TO FIND TROUBLE OPEN DEAD BIRDS

in your flock, do you immediately disposing of them by tossing them in the manure pile or throwing them to the hogs?

To be sure, dead birds should be gotten rid of quickly. But, first, why not take a few minutes to try to determine what has caused their death You may save yourself later trouble and expen

Look For Clues

Open a few of the dead birds and look over their internal organs for clues to the trouble. It's hard to tell what's troubling a chicken merely by observing the external symptoms of disease. But there are a few conditions most poultrymen can recognize by posting a bird, observing the internal lesions, and then consulting disease bulletins or pamphlets which are published by colleges, manufacturers of feeds and poultry medicines, and others. This literature will tell what you need to know to iden tify worms or tuberculosis, for example. Both are easily recog-

T. B. in Swine

There have been cases in which birds of tuberculosis have been fed to hogs. Swine, of course, are susceptible to the avian form of tuberculosis, and such an error has costly consequences. Therefore, if you're able to tell when a dead bird has the lesions of tuberculosis, you can avoid making this mistake

The literature also will tell you how to find worm para-sites by opening the intestine of the dead fowl.

There are some other conditions which can be recognized without too much difficulty by consulting published material on poultry diseases. Read this material to determine how to treat a disease from your own observations, what you read will tell you how you should proceed to prevent the trouble from oc curring again.

In all cases in which there is any doubt, consult a poultry specialist.

DDT and Sulphur Help To Alfalfa DDT and sulphur mixture can

mean dollars saved to West Texas alfalfa growers this year, judging from the experience of Hale Coun-

Hale County Agricultural Agen M. M. Ayers reports that the DDT and sulphur mixture now has the nod of approval from severa farmers who had a severe infes-tation of pea aphids on alfalfa re-cently. Before the aphid poisoning could get underway, however, the insects had slowed down alfalfa growth to the extent that some farmers lost their entire first planting

A local insecticide dealer coopd with the county agent and few farmers in running som field trials in an effort to find the best poison to use against the aphids on alfalfa. Their best results

were obtained with ten percent DDT and sulphur, applied at the rate of 20 to 30 pounds per acre. Most of the poison trials were done by airplane.

The farmers who have used the treatment are well satisfied that it will pay dividends, says County Agent Ayers.


