## Slaton Tigers Play First Game Here Tonight

### TRADES DAY CROWD IS LARGEST SINCE SALE OF U.S. WAR BONDS

The largest crowd to assemble in Slaton since the old war bond days was present last Monday afternoon at the City Hall lawn for the first Slaton Trades Day drawing which three \$25.00 U. S. Bonds were given away besides about two hundred dollars worth of merchandise that was donated by a group of progressive merchants of the town.

Before the drawing started P. G. Meading, Secretary of the Chamber of Commerce, awarded a check for \$281.30 to Hobart Bartlett who brought the first 1949 bale of cotton to Slaton last week. The fund was made up by individuals and business men of Slaton and by the Slaton Chamber of Commerce.

P. G. Meading acted as spokesman and Emcee for the Trades Day program which went off with speed and quick action.

More elaborate plans for the next Trades Day program are being worked out and those who are interested in registering for the gifts will find some extra features in the next drawing which takes place at 4:00 on October 3rd.

Slaton's latest project, the Slaton Youth Center, had its formal opening last night at 7:30 p. m. in the City Park.

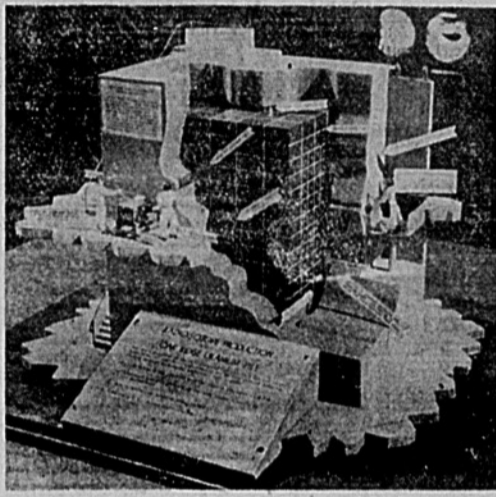

### 968 Enroll Monday In Slaton Schools

According to Superintendent Lee Vardy, 968 children enrolled Monday in Slaton public schools, and more are anticipated to enroll within the next two weeks.

Of the 968 enrolling, 113 were reported as first grade students, and 20 from the Evans first grade. Total registration for the three Slaton grammar schools numbered 729, 224 for the Slaton High School, and 15 for the Evans High School.

Vardy said that the Slaton School system is extending its health program and will have a part time nurse who will do medical inspection for all the city schools.

Slaton's Tigers, playing their first football game of the season, meet the strong Floydada Whirlwinds at 8:00 o'clock tonight in a non-conference tilt at Tiger stadium.

The Whirlwinds will be out to avenge the sound licking the Tigers gave them last year on their own home grounds. The local eleven went into the game rated as the underdogs, but they came out with an upset 21-12 victory.

Floydada brings practically the same team that the Tigers beat last year to town tonight. Bill Jeter, the lad who scored the only two touchdowns against Slaton in the 1948 game, will be the only player of any importance who will be missing from their line-up.

The starting line has an average of about 166 pounds. They have a tackle weighing 200 pounds, and the rest of the line averages about 160 or 170. The starting backfield averages in the 150's.

The Whirlwinds operate from the single wing and the T.

This year's Tiger team is made up largely of new material after having lost eight of last year's starting eleven. The entire squad has been looking good during the past week's workouts, however.

Barring injuries, Slaton's starting line would average 162 pounds per man, or just four pounds under the average of Floydada. The backfield will average in the 140's. The Tigers operate from the T. Probable starting line ups are as follows:

For Floydada: Trice, left end; Haney, left tackle; Lloyd, left guard; at center, Guthrie; Wilson, right guard; Grubbs, right tackle; Co-Quart, Perry, right end; Jones, quarterback; Fenley, left half; White, right half and Robertsons, fullback.

For the Slaton Tigers: Corley, left end; Moore, left tackle; Young, left guard; Dillard, center; German, right guard; Capt. Williams, right tackle; Huckabay, right end; Bybee, quarterback; Lewis, left half; Willis, right half, and Thompson, fullback.

