WORMS CURTAIL
YIELD, GROWTH

Worms are a hindrance to poul-try raisers because they often are resopnsible for reduced egg yields as well as for prolonging the time required for chickens to reach marketable size. While the effect of worms on poultry i s not often easy to detect, the harm done over an extended per-iod may be of considerable im-portance.

Of the many types of worms known to be puoltry parasites there are but few which are nu merically important enough to cause serious trouble. But these few species are found almost everywhere poulty is raised.

The Large Roundworm

One of the commonest is the large roundworm. This is the worm with which most poultrymen are familiar. It is large—1 1-2 to 4 inches in length—and causes heavy damage when great numbers of them infect a flock. They are prolific breeders, female worms passing several thousand eggs daily. Under favorable conditions a small worm develops in an egg in about two weeks, and when such an egg is eaten by a chicken an adult worm develops after another five to seven weeks. This worm then hatches more eggs which the chicken passes back to the soil through the droppings. Large roundworms, in their development in chickens, cause considerable damage to the intestinal wall. This damage frequently cuases birds to become emaciated and stunts their growth. If the infection is severe enough, the bird will die.

The cecal or-pinworm is a timyworm between one-fourth and one half inch in length. It lives in the tips or blind ends of the ceca of chickens and turkeys. MARKET NEWS

(USDA)—Southwest farm markets paid mostly firm to higher prices for livestock, grains, and many other products last week, according to the Production and Marketing Administration, U. S. Department of Agriculture.

Hogs scored gains of mainly 50 cents to \$1. San Antonio and Fort Worth established new all time high prices of \$28.25 and \$29.50 respectively. Week's top at Oklahoma City was \$29.75, Wichita \$29.60 and Denver \$30.50.

Cattle closed the week generally strong to 50 cents higher, although Houston and San Antonio netted losses on steers and yearlings. Houston paid a top of \$22 for medium and good caked grass steers. San Antonio bought low to average medium steers at \$20. For: Worth took good fed steers and yearlings at \$23 to \$27,50 Oklahoma City paid \$27 to \$29 for good and choice steers, and Wichita gave \$20 to \$25 for medium light steers and yearlings. Denver set a new all time high of \$33 for choice steers, while other medium to choice kinds brought \$25 to \$31.

Eggs and poultry sold firm to a little higher in the southwest last week. Seasonally best white graded eggs brought around 55 58 cents per dozen at most places, and mixed colors 50 to 56. Most markets paid 37 to 40 cents per pound for good quality full sized fryers, 24 to 28 for heavy hens, and 10 to 15 for prosters.

Continued good domestic and export demand kept grain markets strong most of the week. The wheat and corn netted gains of 5 to 15 cents, while oats, barley and sorghum grains advanced about 5 cents. No. 1 Hard ordinary wheat closed Friday at \$2.95 per bushle at Texas ponits; while No. 2 white corn brought \$2.55 to \$2.60.

Slight ups and downs during the week left cotton \$1.25 to \$2.50 lower Friday, Growers in all sections called for more pickers as harvesting conditions were ideal.
