Slaton's 9th Annual Lubbock County Stock Show To Be "Best Ever" Held

F.F.A. And 4-H Boys To Take Over Town On Saturday Mar. 11

The program for the 9th Annual Lubbock County Stock Show, that is to be held in Slaton at the Athletic Field, Saturday, March 11th, is on the press and will be ready for distribution several days before the big event.

There will be bigger and better prizes awarded at the 1950 Show than have ever been offered before and it is expected that there will be more and better calves, hogs, and lambs at this show than have ever been at any of the previous shows. If the weather permits there will be more people at the show than have ever attended any of the previous in eight shows.

The first Lubbock County Stock Show was held in Slaton mainly through the efforts of A. C. Strickland, Sr., who has given much of his time and a lot of hard work to the shows each year and its present popularity is, in part, due to Mr. Strickland's efforts.

All 4-H and F.F.A. boys who live in Lubbock County, the Wilson and Southland School Districts are eligible to show their animals.

Calf Scramble A Feature

One of the most popular features of the Lubbock County Stock Show is the Calf Scramble which takes place each year immediately after the Stock Judging is done. This year ten business firms will supply calves that will be assembled at the Stock Show. Any member of the F.F.A. or 4-H Club who wishes to do so may enter the contest. Those who are able to catch and throw a calf will be allowed to keep the calf they corral.

Firms that are donating the calves are: Slaton Motor Co., Slaton Chamber of Commerce, Slaton American Legion, Slaton Post #10, the V.F.W., Ray C. Ayers & Son, Inc., Western Cottonoil Co., Berkley and Haddock, E. L. Huffelder & Son, Southwestern Public Service Company and the Citizens State Bank.

Judging of the stock will be done by Ray C. Mowery, head of the Animal Husbandry Department of Texas Technological College.

Stock Show officers include Robert H. Davis, president; Jess M. Johnson, first vice president; Harvey E. Owens, second vice president; P. G. Meading, secretary; treasurer; A. C. Strickland, Sr., superintendent of show; and Joe W. Jones, assistant superintendent of show.

There will be no charge for attendance. The show will take place Saturday, March 11 at the Slaton Athletic Field and the judging will start at 1:00 p. m. Entries will start at 10:00 a. m.

Oil Production Moves Steadily Into Distrist Southeast Of Slaton Area

Local Farmer For 45 Years Gives Ideas About Dry Weather Farming

Considering that Judge Smith has been in these "parts" for 45 years and that he made his first crop here in '25, it seems logical that he should have many ideas on the finer points of farming which might prove valuable to other agriculturists.

The name "Judge" has nothing to do with Mr. Smith's profession, it's his actual name. "It was given to me at birth," he says, "and I've kept it even though I didn't like it."

Asked if he felt the prospects for this year's crops were good,

Smith explained that a man would have to live a life time to see crops like last year's. "No," he continued, "this crop can't be as good as the last. I've never in all the time I've been out here known a winter to be warmer, but I've known many to be drier; so I haven't anything like given up."

According to the Farm Program, the government is going to force farmers to cut down on their cotton crops and diversify them with something else. Judge says he is planning to plant Maritn's Maize, but nothing else other than cotton in abundance. He says he believes this will be the trend with most of the farmers.

Asked what methods he had found most successful in dealing with dry weather farming, Mr. Smith says he always tries to get as near to the water level as possible with contour plowing. "I claim to be the man who started contour plowing," he jested, "and strictly because I never could plow a straight line."

In discussing the problems of the drought conditions, Judge gave his personal solution as "deep plowing, from eighteen to twenty-four inches." A farm program today will pay farmers so much for terracing and deep plowing. "If a farmer will do it," Smith says, "the government will help finance it, and it really pays off in the long run."

Asked what he thought farmers in this area should do in case the drought conditions last until the planting season, he said, "Well it may not be the wisest thing and many disagree with me, but I plan to cultivate and prepare my beds for planting. I think that bed preparation is half of the crop."

Many farmers in this area are increasing their water wells for crop irrigation. Mr. Smith feels that this year will determine whether or not the water supply will hold out. "If it holds out this year with so many more using the irrigation method, then I feel that the water supply will be alright."

Four Proven Wells Are Now Producing On Basinger Place

Oil prospects for the Slaton area are progressively increasing. Four oil producing wells have been recently brought in on the Basinger Ranch by the Brown and Brown Co. The Basinger Ranch is located only fifteen miles southeast of Slaton.

