In heat stroke, the temperature is very high—107 or over—the skin is hot and dry, the face is flushed, and the patient is unconscious. In heat exhaustion, the temperature may be subnormal or only slightly elevated, and the skin is moist, sometimes cool and clammy. Heat tramps are severe painful spasms cramps are severe, painful spasms of the muscles. First aid for heat stroke is immediate cold water baths or spray and cold compresses. 




