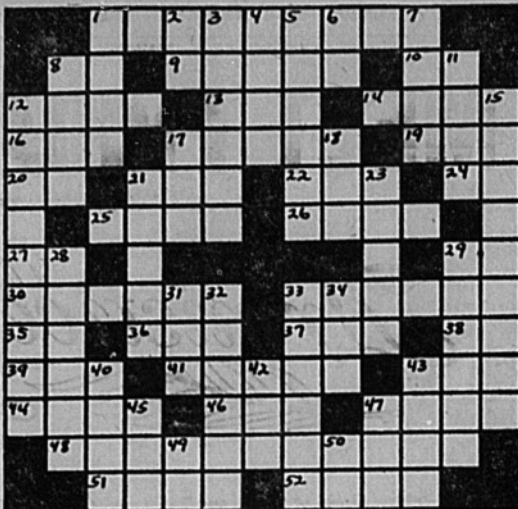

Largest Bank Swindle



SPENCERVILLE, IND. — The largest bank swindle in the history of the country, in relation to total deposits, has brought indictments against Clyde Rectenwall, 65, cashier of the bank, here, since 1914. Two local residents and three out-of-town depositors are also accused of drawing checks on inadequate bank accounts. The bank had 900 depositors and total deposits of \$675,000, but somehow some \$350,000 has seeped out of the bank in the past eight years. This marks the all-important and crucial game with the Post Antelopes. Post-Slaton games are looked forward to each season with a great deal of interest by football players and fans alike, and it's always a matter of "may the best team win."

Past records show that the boys from Slaton have held the edge in victories down over the years, but this is the first time in four years that the Tigers have had the opportunity to meet Post where a win would really mean a great deal to both teams. They are now deadlocked for first place in the district race, and the winner will more than likely get to meet Littlefield's Wildcats of the north half for the championship. The Wildcats are currently leading that race, with little possibility of getting knocked out of the running.

Post went through the entire season last year without a defeat and advanced to the regionals, where they lost to a Phillips eleven. This year they have suffered three defeats, and those were at the hands of Floydada's Wairwinds, Levelland's Lobos, and Crosbyton's Chiefs. Defeats have been handed to Slaton from Floydada, Abernathy and Muleshoe, all season openers.

Early this week local fans as well as Post fans were making ready for today's invasion of the Tiger squad. According to nearby sports writers and local interest shown, this Armistice Day tussle has stirred up the most interest of any high school game to be played in these parts this year. Lots of people are remaining in the middle of the road, but you can bet that followers here will say that naturally Slaton can win, and probably Post enthusiasts feel the same about their own team.

The season's conference records show that both teams are fairly evenly matched as far as defense and offense is concerned. Post has the better offensive show, with 145 points scored to the opponents 13. Slaton boasts the best defensive record with 76 points and only 12 points scored against them. The Antelopes will be considered as seven to twelve points better than the local team, however.

Many Slaton people who have been lucky enough to secure tickets for the Lubbock Western-Odesa Bronco game today will be taking advantage of the holiday to go down there. This will be one of the top clashes in the Double A circuit this week end.

With the football season just about over, coaches are now looking forward to the oncoming basketball year. At a recent meeting in Levelland representatives voted to divide the district into two halves, which placed Slaton in the South Half with Post, Tahoka, Seagraves and O'Donnell. The South will hold a double round robin, giving Slaton a total of eight conference games.

The first game for the Tiger cagers will be held on December 2, at Littlefield. This will not be a conference game, however. Final playoffs are expected to be completed around February 17 and 18.

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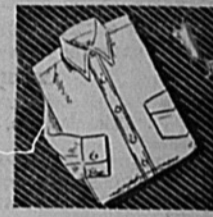

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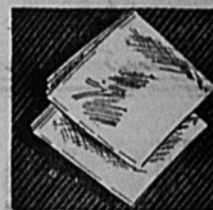

Have We Advanced Or Just Changed? . . .

Are we of today in much better circumstances than were our parents and will the people of tomorrow be in a better position to live a better life than we of today are able to do?

How much more can mechanical implements improve living conditions and do the people in closely inhabited places have better living conditions than those who live in isolation.

While science has overcome many of the contagious diseases that killed off large numbers of people in the past, diseases caused by neurosis, over stimulation and strain has greatly increased heart trouble, insanity and nerve strains.

There is something to say for what we consider progress, but there is also something worth considering before the entire nation becomes one vast manufacturing center where there would be no place where a person could seek solitude, where the hum of machines and the sound of voices could not be heard.

There are hundreds of towns, acres of packing plants, thousands of miles of railroads and paved streets and roads now where there was nothing but farm land, prairie land and grazing land, when our parents were young, there are hundreds of rivers that are now so polluted with sewage and chemicals from manufacturing plants that fish cannot live in them, new problems face us that never faced us before.

