To cost approximately \$80,000 the building would accommodate 500 in its sanctuary.

The church has been in the present building since 1921. Seating capacity at present is about 350 including the balcony, the pastor said. He said one of the principal objections to the old building is the height of the steps into the sanctuary. The new building will eliminate this, he said.

The new building will be erected directly west of the present structure to face north on Lubbock Street. A tower and cloister will connect the two buildings.

It has been many years since any real expansion has been made in the accomodations for the members of this church and after long consideration by the directors it was decided that the construction should be done.

Step Light And Watch Closely

A great deal of emphasis has been placed lately upon the affic conditions in Slaton. That the same problem is paramount all over the nation is evidenced by the gruesome reports of automobile accidents that are published in practically every daily paper that is printed.

That everyone in Slaton should keep on a constant alert to prevent accidents was demonstrated recently when the little Allred boy was injured so seriously, and even though the traffic situation has improved considerably it is still most important that a constant watch be kept to make our streets as safe as possible.

The congestion around the schools when the

One constant watch be kept to make our streets as sale as spossible. The congestion around the schools when the classes are starting or when they are being dismissed has been relieved, but there are still too many people who are driving too fast on the streets near the school grounds. The children are now in more danger when they get several blocks away from the schools than they were when the congestion was at its worst.

It is self evident that the police cannot watch every street in Slaton at the proper time and even if this were possible it should not be necessary. It should be constantly on every automobile drivers mind while they are the wheel, to drive carefully. Let's give our own children and our neighbors children a chance to live and to be adults, and, incidently, let's think of our own necks and property. SLOW down when you are within three or four blocks of any school building during schools hours, and do not pass cars in front of you.

Poll Tax, Yes Or No

Poll Tax, Yes Or No...

There will soon be a state-wide election to determine whether or not the poll tax, prerequisite for voting at Texas polls, should be abolished or should remain as is. Arguments have been flowing freely pro and con between people, but no one seems to know for sure how the election will come out.

One argument for not doing away with the tax is that from the meager \$1.75 price of voting, one million dollars go into the state school fund yearly. Most people realize the importance of educating our children, and they will say, "Anything that will help education, I'm for it." But those people do not stop to think that after that same one million dollars is distributed throughout the towns in Texas, it doesn't add up much.

The million dollars should not be taken from the schools, but it should come from some other source than collection of poll taxes. It is the same people who could afford to lose a couple of thousand dollars yearly to our school systems that do not go out to the polls and vote—and why—because of one dollar and seventy-five cents.

Another so to speak ethical argument for keeping the poll tax is that those people who really want to vote in the first place won't let \$1.75 stand in their ways. This is a gross misconception. Suppose a man makes a salary of fifty dollars a week, he has a wife and three children, and an invalid mother requiring frequent medical treatment. Even though fifty dollars a week is considered fairly good pay today, that man is hard up. That man will stay away from the polls because he has learned how far money can be made to go, and he will tell himself that his vote couldn't have meant much anyway. A hypothetical case? Of course. But there are thousands just like it, and even thousands more worse.

One poponets to the poll tax contend that everyone should and will some day be guaranteed a free voting privilege. They say it's the right of a man living in a democracy to voice his opinion and have an equal chance to vote his choice. It all sounds pretty corn

Perhaps the poll tax will be abolished in the Nov. 8 election. Even if it is, perhaps there won't be any more people going to the polls; but no man can then shirk his duty by saying he can't afford to vote.





