

NOTICE
BY CITY OF SLATON TO OWNERS OF PROPERTY ABUTTING CERTAIN STREETS OF INTENTION OF CITY TO PAVE AND IMPROVE SAID STREETS AND TO LEVY ASSESSMENT AGAINST SAID PROPERTY AND THE OWNERS THEREOF IN PART PAYMENT THEREFOR AT EARLIEST HEARING: AND TIME OF HEARING.

Whereas, on the 30th day of July, A. D. 1949, the City of Slaton by resolution requested Parkhill, Smith & Cooper, Engineers of Slaton, to prepare plans and specifications and estimates of costs of paving and improving certain streets in the City of Slaton; and Whereas, by resolution passed on the 5th day of August, A. D. 1949 said City Commission approved said plans, specifications and estimates and determined that it is necessary that the hereinafter set out and enumerated portions of streets, avenues, and alleys in the City of Slaton be improved by raising, grading and filling same, by installing standard concrete curb and gutter, and by paving with triple asphalt surface treatment on six inch compacted caliche base:

Unit No. 11: Crosby Street from the existing pavement on Panhandle Avenue to the West Property Line of Twelfth Street.
Unit No. 12: Crosby Street from the West Property Line of Twelfth Street to the East Property Line of Seventeenth Street to the East Property Line of Eighteenth Street.
Unit No. 15: Fourteenth Street from the North Property Line of Dayton Street to the North Property Line of Geneva Street.
Unit No. 16: Fourteenth Street from the North Property Line of Geneva Street to the North Property Line of Jean Street.

Whereas, said resolution provided that the property abutting said sections of said streets proposed to be improved and the owners thereof should be assessed and pay for not exceeding all the costs of curb and gutter abutting their respective properties plus 9/10ths of the remaining costs of the improvements in the units on which the respective properties abut; and Whereas, the estimated costs for said standard curb and gutter is \$1.35 per front foot and the estimated costs for paving is \$2.50175 per front foot, for each of said units or districts, the total estimated costs of improvements designated as units or district No. 11 is \$3,796.09, the total estimated costs of improvements for district or unit No. 12 is \$3,142.49, the total estimated costs of improvements for district or unit No. 14 is \$3,142.49, the total estimated costs of improvements for district or unit No. 15 is \$3,097.89, the total estimated costs of improvements for district or unit No. 16 is \$3,097.89; and

Whereas, said resolution provided that before the levy of such assessments, hearing be held under the provisions of Article 1105b of the Revised Civil Statutes of Texas, after notice given as provided by law; Now therefore, under the provisions of said Article 1105b R.C.S. of Texas, notice is hereby given to all said owners of property abutting upon said streets and alleys, and to all persons interested in said improvements that hearing will be had by the City Commission of the City of Slaton, Texas, beginning at ten o'clock A. M., at which time any of said owners or interested persons who shall desire to contest any such assessments on account of the amount thereof or for any reason will be heard; and such hearing shall be continued from day to day and from time to time as may be necessary to give all property owners and interested persons a fully complete, fair and impartial hearing upon said matters with respect to such improvements and the levy of assessment in payment therefor.

After all persons have been heard and such hearing has been closed, assessments will be levied by ordinance against the abutting property and the owners thereof, which assessments will be a personal liability of the owners of such property and the first and

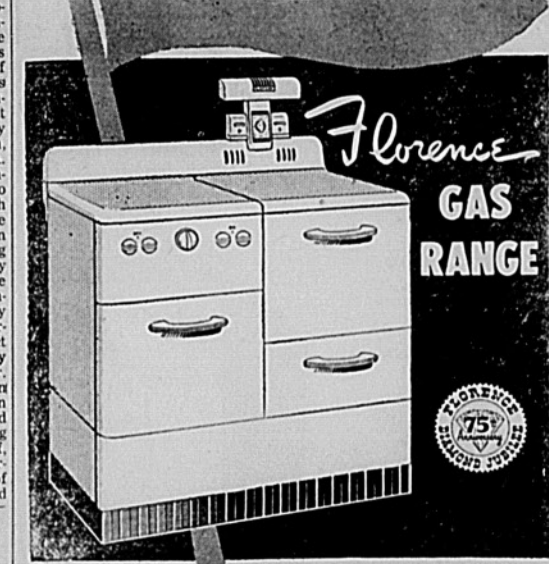

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

Beginning this week we are starting a series of interviews with some of Slaton's outstanding cooks and we hope to publish, at regular intervals, something about these women and also one of their favorite recipes.

This week we interviewed Mrs. J. E. Eckert of 130 S. 6th Street, who thinks "the way to a man's heart is through his stomach."

This busy housewife and clubwoman has always found time to prepare some special type of dish for her family to eat, and they all agree that she is a wonderful cook.

Mrs. Eckert laughed cheerfully and stated that she was not a born cook, but had learned the hard way. "I was almost twenty-five years old before I even attempted to cook anything and even then I used a cook book constantly."

According to many people in Slaton Mrs. Eckert is one of the best cooks in town and is very willing to help out with banquets and club dinners.

At the present time she cooks meals every week for approximately forty Rotarians. These meals usually consist of salads, meat, vegetables, hot rolls and pies. When Mrs. Eckert cooks rolls for these men, she usually bakes one hundred. It takes 8 or 9 pies to serve this many people, but the amount doesn't seem to bother this cheerful cook.

