### How To Get Along With Neighbors

With Neighbors

Do you have children in your neighborhood who have been pulling up the flowers, teasing your dog and drawing funny pictures of you on the sidewalk?

Here is what a Reader's Digest author says about his troubles:

"The ideal number of children, if you want to get along with your neighbors, is none. I've found that people don't like kids," states John Bedford in the October Reader's Digest. Bedford is the father of two boys and is deeply angry at the modern world's attitude toward children, as he sees it. His article is condensed from Maclean's.

"My wife and I have been refused lodging because we have children," Bedford says. "People glare at them in movies because they've asked a couple of questions. They've been reported for running across lawns, for standing on running boards of parked cars, for making chalk marks on the sidewalk—until I'd like to slip them a few rocks and turn them loose."

With two "normal, decent boys"—Pete, nine, who goes in for the girls; John, seven, who goes in for frogs, worms, dead birds and jet propulsion—Bedford and his wife are convinced that "today our cities and towns, our streets and houses, our very way of life seem designed to discourage children." Normal expenditure of Pete's and John's energy invariably draws a complaint from some neighbor. "Every time one of them lets out a whoop half a dozen people look up from their petunias and scrowl. Every time they get carried away with their games and forget that their feet are on someone's lawn people look at one another and shake their heads."

Deploring the fact that natural playgrounds, the open fields and woods, are not available to most children today, Bedford says the public playground is no substitute. It's a place "for getting rid of your children with municipal help—from 9 to 5, on Plot No. 13-A."

The general idea appears to be that the less you see of children the more progressive you are, Bedford observes. "Parents just go through the parental motions like an alderman laying the first brick of the city hall. After that some paid worker takes over."

He can see the day coming, he says, "when children will be conceived by artificial insemination, born in cellophane, raised in pressure cooker, sent to a nursery school at two, then to a placement bureau for an aptitude test and brushed off for good."

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





#### VA Lists Changes For Eligibility Of War Veterans

Of War Veterans

Certain changes in Certificates of Eligibility for World War II veterans planning to train under the GI Bill have been made, and it will be necessary that all veterans comply with these new instructions in order to avoid delay in entering school, Robert W. Sison, Veterans Administration Regional Manager at Lubbock announced today.

Certificates of Eligibility issued to World War II veterans planning to train under the GI Bill from now on will include (1) the name of the course a veteran wants to take and (2) the name of the approved school at which he wants to pursue the course. The new type certificate will be good only for the listed course in the specific school named.

Veterans who had Certificates of Eligibility issued before September 1, 1948, have been urged repeatedly by VA to xchange them for certificates bearing identifying "C" or claims numbers. Those few veterans who still have the old certificates should surrender them for the new type—listing course and school — before commencing a course of training.

Veterans who have never had a course of training and now have unused Certificates of Eligibility—issued after September 1, 1948—may use them as they are until March 1, 1950. They need not be exchanged for new certificates, but after March 1, 1950, they will not be valid.
