Legion Seeking Amendments To War Veterans Act

WASHINGTON, Jan. 8 (AP)—Amid echoing demands for cash payment on adjusted certificates, Chairman Johnson of the house veterans committee today prepared to introduce a bill proposing the greatest liberalization asked by the American Legion since existing provisions were enacted seven years ago.

The bill drafted by the legion would amend the world war veterans act in 34 separate ways. It would increase pension rates, provide hospitalization for all veterans regardless of service connection of their illness, extend present temporary dependency allowances to dependents of permanently disabled, and supply additional widows and orphans pensions.

Advocates of certificate payments renewed their demands for a hearing on a number of such proposals, but Chairman Hawley of the ways and means committee stood firmly against taking them up.

Representative Garner of Texas, the democratic leader, introduced a bill to provide cash payment of the surrendered value of the certificates, at the option of the veteran. Representative Fish, republican, New York, said he had reason to believe the national commander of the Legion was gauging sentiment on the New Yorker's request that the executive committee be called together to take a stand on the question.

"If he does not respond within a few days," Fish added, "I will have something to say."

The New Yorker is sponsoring cash payment of 25 per cent of the final face value of the certificates,

whether or not the veterans have borrowed from the government on them. Representative Patman, democrat, Texas, said about 100 members had signed his petition to force action on his bill for payment in full.

Representative Ludlow, democrat, Indiana, also introduced a bill today to authorize the director of the veterans bureau to pay the veterans an amount equal to the value of his certificate increased by 25 per cent, plus four per cent interest.

World war disability pension rates, now ranging from \$12 to \$40 monthly, would be made to conform with Spanish American war disability allowances which range from \$10 to \$60 a month.

The bill would extend to world war widows and orphans the same pensions now allowed Spanish American war dependents—\$30 monthly for widows and \$8 for children.

Moody Says Bus Regulation Very Important Matter

DALLAS, Texas, Jan. 8 (AP)—Governor Dan Moody, who, in two weeks, will step from public life after six years as attorney general and chief executive of Texas, said here yesterday, he considered regulation of motor trucks and buses one of the most important problems the 42nd legislature which meets Tuesday will have to deal with.

Governor Moody said he was here on "personal business," and while he declined to state his plans after he leaves the governor's office January 20, reports persisted he would engage in the practice of law in Dallas.

"I am going to practice law," he said, "but prefer to wait a few days before saying just where and with whom. I will say, I would be proud to be a citizen of Dallas, and I am sure it is a delightful place to live."

Brotherhoods Confer With Jimmie Allred

AUSTIN, Jan. 8 (AP)—Representatives of railroad brotherhoods conferred with Attorney General James V. Allred regarding an appeal of the test case on the full crew law.

The state lost its case in district court when District Judge George Calhoun ruled erroneous an opinion of the attorney general that the full crew law was not applicable to motor and electrically propelled trains.

The law provides for a minimum of four men—engineer, fireman, conductor and brakeman—on all trains.

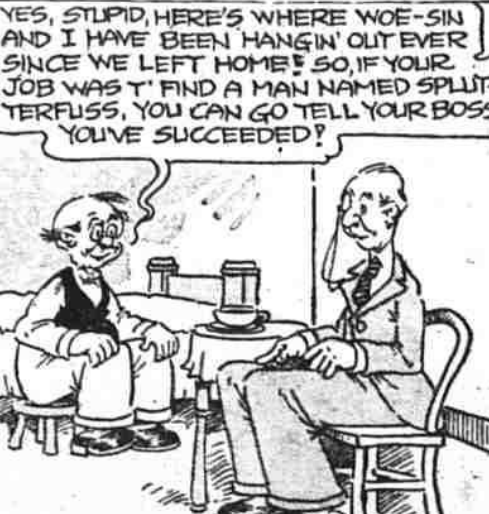

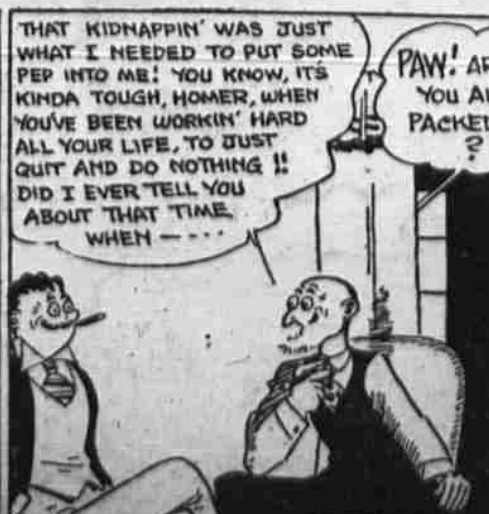

NEW YORK, Jan. 8 (AP)—Bobby Jones is to have just 13 3/4 minutes on the air in his first broadcast.

A preview of the continuity for the opening night of the 26 week series to start January 14 shows that, except for exactly 188 words most of the 15-minute period is to be all Bobby's.

Those 188 words are to come from the mouth of Bill Munday, who is to be announcer for the Jones broadcasts. It will be Munday's first experience on the NBC network in a role other than that of a sport's expert.

A minute will be used at the start of the program for the introduction, with a quarter of a minute at the end for the closing announcement.

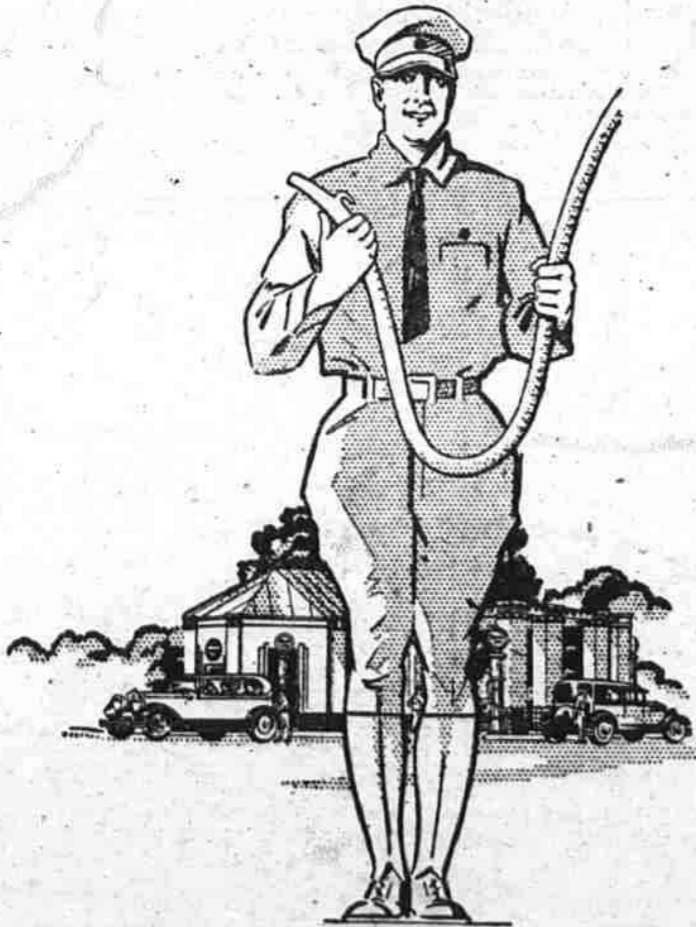