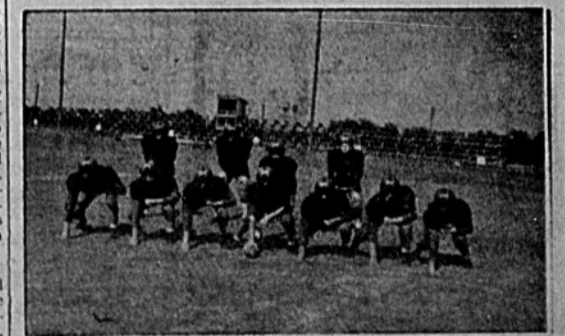

Local managers say that it is guaranteed that the Lions will be a much better ball club next year. There will be some shifting and changes in the present line up, and eight or ten regulars will be back for another season to help boost the team.

There will be a bunch of new boys coming into the club, especially more good pitchers of which Slaton is lacking.

"We wish to extend our appreciation to all sports minded citizens who have followed a losing ball club throughout the year," Melvin Tudor, president of the Lions club stated this week. "Next year we will have a winning ball club and not a losing club."

With the first game of the football season being played here tonight under the lights, the Slaton Tigers open one of the roughest schedules that they have faced in quite some time.

The Floydada Whirlwinds, one of the top three teams in District 3-A, will be out to give the Tigers a good licking tonight at the local stadium. The Tigers jumped right in the middle of the Whirlwinds last season and came out on the right end of the score, 21-12. Good playing on the part of the local group and over-confidence on the part of the enemy helped Slaton a great deal.

Floydada is expected to bring almost the same team to Slaton this year that the Tigers beat last season. They suffer the loss of only two or three of their best players.

Coaches Tillery and Barnett have only seven lettermen and a few reserve lettermen returning this year to the Tiger line up. Jerry Huckabay, who played center position last year, has been moved to end. Huckabay is a good ball receiver and can move pretty fast down the field. He played center on the basketball team last spring. George Young, a letterman at the guard slot last year, is showing good speed on the defense and can hit quick and hard. 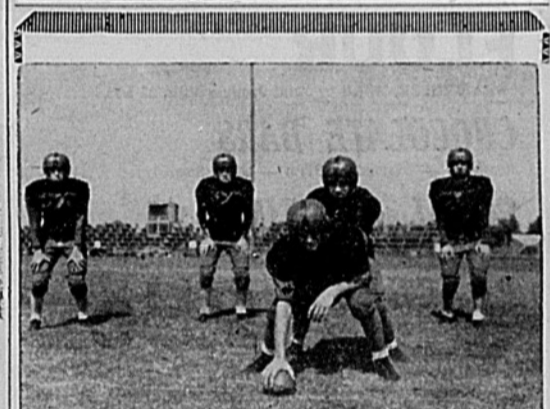

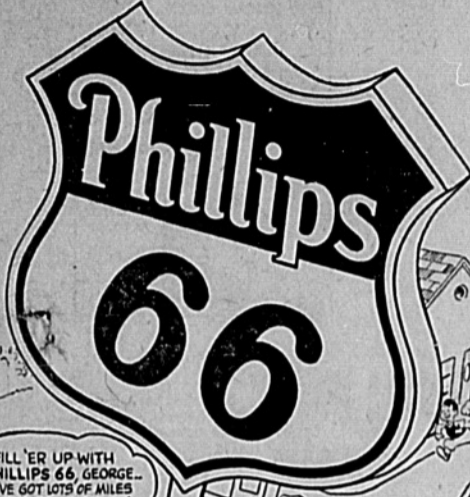

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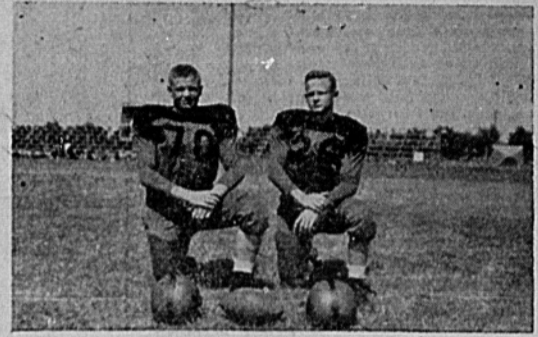

Colorado City's 14th Annual roundup and rodeo came to a successful close Saturday night, showing to approximately 4,000 fans. — Colorado Record.