A fifth well is reported to be going in one mile east of the Basinger field and it is believed that a wildcat well is also to be begun.

Most of the land in that vicinity is already leased to the oil companies, and some royalties are being sold. It was rumored that in one instance that a quarter of the royalties on 160 acres was recently sold for \$100,000; and in another instance a quarter of the royalties was sold four miles from the above field on a fifty acre plot for \$40 an acre.

However, a local real estate agent seems to be of the opinion that mineral rights should not be sold in that area for less than \$50 an acre and that this amount should be the extreme minimum.

The fact that land around the Lubbock-Slaton Post area is now seldom for sale except under certain circumstances is evidence that property owners are of the belief that oil may be produced here in the near future.

What little land that has been sold was released with the original owner reserving one-half of the mineral rights, non-participating; that is, the former owner would receive half of the mineral money in case oil was found, but he would have no part in the oil lease money.

A Slaton real estate agent said that land in the south part of Slaton would not lease four years ago; in fact, this particular agent stated that south Slaton land was leasing this year for the first time after having failed for the past four years.

Reports issued by O. R. Watkins, business manager for the Levelland School District, showed that \$316,128.51, or 94.07 per cent of the district's school taxes had been paid by Jan. 31.

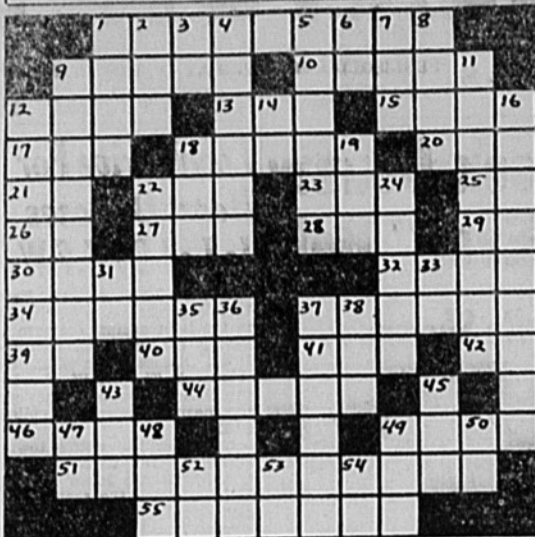
First Use of Wheel

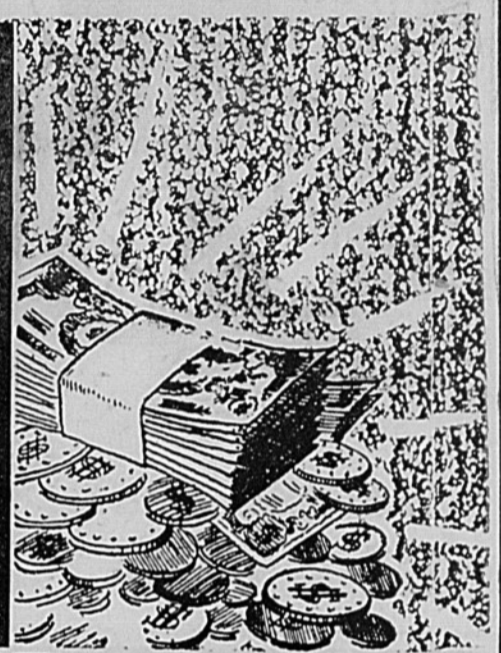

Is Socialism Here? . . .

A survey made by a newspaper trade magazine of several hundred editors of both daily and weekly newspaper editors, show that eighty-five per cent of them believe that the United States is drifting toward socialism or has already crossed the border line between private enterprise and socialism.

Most of them believe that the majority of the people do not want socialism, in fact they state that those who are responsible for the trend do not want it but that selfish interest in big business and among some classes of labor are battling it out and that they will be responsible for the downfall of individualism in the United States.

As long as the Government can keep the quarrel between labor and capital confined to the two combatants the fight will go on but when the Government takes over key industries, then, labor and the Government will have to make peace or the Government will have to use force. Should this ever happen we will have socialism, communism, fascism or something kin to the three isms. They all add up to about the same thing.

Getting Ready For The Sand . . .

Farmers in this area are beginning to worry about the continued drought and many of them are preparing for emergencies as far as they can in such circumstances.

A number of ideas in mechanical equipment have been developed by ingenious farmers in this area including short rotary knives set on a long core, known as sand fighters. These are vicious looking outfits and probably could be used for defense purposes should another war come.

Its Easy To Shop In Slaton . . .