According to Mrs. Eckert, the first few times she tried to cook, things didn't turn out so well, but after a little practice, the food was edible. Now after much practice she has well earned her title as being one of the best cooks in town.

For the past week Mrs. Eckert has had her son and daughter-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. F. Dayton Eckert of Chicago, and their two sons, Pete and Tom. With two healthy and energetic boys running around and playing hard, she has had to cook plenty of food for them, but again this was no bother to her as she loves to cook.

Although Mrs. Eckert is known to have many favorite recipes she is especially fond of one for making pie crust. It is called the "Mystery Chef Pie Crust" and has always proved successful.

The recipe is as follows:
2 cups of flour
2 teaspoons of baking powder
1/4 teaspoon salt
1 cup shortening
6 teaspoons sugar
2 tablespoons cold water
Mix all the ingredients together

just the same as any crust recipe and roll into shape. Mrs. Eckert stated that the recipe called for 2 tablespoons cold water, but that through experience she has found out that it works better if 4 tablespoons of water are used.

When the crust is rolled into shape and placed in a pie pan then it is time to your in your favorite filling or sliced fruit.

This is only one of the many successful recipes of this fine cook. She thinks that anyone can be a good cook if they follow directions and practice this one art that is so dear to a man's heart.

**HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 19**

proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in certain counties upon a vote of the people therein.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI of the Constitution of the State of Texas be and the same is hereby amended by adding to said Article a new Section, to be known and designated as Section 62-c, reading as follows:

"Section 62-c. The Legislature is authorized to provide for the creation of Civil Service Systems for county employees in the respective counties of this State, but any system so authorized and established shall be approved by a vote of the people in said county. Any Civil Service System established by virtue of this Section shall apply to appointive offices only, and the limitations on term of office hereinafter provided by Section 30 of this Article shall not apply, but the duration of such offices shall be governed by the provisions of such Civil Service System. This Section shall not apply to counties having a population less than seventy-five thousand (75,000) people."

Sec 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electorate of the State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which election all ballots shall have printed or written thereon (or in counties using voting machines the said machines shall provide for) the following:

"FOR The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein"; and

"AGAINST The Constitutional Amendment authorizing the Legislature to provide for Civil Service in counties upon a vote of the people therein."

Each voter shall mark out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed Amendment, and if it shall appear from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment, the same shall become a part of the Constitution of the State of Texas.

Sec 3. The Governor of the State of Texas shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

**SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION
NO. 4**

Proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas, by amending Section 19 of Article 16, so as to provide that the qualification of no person to serve as a juror on grand juries and on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex; providing that existing provisions of the Constitution shall be construed in conformity herewith; providing for the submission of this amendment to a vote of the people of Texas; providing the time, means and manner thereof; and making an appropriation for such purpose.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 19 of Article 16 of the Constitution of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 19. The Legislature shall prescribe by law the qualification of grand and petit jurors; provided that the qualification of no person for service on grand juries or on petit juries shall be denied or abridged on account of sex, and no person shall be exempt from service on grand juries or petit juries on account of sex."

Section 2. The foregoing Constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the second Tuesday in November, 1949, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon:

"FOR the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

"AGAINST the amendment to the State Constitution qualifying women as grand and petit jurors."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Section 3. The Governor shall issue his proclamation calling said election and have the same published and said election held in accordance with this Resolution and the Constitutional Laws of this State, and return shall be made and the votes canvassed and counted as provided by law; and if said amendment is adopted by the vote of the qualified electors of this State, the Governor shall issue his proclamation as required by law.



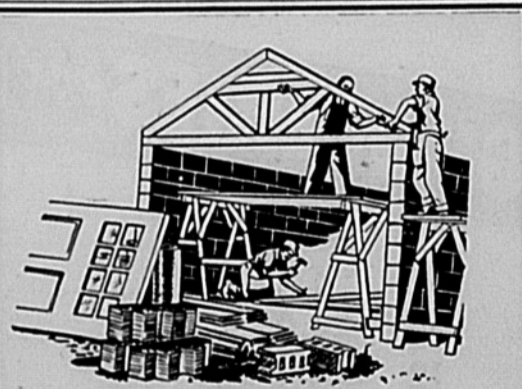

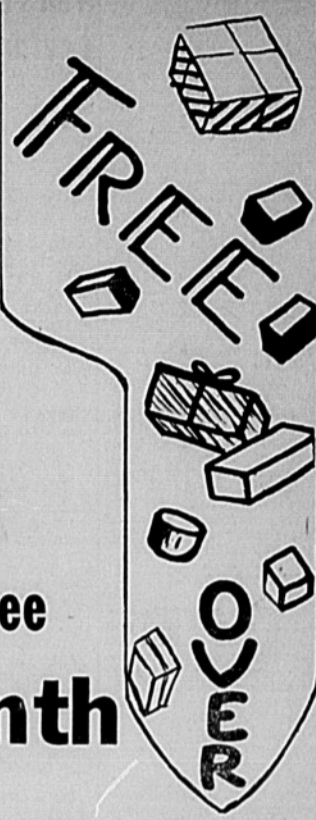
