Select Laying Birds Carefully

There is no place in the laying house for an unprofitable egg producer. Such birds will only consume valuable feed and take up rooms needed by their more prolific sisters — without pay-ing for their keep.

When the time comes to select the pullets which will comprise your laying stock, remember that every poor tayer you choose will lower the efficiency of the flock as a whole.

Pick Good Producers

The type of bird to select is one which will come into pro-duction early, will maintain a good laying record throughout the winter, and will continue to lay well into the summer. There is no assurance that every pul-let you select will equal this standard. However, there are certain markings and body characteristics which are usu-ally reliable indicators of a bird's capacity for laying. Likewise, the poor laying types have certain characteristics which certain characteristics which brand them as unprofitable producers.

Small, underdeveloped, and slow-maturing birds should be removed from the flock, fed for marketing, and sold.

The birds you will want to keep are those with well-developed heads, long broad backs, long keel bones, and fleshy

Cull 'Loafers'

After pullets have been housed and the flock has reached about 25 per cent production, be-gin culling the poor layers. Here are some of the tell-tale markings to look for: Pigmentation—Nonlayers of yellow-skinned breeds have yel-

low pigment in the beak, shanks, vent, eye ring and sometimes the ear lobes. These parts are bleached or faded if the bird's are producers.

Comb Changes—The loafing bird's comb and wattles are shrunken and scaly. In contrast, the good layer has wary, red, and full comb and wattles.

Characteristics-Poor Body Characteristics—Foor layer's pubic bones are quite close together. The good pro-ducer's pubic bones are two to three fingers apart. The good layer has a large body capacity, which is indicated by a long broad back and deep body cav-

General Pointers - Hens in high production are active, full of pep, and yet easy to handle They are strong feeders, and their bodies made minimum use of all feed consumed to produce the maximum number of eggs. The poor layer is relativeby inactive and not so alert and busy. Her eyes are dull and sunken, her feathers are loose, and her skin is coarse and dry, underlaid with fat.



Older Folks Should Drink Milk Ioo

College Station, Aug. 29—A pint of milk a day is a must if older people are to keep healthy and active, say food specialists of Texas A. & M. College Extension Service. Men and women in their fifties, sixties, and seventies often overlock milk in their diets, a neglect that deprives bones of necessary minerals.

To help furnish enough calcium protein and phosphorus for the proper upkeep of their bodies, a daily pint of milk is the minimum say the specialists. A condition of demineralization of the skeleton may come from too little cicium in the diet and often leads to broken bones in later years. Some investigators have suggested that many a fall, which supposedly results in a bone break, is actually due to weakened bones which break and cause the person to fall.

Relatively little is known of
the nutritional needs of the older age group, the specialists report, and state experiment stations are making studies aimed at
correct dietary recommendations.
Recent studies do show that older people have not loot their ability to store calcium and other
minerals and that their diets
should include milk.