Before we of this section invite further development we should stop and consider whether we want to live in crowded cities, have our streams polluted, and live in towns where the intensity of crowded conditions place us where we cannot find a single place to go where we can escape over civilization.

What About The Future Of This Area? . . .

What does the future hold for the South Plains? With the ever increasing cost of pulling cotton and the steady improvement in mechanical picking equipment it is evident that the cotton pullers are gradually forcing the farmers to go to mechanical means of gathering their harvest.

This of course will likely mean more money in the hands of the farmers, but that there will be a great shrinkage in the number of customers who will come to the stores in the towns over the area. Instead of hundreds of itinerant workers coming into the area each fall to collect hundreds of thousands of dollars and to spend the major part of it, there will be a few mechanics to operate the picking machines and that will be all.

There is no great likelihood of this area becoming a manufacturing section as we do not have the water supply that a manufacturing section requires and the future growth of population will most likely be hampered by the lack of water unless some method of getting more water is found. Even if the Canadian River project should be attempted it would mean little for this area for if it should allow the development of manufacturing the plans would be built nearer the source of water supply than in this area and all that Slaton or Lubbock could hope for, at best, would be a high priced source of water.

Some folks who are interested in the development of oil in this area seem to feel that there is a vast supply of oil in this immediate section but this might prove more of a disadvantage in the long run than it would an advantage for when the independent operators get gobbled up by the big companies an oil town suffers and is often worse off than it would have been had oil never been developed near its borders.

The town of Levelland has enjoyed its prosperity longer than most oil towns, Snyder is at present getting a big play but when all the fuss and hullabaloo dies down Snyder may take a beating.

We here in Slaton are well off now and a steady growth that is able to take care of normal expansion will not cause over-expansion. In five, ten or fifteen years Slaton may prove to be one of the best towns on the South Plains.

We have one of the best towns in Texas right now when it comes to having good old home folks who are interested in its development. We have what is truly a "Home Town" and if we can keep it so, then we will develop in a good healthy way and become a part and parcel of what the future South Plains will develop into and not a "has been town" that used to be on a "boom."

Save Your Energy For Christmas Day . . .

Although Christmas is still nearly two months away, now is the time to start thinking about your holiday shopping. Slaton merchants report that desirable merchandise is still very scarce and hard to get. In order to save yourselves from being shop-worn after tramping over the town on Christmas Eve while looking for just the right gift for your husbands, wives, children, and friends, buy your presents now when you see them in your local stores.

Some people with very large families are extremely hard hit financially at Christmas time because of the many gifts they must buy at once. If people would start buying their gifts early, the whole Christmas expense would not fall on them at once.

Early Christmas shopping would not only help individuals financially and help them find the things they want to buy, but it would also help the merchants. Early shopping would give them a chance to replenish their stock in order that those who are perpetually late in purchasing could have something from which to choose.

She was unable to teach the first eight weeks of school because of bad health and was re-

