Slaton Scores 8-1 Victory Over Post

Tommy Jacobs, making his Oil Belt League debut, pitched an impressive no-hit game to give the Slaton Lions an 8-1 victory over Post's Millers last Thursday night at Lions Park.

Jacobs missed a shutout when a walk coupled with two Lions errors allowed Post a run in the sixth inning.

It was the first Oil Belt win of the year for the cellar-dwelling Lions, who had lost seven straight league decisions.

Jacobs, who has been hurling in the Cotton Belt league, struck out eight men, walked three and hit one batsman.

The lone run off the husky 18-year-old righthander came in the sixth when Louis Mills walked and attempted to steal second. Catcher Melvin Earsley's low throw went into centerfield, where Centerfielder Bob Harvick let it get through him as Mills raced on around to score.

Slaton picked up single runs in the third and sixth innings, then exploded for six tallies in the seventh. In the big scoring spurge, Jacobs led off with a single. John Paul Jones doubled, then Harvick drew a walk. C. E. McCoy singled, after which Dampier Weaver tripled, driving Post Pitcher Bill Holcomb to the showers. Jess Cornell drew a walk from Bill Ramage, the Miller relief hurler, was sacrificed to second, then scored as Jesse Fullerton was safe on an error.

Weaver, with a triple, double and single, sparked Slaton's ninth-inning attack. McCoy and Earsley had two safeties each.

Friday night the Lions defeated Sandlin Brothers Grocery of Lubbock 12-1 in an exhibition game. Charles Presley was the winning pitcher. Sunday the Lions meet Levelland in an afternoon game there.

Woman Is Saved By Slaton Man

A local railroad man, M. G. Weeden, switchman for the Santa Fe, who lives at 110 South 3rd Street, saved the life of an elderly woman in Dallas last week when he rescued her from the path of a freight train in the Dallas freight yards.

Here is the account as published in the Dallas News:

A young railroad switchman named M. G. Weeden Wednesday snatched an 80-year-old grandmother from the path of an approaching steam engine as the old lady walked slowly home from church.

At nightfall, Mrs. Frank Torti, of 401 South Carroll, was at St. Paul's Hospital with nothing worse than bruises and mild shock after her rescue.

Weeden lives at 4311 San Jacinto and is twenty-nine years old. From the cowcatcher of a Santa Fe switch engine, he saw Mrs. Torti just about to cross the tracks at Carroll. The old lady was returning from mass at St. Edward's Catholic Church, Hill and Elm. Her daughter, Mrs. Aida LaBelle of the same address, had gone on ahead, and Mrs. Torti was alone.

The engine, moving at three miles an hour, and the old lady approached each other.

"We had the bell ringing and the fireman saw the woman," Weeden said. "They blew the whistle but she never looked up, just kept coming on."

Weeden grabbed the angle iron on the engine tightly in his right hand. He leaned out in front as far as he could. His left arm circled the waist of Mrs. Torti and he lifted her bodily from the ground and turned to set her off the track.

The momentum swung him around and his hand struck the water tank on the side of the locomotive. He lost his grip and Mrs. Torti fell to the ground—out of the path of the engine.

"I had hollered for the engineer to 'big hole it' (put on the emergency air brakes)," Weeden said. "She came to a stop, and I ran to the house on the corner and yelled for someone to get a doctor."

Mrs. LaBelle, the daughter, came to the door. She called an ambulance, and went to offer help. When she did, she saw for the first time that it was her mother.

Attendants at St. Paul said Mrs. Torti's condition was not too serious.

The rest of the crew, R. E. Newman and M. L. Essay, and Mrs. LaBelle agreed that Weeden had saved Mrs. Torti's life.

Weeden himself had to quit work because of the injury to his hand. But X-rays proved no bones were broken.

Slaton Will Be Less Than 5,000 If Additional Names Not Found

Local Scout Will Attend Jamboree At Valley Forge

Willie Medwin Gattis, son of Mr. and Mrs. W. C. Gattis of 320 W. Crosby, will join some 55,000 Boy Scouts from almost every country of the world at Valley Forge, Pennsylvania, June 21 through July 9, for the Second National Jamboree of the Boy Scouts of America.

Medwin has been an outstanding scout for a number of years and now has a first class rating. He is fourteen years old.

Scouts from the South Plains area will gather at a training camp at Reese Air Force Base, Lubbock, on June 21 for three days prior to their leaving for Fort Worth where they will join Scouts from the Southwest. Enroute to and from the Jamboree, side trips will take the boys to points of interest, including Chicago, Washington, D. C., New York City, and Niagara Falls.

The huge gathering will be held on the site where George Washington and his Continental Army troops spent the winter of 1777-78. Valley Forge is just 28 miles from Philadelphia.