Do people in this area appreciate Slaton as much as they should? Slaton is fast becoming a better place to shop than Lubbock, our stores are carrying more and better merchandise than they ever carried, prices are as low or lower than they are in Lubbock and, if time and convenience are considered, Slaton is by far the best place in this area to shop. The parking problem in Lubbock has become almost a nightmare with the downtown stores harder to get to now than the North Pole used to be. If a motorist gets his car within a half mile of the place he wishes to visit he is lucky, and this usually takes five to six miles of extra driving in the craziest kind of traffic.

Perhaps the new lights that have arrows pointing up, down, sideways and two at once, have helped but to the driver who first tries to make the maze it is enough to drive him insane before he can figure out what it is all about.

Slaton may not have a great many traffic rules but if you want to park here you can do so. If there's no room at the curbing just pick out a good spot in the middle of the street and make every one else drive around you. It's dangerous but we do not have as many accidents in proportion as the folks do in Lubbock, which proves that the more complicated things get the worse they are. In Slaton its every driver for him or herself.

Fair Employment And Discrimination . . .

Discrimination in employment is so prevalent, and it exists on so many different levels and in so many different ways, that the proponents of FEPC (Fair Employment Practices) are restricting the field lamentably when they imply that only Jews, Catholics, Negroes, and foreigners are discriminated against. No one disputes the fact that, in hiring and firing, many individuals are discriminated against for no reason other than their race, religion, or national origin. But that is discrimination in its broadest and most obvious form. It is only the beginning.

The barrier of sex has crumbled greatly in the Twentieth Century, but discrimination against women can still be found in every field and on every level of employment. Men are often employed to manage a woman's dress shop, but no woman is ever employed to manage a haberdashery. Men often teach in women's colleges, but women never teach in men's colleges. When an employer has a vacancy for a menial job at low pay, he usually looks for a woman to fill it. Men and women often work side by side, at the same job and under the same conditions, but the man's pay check is usually substantially the larger. Women of established ability are denied executive jobs in many companies solely because of their sex. In some instances they actually fill the position but without the dignity of the executive title.

Discrimination is a part of the very warp and woof of human nature. Frequently it is based on ignorance and prejudice, but some of the time it goes much deeper. It is often wrong. It is almost never fair. But it exists and it cannot be wiped out by law.

But the very fact, however, that discrimination is so prevalent is all the more reason for opposing a Federal FEPC. Discrimination cannot be controlled by law. It can only be controlled by custom, through the process of education. Every individual has the right to gainful employment, but there is no more justification in forcing an employer to give employment to a man whom he does not want to hire than there is in forcing another man to work for an employer for whom he does not want to work. We have a minimum wage law. What is to prevent us from one day having a maximum wage law, as detrimental to employers as to employees? If the Government can tell an employer whom he must hire, what is to prevent it from telling the laborer where and for whom he must work? The ultimate outcome of such coercion is totalitarianism.

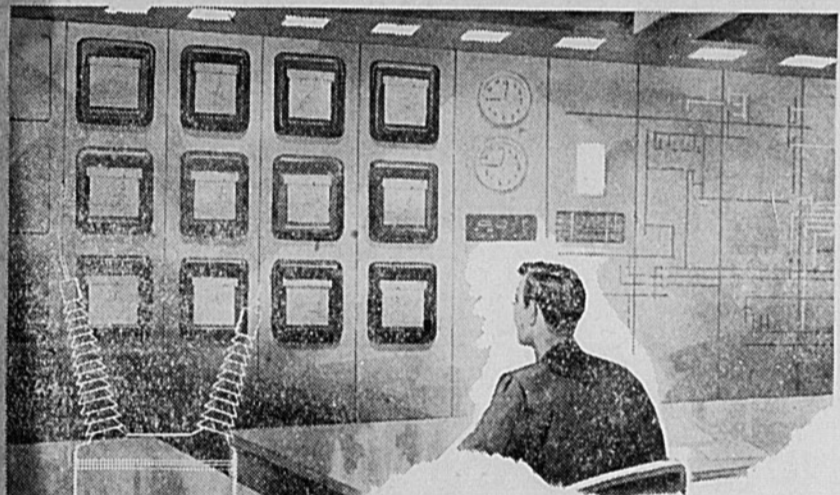

Congressman Mahon Makes Recent Plea To Preserve Peace

"The preservation of peace should be the number one objective of Congress and the American people," Congressman George Mahon, Representative of the 19th District, said this week in Washington.

