Burial was in the Slaton cemetry under the direction of the Williams Funeral home.



To cost approximately \$80,000 the building will accomodate 500 in its sanctuary. The new building will be erected directly west of the present structure to face north on Lubbock Street. A remodeling of the present structure into an educational building will take place at the same time of the construction of the new church. A tower and cloister will connect the two buildings. The church has been in the present building since 1921. Scating capacity at present is about 350 including the balcony, the pastor, Rev. O. B. Herring, said. One of the principal objections to the old building, he explained is the height of the steps into the sanctuary. The new building will eliminate this, he said. 


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

The third quarter was strictly the Tigers, with the Antelopes trying to hold off. Post held two times, once on their own 35 and later on their 17. And that was Slaton's deepest penetration of the game, aside from the touchdown. Post launched two drives in the final period, but both were cut short, one by a Kirkpatrick pass interception by Cecil Bybee and the other by the end of the game. The Antelopes were on the Tiger 20 when the final gun sounded.

Slaton got in the hole after the second half kickoff, but a clipping penalty brought the team out and set them up for the lone touchdown. Willis took a shot at the line but was stopped for no gain. A short spet pass from Bybee fell



Slaton outgained Post on the ground, 181 yards to 119, but the Antelopes completed ten of 28 passes for 95 yards, as compared to two completions in seven attempts for 11 yards for the Tigers. Post had the edge in first downs, 15 to 7.

The entire Tiger team played heads-up football in their best game of the season, Outstanding men in the line were Pete Williams, Leon Moore, and Georgo Young, Lewis and Bob Thompson, sparked the backfield offensive and were outstanding on the defense.

South Plains boxing fans got the opportunity to see a good scrap and help found a scholarship at the same time last night at Texas Tech when Bill Henderson took on Tony Olivas in a main event at Sled Allen's Arena.

Druids First to Use "Magic" of Mistletoe

The greens which are used for Christmas decorations found their way into early festivities because of certain virtues attributed to them by the ancients, and many of them which adorned pagan seasonal rites were later taken over to grace the ceremonies and celebrations of Christmas Day.

In both England and America, the holly and the mistletoe are as-sociated with Christmas as invari-ably as are the plum pudding and Christmas tree.

It was the Druids who first used the mistletoe. "Heal-all" was their name for it. The plant was supposed to have curative values, and grad-ually they assigned to it all man-ner of magic powers.

Their priests, each year around the time when we now celebrate Christmas, would have high platforms built around the sacred oak trees which, in a manner of speaking, were "hosts" to the mistletoe. Robed in ceremonial vestments of white, they ascended these platforms, and with golden sickles especially made for the solemn occasion they cut away the mistletoe.

Don't Mix Gaiety With Danger When Celebrating Christmas

While Christmas is the merriest of all seasons of the year it can also be a time of tragedy if certain hazards aren't avoided and some particular precautions taken.

The National Safety Council annually points out that the Christmas holidays are the most dangerous of the year, usually replete with casualties, home accidents, fires and falls.

The council has listed the follow-ing "don'ts" and precautions which if remembered will help make this Christmas season a safe one:

The Christmas tree shouldn't be placed near a stove or fireplace.

Don't give children any toys that could prove dangerous, such as those with sharp points. If toys are operated with electricity, be sure some grownup supervises their use.

The Christmas tree should not be

The Christmas tree should not be decorated with lighted candles. Carefully-wired electric bulbs de-finitely are much safer.

Don't leave a lighted tree un-guarded at any time. One should be on the lookout for fire all the time the tree is lighted. Especially dangerous is the practice of some families in leaving the Christmas tree lighted and unwatched all night long.

Don't place Christmas candles near the tree, curtains, paper wreaths or any other inflammable decorations.

Remember, the Christmas tree can be made fire-resistant. According to the United States forestry service, it can be done in this manner: Divide the weight of your tree by four and buy that many pounds of ammonium sulphate. Dissolve it in water—one and one-half pints of water to each pound of ammonium sulphate. Cut the end of your tree trunk on a diagonal. Put some of the solution in a jar and stick the diagonal butt of the tree into it. Add more solution as the tree drinks it up.





TSCW Experts Give Tips For Cooking

Time, fuel, flavor and food value can be saved by following a set of ten rules in cooking fresh vegetables say food specialists in the Home Economics Department of Texas State College for Women. The same suggestions also carhelp conserve food value, retain heatural color and flavor and make them more tasty:

1. Prepare vegetables for cooking just when ready to cook.
2. Start cooking vegetables in a minimum amount of boiling salted water.

5. Raise the cover and stir only when necessary,
as the cooking time to have vegetables just tender.
Alf and cooking lime to have vegetables or use in soups and sauces.

8. Refrain from holding foods hot for long periods of time.

9. Cook frozen vegetables before they thaw.

10. Make raw salads or slaw at the last minute.







They solve no parking problems, they are a nuisance to the public, they cost a lot of useless man hours and a lot of money to install.


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