All boys will be set up in patrols and troops as self-sufficient units. Equipment will be bought by the boys, and food issued by a central depot. It has been estimated that the camp will use 400 tons of food daily, 800,000 gallons of water and handle 100,000 pieces of mail each day.

L. D. Whiteley, district superintendent of the census bureau, reported this week that the last check on the Slaton figures shows the count is slightly less than 5,000. COCCIDIOSIS IS FEARED DISEASE

Coccidiosis is the best-known and most-feared poultry disease. It occurs almost everywhere, and in many cases it takes a heavy toll. Caused by a tiny, one-celled protozoan, coccidiosis is a disease that is characterized by rather typical symptoms—listlessness, droopiness, rickety neck, and slumping posture. In the cecal (bloody) type of coccidiosis, the appearance of bloody droppings is typical.

Mortality Is High

Mortality is frequently high in outbreaks of cecal coccidiosis. The disease also causes definite setbacks to surviving birds and creates a large number of worthless culls. The intestinal type of coccidiosis, while not so deadly, nevertheless causes much economic loss to poultry-raisers. This type of coccidiosis may affect slightly-old birds and may carry on in the form of a chronic form.

Prevention of coccidiosis depends on a number of things: sanitation and medication. Poultry houses and grounds should be kept as free of filth as possible. Since the coccidia which cause the disease thrive in warm, damp surroundings, care should be taken to keep litter dry and to clean chickens on clean, well-drained ground.

Medication Aids Control

Preventive medication is available which will largely prevent outbreaks of coccidiosis. Give a low dosage in the feed or drinking water, these medications cost little compared to the cost of a serious outbreak of coccidiosis.

Medication for control of outbreaks is also available, of course. If properly administered at first signs of disease, a good medication will check the spread of the disease quickly and will save the owner a considerable amount

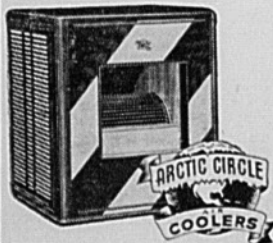

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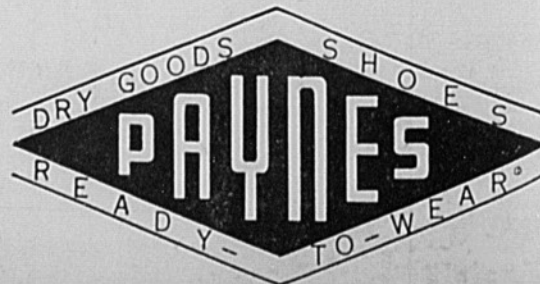

The identity of the men is known, says the Banner, since they are familiar police characters. All that is needed is the testimony of witnesses. The donor of the \$50 reward is anonymous. —Hockley County Herald.

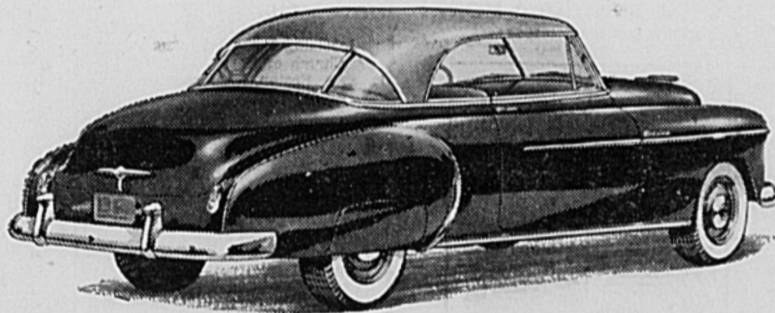

Prospects for 186 rural families getting electric service were advanced greatly with approval of a new REA loan of \$285,000 to the Deaf Smith County Electric Cooperative, Inc. T. E. Seigler, Jr., president of the Board of Directors, announced Saturday. The new loan will be used for constructing new single phase line, system improvements, and a new Headquarters Building. The Cooperative now has 1,341 miles of power lines which bring electric service to 2,057 consumers. Upon completion of its present building plans, the system will be increased to 1,458 miles of rural lines serving 2,158 consumers, the president said.

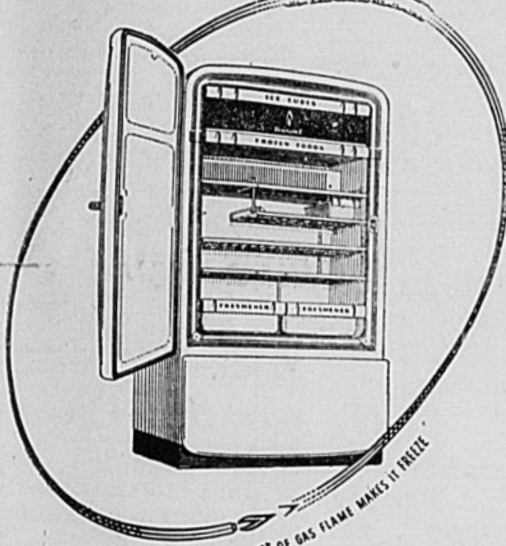

Slaton Women Give Their Favorite Tested Recipes

Another grand meat dish recipe comes to us this week, and this time from Mrs. John Cobb. Her recipe is called simply "Spanish Steak" and the ingredients sound like a flavor-full meal within themselves.

