TRAVEL CUES... SPAIN

There's a lovely little island called Majorca lying between Spain and 'Italy on the blue of the Mediterranean. It has suddenly become another contender for the patronage of American tourists because of two frecent events — the devaluation of the peace to the Spanish government and the opening by Fan American World Airways of the first direct air service between the United States and Spain. Clippers make the flight to Barcelona via the Azores and Lisbon in 194 hours. Majorca is one hour away from Barcelona by plane, overnight by boat.


Thirty-five miles long and equally wide, Majorca is threaded with mountains in the northwest and bounded from the sea by a wall of rock. The southeast is gently rolling with pastures and plains and white beaches fringed with huge umbrella pines.

Despite the pastoral quiet of the island, there is much there to occupy the tourist. Mountain climbers will find enough elevation for their sport, and there are tennis courts at some of the hotels and plenty of beaches for the swimmers. The capital has several theaters and one of the most magnificent bull rings in all of Spain.

Hotel costs run from \$5\$ to \$9\$ per day, including meals. Other prices on Majorca are always lower than those in Spain and now that the tourist dollar buys even more pesetas, shopping has become doubly attractive to the visitors.





Time To Buy Seed Says Tech Expert

LUBBOCK, March 7 — Now is the best time for farmers to buy or engage seed for planting next year's crops, Dr. A. W. Young, head of the plant industry department at Texas Technological college, advises.

By making arrangements now for next year's crops, farmers can be assured of a bigger selection and a chance at the best seed available, Dr. Young said.

Seed selection should be based

on high quality, high germination rate and free from undesirable weed seed. There is time yet to be "choosey," he suggested.
Those farmers planning to sow their own seed should have germination tests made immediately so if their seed is not the most desirable, they will have time to make other arrangements.
Germination tests are made at the State Seed laboratory in Austin, and at many of the grain exchanges in larger towns, Dr. Young said.
Another precaution concerning

Another precaution concerning early seed purchase mentioned by Dr. Young is "buy enough to re-plant in case reseeding should be-come necessary."