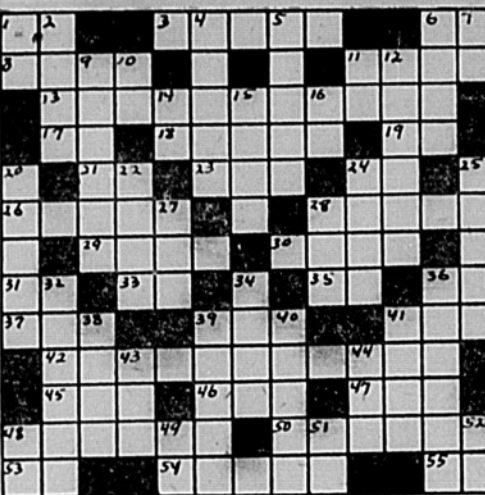

Packing of the soil is one of the results of overgrazing range lands. The result is, the soil can't soak up water at as fast a rate.

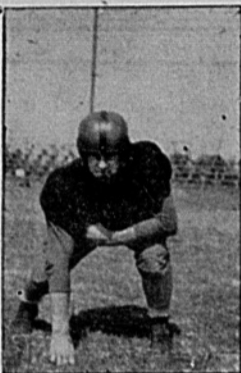
**CORRECTION: DOVE SEASON TO BEGIN SEPTEMBER 1**

Slaton's bank, the Citizens State Bank, has been the only safe organization of its kind to exist in town since the foundation of this city in 1911.

Established in 1932, in the face of two other bank failures and in the heart of the depression, it seemed destined at that time that the Citizens Bank would follow in the foot steps of its unsuccessful predecessors, the Slaton State Bank and the Slaton First State Bank.

Under the able guidance of J. S. Edwards who has been the bank's president since its beginning, the bank began gradually to grow. Small loans were transacted during the first year of operation; but as Mr. H. T. Swanner, present Vice President, pointed out: "Everytime we made a loan on a mule or a horse we went out to inspect it to make sure it wouldn't die before we got back to town."

Perhaps one of the most prosperous moves of the bank was made in 1934 when the organization joined the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. People had no faith in the bank as the blow of the depression was still fresh on the minds of everyone old enough to realize what had happened. Now that the Citizens State Bank was a member of the FDIC all deposits up to

\$5,000 were guaranteed by the government.

When the bank was first begun, it had only five employees, including Mr. Edwards, T. A. Worley, Ada Bell Benton, H. T. Swanner, and J. S. Tekel. Every job was every man's job during those crucial years of the bank's infancy. The first full-time cashier was not hired until nearly four years after the bank opened. To top it all, the bank was organized with only \$25,000 capital, no surplus, and no undivided profits.

Today after 17 years of operation, the bank has a working staff of ten members, has had 100% stock dividends, has accumulated \$50,000 surplus, and \$42,298.70 undivided profits.

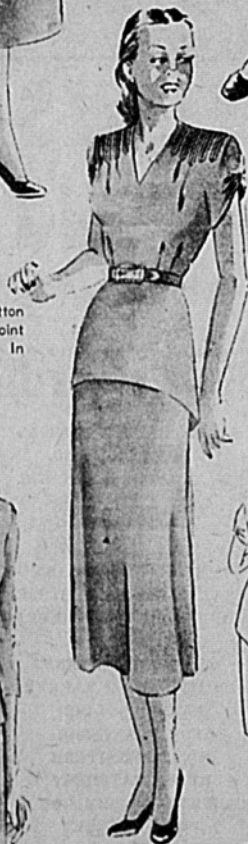
