# Santa Fe Starts Construction On The New Controls

Work has begun on the installation of centralized traffic control on the 160 miles of Santa Fe line between Slaton and Sweetwater. Four signal gangs, totalling about 80 men, are employed now putting in one of the most modern of train control systems ever devised. When completed, the entire stretch of railroad between Slaton and Sweetwater will be controlled from a machine at Slaton. A Present plans call for the machine to be in place at Slaton by May 5, as the track and signal installations are completed toward Sweetwater, the system will be cut-in for operation station by station. By late fall, possibly October 1, Santa Fe officials expect to have the entire system in operation.

E. P. Dudley, assistant General Manager, at Amarillo, in announcing the project said the Santa Fe expects to increase the capacity of the line to within 80 per cent of double track. Operation of the C.T.C. system will permit raising the speed limits of both passenger and freight trains and will make for a much faster and more flexible rallroad operation.

Mr. Dudley explained that the modernization step was made because of the large growth in business in Texas and the emergence of the Slaton-Sweetwater line as a trimary Santa Fe route.

"We just recently announced the lieselization of the entire route etween Denver and South Texas a through freight service via Amaillo and Lubbock, and the modrnization of this portion of the laton Division will enable us to btain the fullest effeciency and seed from this freight train opation." Mr. Dudley said.



#### Poor Nutrition Leads To Disease

A poultryman doesn't have to be

A poultryman doesn't have to be an expert on nutrition, but he should be familiar with some of the symptoms of nutritional deficiencies. It's just another part of his job as a poultry-raiser.

Today, with a strict competitive situation in commercially-mixed poultry rations, nutritional deficencies resulting from inadequate diets are rarer — but they still appear occasionally, because some poultry-raisers mix their own rations.

Learning to recognize symptoms of poor nutrition will enable the poultryman to save many a chicken — and many more piolits. Here are some of the commonest symptoms.

#### Lack Of Vitmain-A

The vitamin-A deficiency shows up as a roup-like condition of the nostrils, eyes, and face. In a postmortem examination of a bird this condition is revealed by many tiny white spots in the esophagus, or sullet.

Another common form of nutri-tional deficiency is curly-toe paral-ysis. A chick in this condition can-not stand or walk, and the toes become tightly-curled-back, Curly-toe is caused by lack of vitamin G (riboflavin).

Slipped tendon also appears quite often. This is usually recognized when the large tendon of the leg slips off to the side, giving the hock a misshapen appearance. It is caused by lack of manganese in the diet.

Rickets, of course, is rather well-known among nutritional deficien-cies. This disease results in weak, rubbery legs and beaks. Lack of vitamin-D in the diet causes this condition,

Scabby Skin Indicates Dermatitis Another warnnig sign of disease

resulting from inadequate diet is rough and scabby skin, which usually indicates dermatitis. Particular spots affected by dermatitis are the face and corners of the mouth, the area around the vent, and the bottoms of the feet. This skin disease is brought about by a shortage of pantothenic acid or riboflavin. riboflavin.

In correcting these nutritional In correcting these nutritional diseases, it is wise to consult reliable sources (nutritionists, etc.) before making any definite changes in the diet. Of course, the use of any recognized commercial ration is recommended, since such feeds are practically 100 per cent are practically 100 per cent complete in nutritive value