The statement followed a series of meeting of top military leaders with the Committee on Military Appropriations of which Mahon is chairman.

"Despite the fact that within recent months Russia has developed an atomic bomb and overrun China, the over-all Military Program for this country has not been greatly changed," Mahon continues. "Our whole problem of national defense should be re-examined in the light of these events. It is true that the Military Forces of this country on land, sea and in the air are in a better state of readiness for immediate combat now than at any time since the demobilization following World War II, but our forces are smaller than last year."

On account of the inadequacy of funds and on account of the impact which a large military establishment would have upon the economy of the United States, this country is not undertaking to

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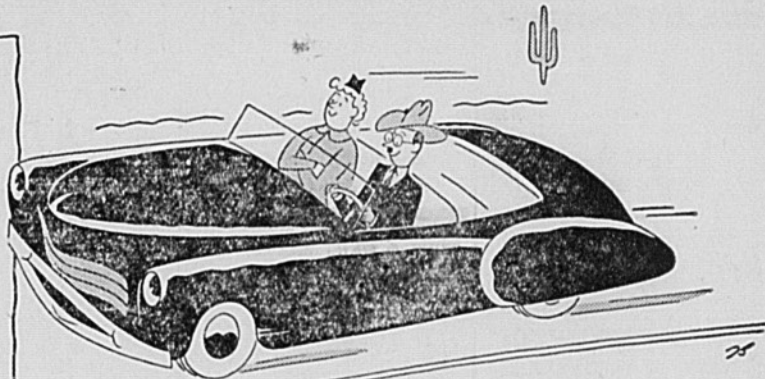


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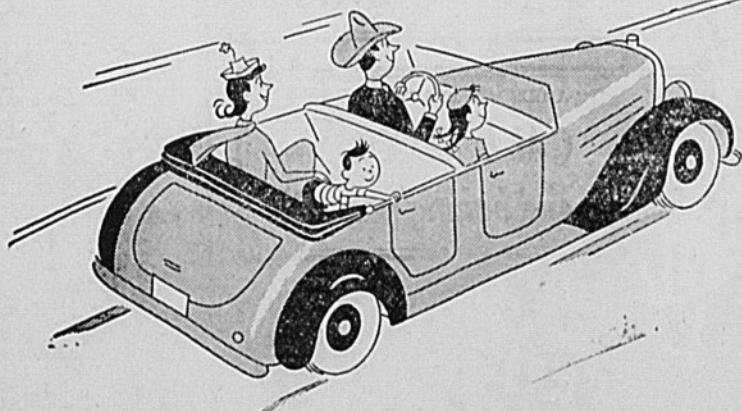

The first semi-documentary story of Billy the Kid ever to reach the screen is told in the Universal-International technicolor film "The Kid From Texas," showing Sunday and Monday, March 5 and 6, at the Slaton Theatre.

Three previous filmizations, allegedly of the Kid's life, were highly romanticized versions or out-and-out Hollywood dream-ups, in the opinion of researchers identified with this newest production. Audie Murphy, most decorated hero of World War II, has the role of Billy in Universal-International's semi-documentary, co-starring with Gale Storm and supported by such sterling actors as Albert Dekker, William Talman, Frank Wilcox, Robert Barrat and others. Murphy is ideally cast for the role, being the same wistful type that research showed Billy to be and possessing incredible ability in the handling of guns.

The film, despite its tragic ending, is refreshing in its honest narration and its refusal to succumb to Hollywood's fondness for the boy-and-girl pattern. There is action galore and excellent acting, especially by the top principals. The story opens with William Bonney, better known as Billy the Kid, becoming involved in the notorious Lincoln County range war of the late '70s and losing his heart to the lovely Gale Storm, who is the young bride of the middle-aged Albert Dekker. Billy's unrequited lover never comes close to fruition in the story, and his eventual realization that Gale's world can never be his, leads to his death before the gun of Sheriff Pat Garrett, who snuffs out the lives of twenty-one men, in the picture—the exact amount claimed by his blazing guns in real life. He finds a true friend in an Englishman named Jameson, played well by Shepperd Strudwick who gives The Kid a job and a chance to live peacefully. When Jameson is murdered by trail tramps Billy goes berserk in a mad quest for vengeance and kills in wholesale lots.

When at length Billy is trapped and laid low, Sheriff Garrett is heard to express wonderment that the Kid didn't even try to draw. A few minutes before his death Billy had seen the light of his life dancing with an Army officer and had given up hope.
