There is some evidence of a slight increase in number of cases during the last four years, but the increase may only result from added facilities for diagnosis indicates that this area has a few and not from actual increase in the number of persons suffering from

An interview with the County Health nurse, Mrs. Roy Sanford of Lubbock, brings out some perangles of this problem. Concerning the increase her records show that in 1943 there were nine deaths in the county; in 1944, 16; in 1945. 17 of which three were in the vi-cinity of Slaton; and in 1946, 19, of which 5 were in the Slaton area. Since July 1, 1946, the County Health nurse has exrayed 7, persons from the Slaton area, and 16, from the vicinity of Lubbock.

Another fact to keep in mind, and one which answers some questions raised recently in Slaton, is that the Tubercular Association is solely diagnostic and has no funds to provide for the treatment of such cases that are discovered. for admission to the State Sanitorium, but the public must keep in mind that the capacity of this hospital is 1,000. In 1946, 33 patients from Lubbock County were admitted to the state hospital for the treatment of tuberculosis.

The State Tubercular Associa tion raises funds through the sale of Christmas Seals only, and the Lubbock County office sent out 14,000 letters with two sheets of seals each. Only 3,300 replied with enclosed money totalling \$7,500.

The nurse woud especially like to emphasize that persons should notify their physician if a case of tuberculosis is suspected; or you may write the nurse Mrs. Roy Sanford, Box 1504, Lubbock, call her at 7612, Lubbock, and she will be glad to use available means at her disposal for diagnosis.

WESTERN MARKET NEWS AS OF FEB. 8TH

Many southwest farm products found stronger markets last week according to the Production & Marketing Administration, USDA. Eggs showed seasonal weakness, however, and some protein feeds

Wheat gained sharply again last week while oats and sorghums took up the upward trail. Cash wheat at Fort Worth and Galveston was quoted \$2.32 to \$2.33 per bushel for No. 1 hard. No. 2 yellow milo brought \$2.52 to \$2.55 per hundred. Corn was little changed, but barley was easier. Rice markets continued firm. Most feed prices held fully steady, but further sharp declines were reported for soybean meal, while gluten feed and meal were also lower. Hay quotations remained unchanged from declines of the previous week.

Hog prices advanced 25 cents to \$1.25 per hundred around the mar-ket circle last week. Friday's quotations for top butchers stood at 23 at San Antonio; \$23 to \$24 at Fort Worth; \$25.25 to \$25.50 at Oklahoma City; \$25 to \$25.25 at Wichita; and \$25 to \$26.25 at Den-

Cattle trading picked up at southwest markets last week and prices climbed higher with advances of \$1 to \$2 per hundred above prices a week ago. Commo and medium steers and yearlings realized \$12 to \$17 at Houston while medium and good beef steers and yearlings brought \$16 to \$22 at Ft. Worth. San Antonio moved common steers at \$14 to \$15.50 and medium to low good cows at \$11 to \$13. Medium and good shortfed steers and yearlings ranged from \$17.50 to \$22 at Oklahoma City and from \$18 to \$22 at Wichita. Medium to high good steers turned at \$18 to \$23.75 at Denver Live poultry prices held fairly firm, but eggs brought lower prices than a week ago. Current

arge is made therefor; and, WHEREAS, a number of persons in Lubbock County, who re not licensed attorneys, are now illegally engaged in the pre-gration for others of legal instruments, and the giving of

nions on titles to real estate; and, WHEREAS, property rights and contractual obligations are ning constantly jeopardized by such illegal acts, and it is a atter of vital public concern that the same be discontinued;

WHEREAS, the members of the Lubbock County Bar Assodation are desirous of protecting the public by curbing these afractions by persons not authorized to practice law:

NOW, THEREFORE, be it resolved by the Lubbock County Bar

ociation that these acts of unlawful practice of the law be alled to the attention of the public and those persons who prepare legal instruments for others, and give opinions on titles or real estate so that they may be advised that such acts are inlawful, and prohibited by the laws of the State of Texas unless one by a licensed attorney.


