Telephone takes Slaton are going up, according to a rate increase granted the Southwestern Bell Telephone company by the City Commission in their meeting on Monday night.

The increase will become effective 30 days after the second reading of the ordinance in the city commission meeting. Rates will increase 25 cents for two-party lines and \$1.50 for business telephones.

SLATON SPEAKS

(Editor's Note: The following column is the first in a series of questions, all concerning local citizens, that will be asked various residents, with their answers printed, seeking a cross-section of opinion on various subjects vital to the city.

The question asked this week and its explanation was: The city of Slaton is considering the purchase of a DDT spraying unit, similar to the one rented recently from a Lubbock firm. Cost of the sprayer alone was approximately 5102.00, not including the spray used. Spraying is needed approximately five times during the warm months to keep insects at a bare minimum. With a fog-type spray that will cover a wide territory costing about 51700, or a mist-type spray that covers alleys and very little else, costing \$1,245, do you feel it would be a worthwhile investment for Slaton?

The Answers

B. N. Ball — "Buy one. If the higher priced one is a better spray, then buy it. The spray would pay for itself in four years, at the most, and if we don't buy one the city will not be sprayed often enough to be of benefit. However, I think that one of the main problems in keeping the city clean and free from polio gefms, would be a worter regular pickup of garbage barrels by the residents themselves."







