### 50 BLOCKS OF PAVING COMPLETE

Fifty block of new paving has been laid. The City is now in process of paving 7th Street from Panhandle to Dayton, and is ready and anxious to lay new paving as fast as the property owners on any street desire.

Our city is cleaner, healthier, more sanitary and is improving in these matters every day. Outdoor toilets are being eliminated. Over 11,500 feet of new sewer extensions have been made. A new street sweeper has been purchased and the streets are presenting a better appearance. A new packer-type garbage truck is now operating and sanitary conditions with respect to the disposition of garbage are improving.

All these improvements and many others, including modernization of the City's rolling stock and a new police patrol car, have cost a lot of money. The new water facilities and sewer lines were purchased at the peak of inflated prices. The City's payroll has necessarily nearly doubled. Yet the financial condition of the City is better than ever before. Our bonded debt is only \$205,000.00 (as compared with \$482,000.00 of Post, for example). Our bonds find a ready market, in fact for the first time in the history of the city they bring a

premium price. Yet our taxes are assessed on a basis of only 75 per cent of appraised value of property, as compared with 100 per cent in many comparable cities. This evidences sound management on the part of the mayor and city commission.

Mayor Wootton devotes his FULL TIME to the job of being mayor. It is a full time job. He has lived 28 law-abiding years in this community. He works at his job with the same sound and intelligent industry that made a success of his own personal business affairs. The action of the engineers in backing up the railroads at a time when the Brotherhood and the carriers are at loggerheads over several important labor issues is said to be almost unprecendented. The Justice Department suits are based on the grounds that the railroads should have granted the government more favorable rates than they did on much of its wartime freight.

The railroads contend, on the other hand, that the government was not charged more than the established rates paid by other shippers and that most of its wartime freight was moved on substantially lower rates at great savings to the government.

The Brotherhood's petition defends the over-all reasonableness of the railroads' charges for its warservices.

The Justice Department, the

The Justice Department, the pelition states, is seeking to take from the railroads the identical profits which the government already took away from them, in large part, through excess profits taxes.

Irom the rallroads the identical profits which the government already took away from them, in large part, through excess profits taxes.

The petition states that if the rallroads were forced to pay the reparations sought by the Justice Department, many-cailroads would be plunged into bankruptcy. They would not have funds for adequate maintenance or needed improvements and government ownership would become an imminent threat. If the rallroads undertook to offset reparation payments by further rate increases, the Brotherhood states that traffic would be driven to competing forms of transportation and that would reduce the number of railroad jobs.

"It is contrary to the interests of the petitioner and to the public interest," to take into consideration the greater and more costly service rendered by the railroads during the war, the exhaustion of railroad plant and personnel in the consummation of the war effort and the unavoidable effect thereof, together with the stupendous tax bill paid the government under the war-time income and excess profits tax law.

"To permit the government to reduce the railroads' revenues by several billion dollars by means of reparation awards," the petition continued, "while at the same time retaining the taxes or any substantial part thereof paid on such revenues—is only only unfair and inequitable, but is economically unsound.

"The expropriation of railroad funds for the payment of repara-

"The expropriation of railroad funds for the payment of reparation awards," the petition continues, "would take money from the railroads that is needed for the employment of labor and the purchase of material to restore and maintain the roadbed, track and equipment of the railroads to prewar conditions," as well as for "the purchase of modern and adequate equipment, and the improvement of service and efficiency in operation."

The 80,000 members of the Brotherhood, the petition states, "have a direct, vital and continuing interest in the maintenance of a financially sound and solvent railroad industry." Such an industry, it says, "is indispensable to the national defense and to the economic stability of the country as a whole."



# Big Waste In The Defense Budget

"Nearly increases waste in government united budgets is disclosed by Henry J. Taylor in an excitusive article in The Reader's Digest. Reporting on indings of the Committee on Organization of the Executive Branca, Taylor states: "With our other vast expenditures at home and abroad, our military budgets could in time crack our economy wide open."

Though the three armed services are supposedly unified, each estimates its own budget separately. "with the lest hand hardy knowing what the right is doing." The initial combined budgets of Army, Navy and Air Force, for the fiscal year ending June 30, 1950, totaled nearly \$50,000,000,000—more than double the entire national budget before Pearl Harbor. Illustrating the services' "prodigal approach to the whole subject of costs," Taylor cites the fact that \$5,000,000,000,000 was knocked off the total, in a "preliminary sifting of the figures" by Detense Sceretary Forestal and his Joint Chiefs of Staff. The reduction equals a year's cost of the Marshall Plan. Requests for housing funds totaled over \$2,000,000,000 about half the amount spent for all residential housing in the U. S. last year. One item: 910 family houses at \$83,350 each.

A request for 1,546 tanks showed an average cost of \$337,500 at ank. Investigation disclosed that this included the cost of tools to make the tanks — an item already in the budget of another bureau. According to Army statistics, 25,045 tanks were still on hand from wartime. But the Army could locate only 15,960. "What happened to the other nine thousand tanks is a question that remains unanswered," Taylor, says.

An item of \$108,000,000 for uniforms was overlapped by another item of \$213,000,000 earmarked for "stockpilling other clothing and personal equipment." The Commission saw evidence "that padding has been a fairly general practice."

One case required 14 days to heal and another 32. Each patient drank a liter of the juice daily, Average healing time for seven average cases of duedenal ulcers was 10.4 days; for six cases of gastric ulcer, 7.3 days. About four and a half pounds of cabbage yields one quart of juice."

Tractor power is used almost exclusively in the production of all crops in a block of 77 Northwest Texas counties. It was reported that a few farmers in these counties still keep a team or two for odd jobs about the farm or for hauling feed.

COLLEGE STATION, March 28

Texas farmers are making long strides toward complete mechanization of crop production, according to H. P. Smith, agricultural engineer of the Texas Agricultural experiment Station.

Smith has just completed analyzing information on power used on Texas farms in crop production furnished him by county agricultural agents.

No horses or mules are now used in crop production in about 40 Texas counties. With the exception of some hand-hoeing and hand-harvesting of cotton, crop production in these counties is completely mechanized, Smith said.
