for the 1947 crop could not be made to apply before the 1948 crop year. However, the bill as now written slashes funds for the 1947 AAA program.

The bill provides for drastic, and to my way of thinking, unjustifiable cuts in the Farmers Home Administration program. I hope these funds can be restored.

Certain economics of administration are contained throughout the bill, and these savings, of course, should be made.



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
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
