One of the examples that fell in the latter category was the authority which the act delegates to states, incorporated cities, towns and villages to decontrol certain areas. Such decontrol would have to have the approval of the Governor.

In a release from his office in Washington, Wood states that local authorities can make "on the spot" studies of the problem and recommend whether or ont federal rent control is necessary for a healthy economic situation in their respective communities.

One of the points that will have a variety of interpretations is the "fair net operating income" provision. Both Carnes and Wood believe this is only a liberalization of the existing regulations for making financial adjustments in specific cases.

"In many cases there are landlards who are not getting an adequate yield from their property." Carnes said. "The provision for adjustment to a fair operating income will relieve an unnecessary burden without allowing a runaway rental increase."

The law leaves it up to the housing expediter to determine just what a fair net operating income might be. It does not mean that overall rent increases would be handed out to all tenants on a landlord's property. Landlords who obviously have been operating at a loss will be able to secure redress. Adjustments will be based on a study of 100,000 rental units throughout the United States and over a period of eight years.

One point that is considered as having added strength to the previous rent control act is:

1. The housing expediter now has authority to regulate evictions. Since June 30, 1947 he has not had such authority. This is considered a curb on "black market" operations and a step toward eliminating the fear of eviction.

Cattlemen Warned About Use Of DDT

COLLEGE STATION, April 11
—Texas dairymen are warned not to use DDT for insect control. The warning comes from G. G. Gibson extension dairy husbandman of Texas A. & M. College, who adds that small amounts of DDT in a food such as milk might prove harmful in time.

And the presence of DDT in milk goes strictly against the grain with the Food, Drug, and Cosmetic Act. So, it's best to use another chemical in the control of dairy cattle insects.

Entomologists recommend meth-

another chemical in the control of dairy cattle insects.
Entomologists recommend methoxychlor or pyrethrum in place of the DDT for dairy cows, and go on to say that DDT is still good for insect control on other livestock, including beef cattle. Dairy animals or livestock being finished for slaughter should not be fed forage treated with DDT or other chemicals in the same class, cautioned the Bureau of Entomology and Plant Quarantine.

It's a different matter when it comes to fly control in and around farm buildings. DDT is all right for this. So is chlordance and BHC But methoxychlor is the one recommended for use around dairy barns where milk is being processed.

Even better than the chemical sprays, Gibson suggests that the dairymen get to the bottom of the fly situation with proper clean-up and other sanitation measures.

With a clean dairy, only a small amount of chemicals may be needed, he concluded.

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
