The Navy Department today an-nounced successful flight tests of newest and most powerful fighter, the 600 mile per hour BANSHEE. It was designed and built by the McDonnell Aircraft Corporation, St. Louis, Missouri, under contract with the Bureau of Aeronautics.







by Robert Huser of Huser's Hatchery LABOR-SAVING IN

POULTRY RAISING

To the average poultry raiser, one of the most important con-siderations should be the amount of time and labor expended on flock care, Since most U.S. poultry raisers are also engaged in other kinds of operations (agriculture, livestock feeding, dairy farming, etc.) they must be careful to give only the proper share of their time to flock manage-

Here are a few general laborsaving tips to part-time poultry raisers:

1.Good poultry housing and good furnishings (equipment) are necessary to efficient management. A well-planned house that provides plenty of space for the birds is essential. Litter should be kept clean and dry as possible. Feeders and waterers should be present in sufficient number and should be carefully arranged, both for the bird's sake and for yours. There should also be plenty of roosting and nesting space.

### Mix New and Old Mash

2. In your feeding methods, fill the hoppers about two-thirds of the way with clean mash Push the old mash to one end, add the new, and stir well, so that the birds will eat both old and new. Some poultrymen prefer to line up the hoppers, end to end, so that they save time and labor in feeding. However, there is much to be said for placing feeders at right angles to windows, so that light will fall on feed. Feeding a little hard or scratch grain in the litter each day helps keep the flock active and helps keep the litter

3. Be sure to keep layers supterial. This practice helps avoid soiled eggs, and this, in itself, represents a considerable saving time and effort. Cleaning dirty eggs takes a great deal of time. A deep layer of nesting material also is helpful, as it

prevents broken eggs.
4. Finally, keep simple feed consumption and egg producforesee slumps in production and also help you locate pens that aren't up to snuff in their





### HELPS ON HANDLING PUPPY IN NEW HOME

Paper Breaking" During Winter Weather Urged by Dog Research Center

Every year tens of thousands of people, especially children, receive supplies as gifts. The following uggestions by the Gaines Dog lesearch Center, New York City, re intended to simplify and fallitate the establishment of a supply in his new family circle.

Briore planning a dog or puppy is a gift, the donor should assure imself that it is wanted; that it ill have a good home; that it will ceive proper care; that there is meone in the household willing take full responsibility for the minmal's welfare.

The giver should also consider the type of dog most suitable for he recipient. For a lively child, a sumptious, frisky dog is indicated, whereas a little girl might prefer small, quiet dog. The environment in which the prospective pet is to live should also be considered. For city apartments small in medium-sized dogs are best, but in a country home a large dog would not only have room for excipience that would also furnish welcome protection.

When a puppy is purchased from the breeder or original owner it is



wise to ask for instructions whichell in detail how often the puppy should be fed, what type of food as is accustomed to getting, and irrections for preparing any formula he should have. Another iseful thing which should come should the should have. Another iseful thing which should come should with the puppy is an instructive book on the general care of dogs. This will be especially appreciated by the prospective owner who has had no previous experience with a dog.

A check-up should also be made with the breeder or raiser on whether the puppy has been wormed or not and if any further irreatment will be necessary. If worming is in order, it is a job for the veterinarian. Medicine which is drastic enough to eliminate worms is of necessity a potent drug which may prove harmful to he puppy when administered by an inexperienced dog owner.

It is well for the recipient to remember that a young puppy is really a baby, often a timid baby. Children should not be allowed to handle the puppy or play with it until they have learned how easily its small body can be injured. The puppy should have plenty of rest and sleep. Loud noises around the pup should be avoided, and feeding of delicacies should be forbidden.

The puppy should have a warm, dry box of his own to sleep in, out of drafts, with an old blanket or shredded newspapers in it for bedding

Housebreaking during winter weather is a risky business, for sudden changes of temperature frequently cause illness. Rather than put the puppy outdoors in the snow or rain, a good procedure is to spread a double thickness of newspapers in some outself-the-way corner of the house and teach the puppy to go to "do his duty" there. Few puppies can be completely housebroken much before six months of age, and "paper breaking" eliminates the danters of exposure to cold. As a natter of fact, this method is considerably less trouble than taking a puppy outdoors every two or three hours, as the only labor involved is that of picking up the soiled papers and putting down fresh ones.

Young dogs should not be bathed or allowed to become wet before they are one year of age. A brushing every few days with an ordinary hair brush will keep the puppy clean. A thorough combing before the brushing will keep long-haired dogs' coats in good condition. A weekly sprinkling with 5% DDT powder will effectively eliminate fleas, should they appear.

If the puppy cries the first few nights in his new home, it is because he misses his litter brothers and sisters. Often a loud-ticking alarm clock placed near him will console him for his solitude and spare his new owners and neighbors an unwelcome midnight serenade.






