These individuals agree on many of the basic facts concerning the observance of the holiday season As regards the Christmas tree, it seems that it was the exception rather than the rule for a family to have a tree in the home. The community had a big tree at the church,- or where there was no church, in the school house. In some cases a vacant building was used for the community tree.

The Christmas tree was decorated with popped corn and cran berries strung on thread and fes-tooned from the limbs. Candles dinner cost 35 cents. were used for lighting, as there was no electricity. There were prac tically no "bought" tree ornaments Two or three individuals stood guard to prevent a fire from getting started from the candles, which always constituted a fire hazard.

The people of the community pooled their resources as to decorations and gifts to be used on the tree. All of the people present received as a gift a bag of fruit, candy, and nuts; the children received their toys which the parents brought to be put on the tree for distribution by Santa Claus.

Usually the most enjoyable part of the community Christmas tree was the program of recitations and songs by the young children of the group. One dignified Slaton matron says one of her happiest remembrances of childhood Christ mases is reciting her piece at the Christmas tree with her doll in her arms.

Christmas was much less commercialized then than now, but it is the concensus of opinion that the Spirit of Christmas was much very pretty. She says that red and more predominant. It was not the custom to exchange gifts with persons outside of the family, and these gifts were usually ones thoughtfully and lovingly made or selected, and its monetary value did not enter into consideration. The holiday period was spent in visiting in each other's homes, where each family in turn served their Christmas dinner with other neighbors as guests. The guests came for dinner and frequently stayed for a party at night with a midnight supper being served after an evening of music, singing, and in some cases dancing.

WESTERN MARKET NEWS, heavy domestic and export demand Bran and shorts dropped about \$2 per ton and oilseed meals de clined last week as the usual pre inventory hand-to-mouth buying resulted in limited demand.

> Limited egg supplies found fair to good demand during the pre holiday week, but prices were somewhat easy. Current receipts sold at 37 cents per dozen at Denver and around 40 to 45 at other places. Turkeys were a little lower than a week earlier as late sea son purchases moved mostly in local markets. Young turkey hens were quoted mostly at 35 cents per pound and young lightweight toms at 22 to 35. Chicken hens were a cent or two above a week ago, ranging from 25 to 27 cents per pound about steady.

Largest run of hogs in many months arrived at southwest markets last week. Prices dropped \$2 per hundred last week and white to \$3 per hundred. Top butchers Roscoe. were quoted at \$20 per hundred at 50 at Oklahoma City; \$20.60 at Wichita and \$21.25 at Denver.

Cattle prices were strong at Texas markets but steady to lower at other southwest terminals last week. Houston sold good yearlings to \$13.50 and good cows at \$13.70 to \$15 per hundred. San Antonio moved good cows at \$15 and medium to low good grass and shortfed steers at \$16 to \$21. Fort Worth quoted medium and good slaughter steers and heifers at \$17 to \$23,50 and medium and good cows at \$12 to \$15. Medium to good shortfed steers and yearlings realized \$17.25 to \$19.50 at Oklahoma City. Wichita sold good light steers at \$23. Denver quoted most medium to good steers at