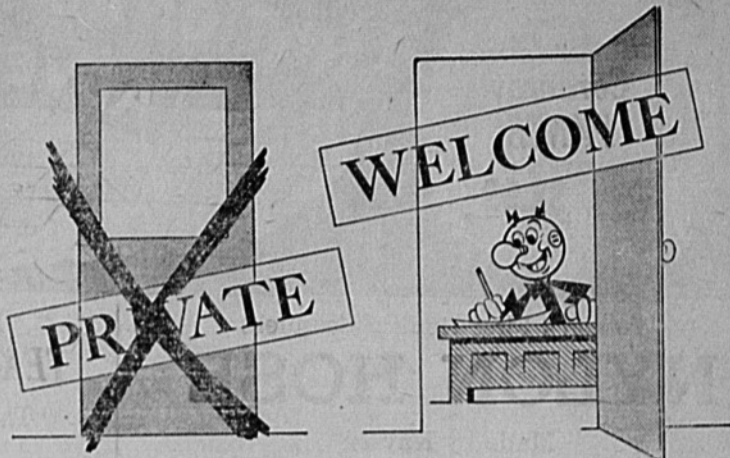

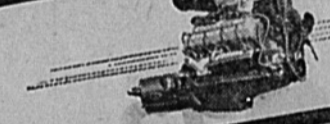

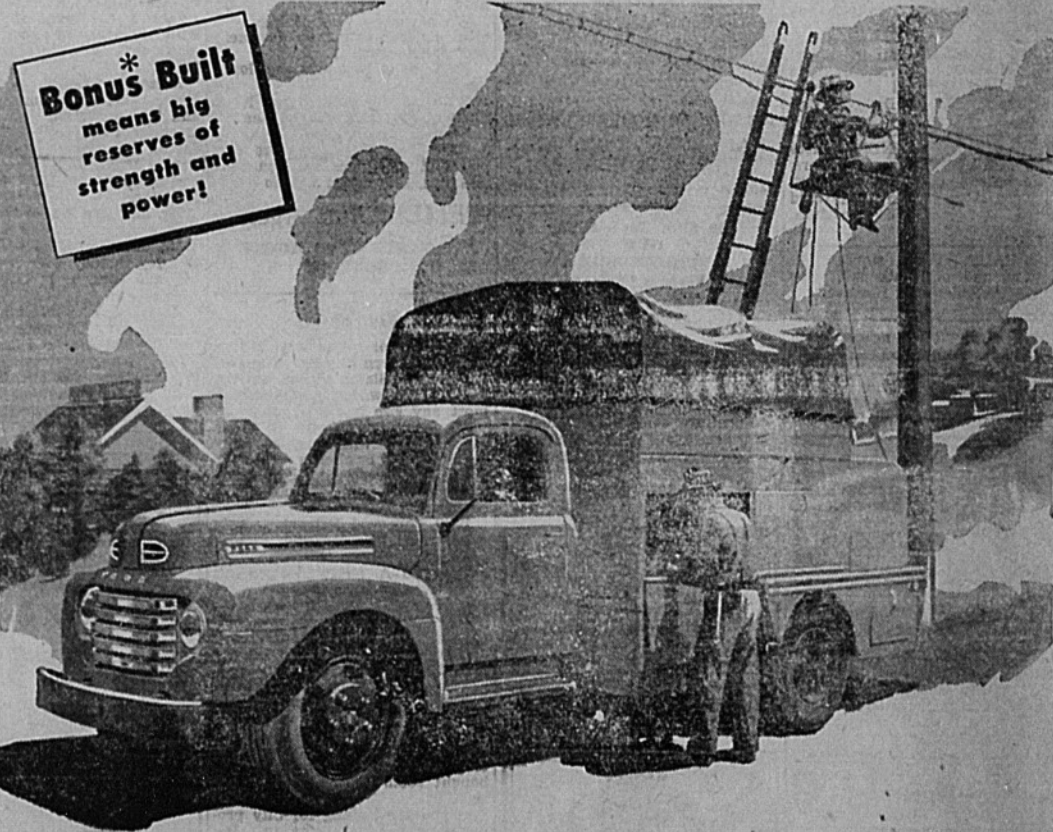

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

So far in this column we have not had a recipe for a pie, so Mrs. C. C. Cox has given us one which she says is not only beautiful to look at, but it always makes a big hit.

The name of the pie recipe is "Ambrosia Pie," and it was described as being "A delicate new marvel of a pie!" Ingredients call for:

- 1/2 cup flour
- 3/4 cup sugar
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1 1/4 cups water
- 2 egg yolks, slightly beaten
- 1/2 cup orange juice
- 2 tablespoons lemon juice
- 3 to 4 teaspoons grated orange rind
- 1/2 teaspoon lemon rind
- 1 baked 9-inch pie shell
- 1 organic sections free from membrane
- 3/4 cup Baker's Coconut
- Meringue
- 2 egg whites, unbeaten
- 1/2 cup sugar
- Dash of salt
- 2 tablespoons water

Instructions for mixing are as follows: Combine flour, sugar and salt in top of double boiler. Add water and egg yolks, mixing thoroughly. Place over hot water and cook 10 minutes, or until thickened, stirring constantly. Remove from fire; add fruit juice and rind. Chill. Pour into pie shell.

Put egg whites, sugar, salt and water in top of double boiler. Beat with rotary egg beater until thoroughly mixed. Place over rapidly boiling water, and beat 1 minute; then remove from fire, and continue beating 2 minutes longer, or until mixture will stand in peaks. Pile lightly on pie. Arrange orange sections on meringue and sprinkle with coconut. (All measurements are level).

Mrs. Cox says the only drawback to the recipe is that it takes some time to make the pie, but for special occasions the pie is made to order, as it looks just like a party dessert, frills and all.

"Ambrosia Pie" has been a favorite in the Cox family since way back in 1933 when Mrs. Cox found the recipe in some *Woman's Magazine*—she couldn't remember which one.

Besides being a very good cook, Mrs. Cox is also a flower enthusiast. She can become as excited over some new and different flower as she can a good recipe. Her home in Slaton is located at 325 West Lynn.

