

To Be Sent Through The Mails

rublic Warned About Matter

A special request from the Chief] Inspector of the Postal Department, J. J. Doran, in Washington. to Postmaster Scudder, of Slaton, asked that as much publicity as possible be given the regulations ncerning restrictions on the kind of materials that can be sent through the mails.

Here is a list of things that it is against the law to send through the mails: Intoxicating beverages Inflammable matter such as matches, lighter fluid, and other articles likely to cause fire through ab-sorption of moisture, or self-ig-nition through friction or spon aneous chemical changes. Amu-nition and other explosives. Firearms, such as revolvers, which are capable of being concealed on the person. Obscene matter: Poisons. Narcotics. Extortion letters. Lot-tery and fraculent matter.

Among other things regarding the federal laws on mail, it is a very serious offense to tamper or mutilate mail boxes of any kind whether they are on homes or are the property of the Government.

On a few occasions the mail boxes have been moved, marked on or mutilated here by mischevious boys on Hallowe'en. This is a very serious offense and those committing such could get into considerable trouble.

Hodening Horse Of **British Isles**

Strange miracle plays were al-ways intrinsic parts of the holiday season in the British Isles and in season in the British Isles and in many such traditional perform-ances, one of the characters rode a grotesque hobby horse. Gradually, the horse assumed the character-istics of a star performer and in time, stepping out of the play alto-gether, began going from house te house-expecting hospitality, after frightening families half out of their wits.

Of course, the Hodening Horse was no ordinary horse: two boys covered with sheets and obree blanket usually supplied his vital-ity; his wooden hid was hideous-ly carved with gouged eyes, hob-nall teeth, atc. In Wales, it was customary for

Huser's Hatchery HOW TO IMPROVE WINTER PROFITS

A few simple changes or the addition of some up-to-date equipment can mean considerable in winter egg production from the flock.

Nests, roosts, feeders, waterers, ventilation, insulation, litter, flooring, drainage and other factors should be studied in the light of proven methods of poultry housing.

Labor Saving Roosts The so-called pit system of roost construction is becoming very popular with poultrymen. The term "pit system" is somewhat misleading as there is no pit construction; it simply means that the roosts are placed about two feet above the floor and no dropping board is used. A mesh wire known as stucco wire, having two inch meshes and constructed of 12 gauge galvanized steel wire is placed on the under side of the roost, and around the sides o prevent the birds from coming in contact with the droppings.

The front side of this construction can consist of a 10 or 12 inch board resting on the floor and then 8 to 12 inches of mesh wire above it, depending on the height of the roosts. construction should be hinged to the north wall in such a
