
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

Texas Raising Fewer Turkeys

College Station, Sept. 10-U.S farmers now have 34 million turk-eys on the farm, and although that sounds like a lot of meat. it's 16 percent less han last year's

About 3,681,000 of those birds are in Texas, which is being ranked out of another first place by Calfornia, where almost 4 million turkeys are being raised.

All but three statse in the un All but three statse in the un-ion show decreases in turkeys raised compared with a year ago, according to USDA's Bureau of Agricultural Economics. The de-crease, says the bureau, is due to unfavorable price relationships, unusually large storage stocks to-ward the end of last season, high feed costs and the uncertainty of feed costs and the uncertainty of 1947 turkey prices.

Texas turkey raisers have 13 percent less birds than in 1946, when at the time of the year there were better than 4,231,000 turkeys in the state.

The Farmers Home Administration will bea ble to make approxi-mately 130,000 farm operating and ownership loans during the cur-rent fisical year to family-type farmers who are unable to obtain credit from any other source.

An improved method of killing potato vines to make crop harvest ing easier has been developed by industry. The process involves the use of a powerful chemical 'frost and another compound that great ly speeds up killing action.

Mature on Vine
One way to save tomatoes from
frost is to pull up the whole vine
with the tomatoes still attached, and
hang it in a dry, moderately light
place, such as the garage, suggests
the department of agriculture.
The mature green fruits will gradually redden on the vine, and tomatoes will keep fairly well this way
for weeks.