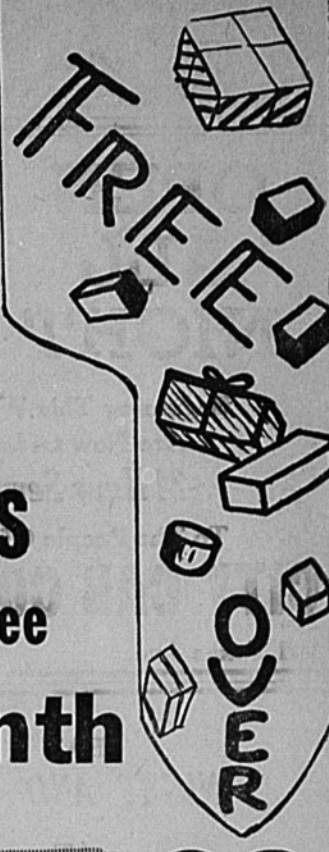
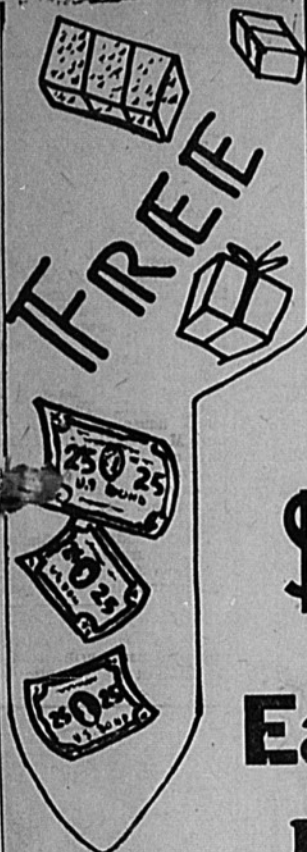

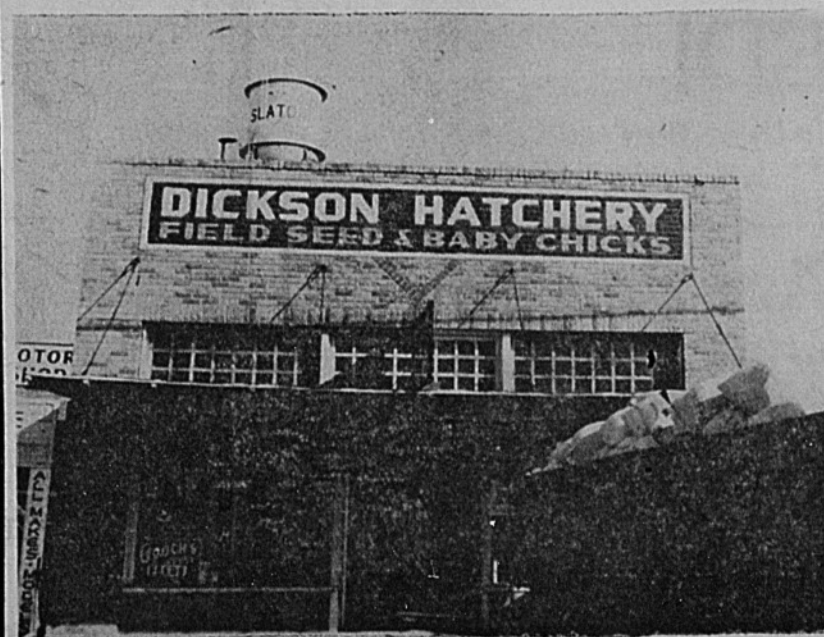

Slaton's Dickson Hatchery was set up in 1935 by N. C. Dickson, father of the present owner, Mr. Ralph Dickson. However, in 1935 the Dickson establishment was primarily a produce store. It was not until two years later that the hatchery was added. The elder Mr. Dickson operated the store up until the time of his death in May, 1946, and in January 1947 Ralph took up his father's duties.

The Dickson Hatchery today not only handles baby chicks, it also sells a complete line of chicken and dairy feeds, insecticides, and almost anything pertaining to chickens. "We also buy cream, eggs, and poultry from nearby farmers which we in turn sell to the market," Mr. Dickson added.

The hatching part of the business is in operation all through the spring and the early summer months. This period is the so called "hatching season." The Dickson Hatchery has a capacity for hatching as many as 52,000 eggs at one time. "We ran full capacity for six months last year," Mr. Dickson pointed out, "and sometime that seems like almost too much," he added jokingly.

What kind of chickens can you get at

Dickson's? All kinds. The eggs are bought from local agriculturists from what is called "farm flocks." The flocks are blood tested, culled, and controlled by the Dickson buyers. However, the hatchery has recently set up a private poultry farm which will work in connection with the farm flocks. It will act as a supplementary feeder flock.

For the past two years the Dickson Hatchery has been a member of the International Poultry Association and the Texas Poultry Improvement Association. They also operated under the international improvement plan which supplies representatives to inspect all flocks and the hatchery itself.

It is for this reason that the hatchery cannot afford to take the risk of hatching the eggs of individual customers. In order to safeguard against poultry diseases, all eggs must come from the recognized and approved flocks.

Asked if he hatched for customer orders only, Mr. Dickson smiled and said, "Not entirely." We take many orders, but the others we just go ahead and hatch with the anticipation of selling most of them. So far it's worked out pretty evenly."