Ingredients for the dish, which serves 12, call for:
4 lbs. round steak cut 2 inches thick
2 to 3 carrots diced
1 chopped Mexican pepper
1 green pepper chopped
1 to 2 onions diced
1 to 2 canned pimentos chopped
2 cups tomatoes
1/2 cup cooking fat
flour
salt and pepper
Rub meat with salt and pepper. Pound all flour possible into the steak and sear in hot fat. Add remaining ingredients. Cover. Simmer slowly for about 3 hours or until meat is tender. If desired peas, celery, celery salt, spice, and one-half cup finely diced salt pork may be added to give variety in flavor.
Pat says that the secret of getting that really wonderful Span-

ish flavor to the steak is in the three-hour simmering. "By that time the meat is well seasoned all the way through," she explained. She also suggested that this particular recipe is ideal for a dinner party as it is not only different from those dishes we eat every day, but it is also very convenient since you can get your meat cooking while the other finishing touches to the party or company arrangements are being made.

We Need More Recreation . . .

While some of our old established diseases that used to be easily recognized and diagnosed by the country doctors, such as small pox, typhoid fever and malaria, have just about been whipped by modern science, the insane asylums are crowded to the walls and more people are cracking up mentally than ever before.

The strain of modern life is driving a lot of folks off the brink into something worse than death and the ever increasing tempo of traffic, political intrigue, atomic weapons and noise is making things worse and worse.

In this part of the world where some of the strain is as taut as it is in the closer populated area we do not feel the effects as much as people do in the East and on the Pacific coast, but the evils are creeping up on us and will envelope every part of the United States before long.

There is very little to break the monotony in West Texas, there are no large recreation parks, no rivers or mountains, few trees and the leisure time that is available to us is on our hands unless we get in cars and head for other parts. The more movement from place to place in West Texas than in other localities and it is said that people in West Texas will go further to see less than people will in any part of the country.

We need more recreation facilities, less propoganda about politics and world affairs and a healthier outlook on things we'll be as screwy as folks from New York.

Plan Now For The Future . . .

Slaton is a good town and is improving. The things that are done now, or left undone, will mar or improve the living conditions of Slaton in the years to come.

It is most likely that improvements could be made in many of the public services now at a nominal cost that would be much more expensive in the future. It is probable that even if an adequate water supply for the town were available it would be of great benefit for the water system we now have would not moderate much more water than it now carries. Most of our streets are being laid over water mains that would have been abandoned or torn up if the town should grow to any extent. The gas mains are probably of the same caliber.

Our sewer system would not stand much more load than it is now carrying and it is most certain that our storm sewer system needs attention.

It would probably be cheaper to plan and lay adequate sewers now than it would in the near future and most certainly cheaper to do so now than it would be ten or fifteen years hence.

The West side of town and the citizens of Slaton do not wait until the people who live on the West side of the square have hundreds of thousands of dollars worth of property abandoned or torn up if the town should grow to any extent. 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We Make The Same Mistakes? . . .

Will Slaton be the weed capitol of West Texas again and fall or will the property owners show more sanitation and the appearance of the town.

Now is the best time to chop down the heavy growth and grass in vacant lots and back alleys.

City Health Officer, W. E. Payne, warned several weeks ago that this is the time of the year that polio begins to spread and that germs of most all kinds breed faster in the summer than at any other time of the year.

Clean up and paint up is an old story and perhaps a bit out of date but whether it is called a clean up and pin up cannot, Slaton people need to stop and consider the sanitation of the town, now.

The business firms of the town seem to be more concerned with their business homes than ever before. There are still a lot of old signs and poorly painted places in Slaton that need to be taken as a whole Slaton now presents a better appearance than most towns in West Texas, but the vacant lots and back alleys are not as clean as they should be.

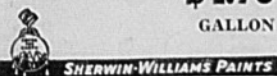

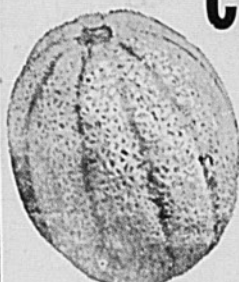

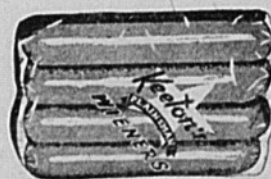
