Need Efficiency

Because their egg enterprise is merely incidental to the farm operation, many producers in Texas don't have good poultry equipment. This creates a big problem in profitable egg production.

For one thing, 85% of Texas flocks are less than 200 birds. Only 2% consists of 400 or more hens. That information is included in a report by R. B. Halpin and Q. M. Morgan of Texas A&M College department of agricultural economics and sociology. sociology.

A laying house, for example, eed not be elaborate or expenive to provide needed comfort or the birds. Yet, one-third of the
lock owners provide no laying

louse whatever.

Laying mash is essential to consistent production, but two out of hree poultrymen cut it out in cerain months. About 23% feed no hash at all.

Replacement chicks are bought a March or April by 61% of the lock owners, but on Jan. 1, 1948, here were no pullets in 59% of the laying flocks. Pullets are usally more profitable than older ens.

Overcrowding of nests increases to number of broken, cracked or irty eggs. Yet five out of six oultrymen fail to provide one set for every six hens.

Oil Wells In The Front Yard

While there is little that can be done about oil development near Slaton, if there is oil in the ground in this area, it might be a good idea to stop and consider the fact that most all of the land to the east of Slaton is being leased at the highest prices ever offered for leases on this land.

If oil production should do to Slaton what it has to Snyder it would be almost a catastrophe. Post is fast becoming overcrowded and it looks as if oil derricks will be in everyone's backyard in that town. Post has always been a good town; a substantial example of the tenacity, and the proof of what a West Texas town should be. Post has always been a typical cow town and folks who live there have had the right to claim their town as a pioneer town of the West. It is a shame to see it made into a stinking oil town and there are many reasons for people who live in Slaton to look askance at the possibility of having oil wells churning in their back yards, in the cemetery and on the City Hall lawn in Slaton.

Slaton Can Use More Paving

Although Slaton probably has more paving than any town in West Texas, there are still many streets that could and should be paved and it is said that several members of the City council have considered a proposition to place a bond issue before the voters of Slaton to have more money put aside to do

such work.

If you are for making Slaton a cleaner and better
place to live it might be a good idea to speak to your commissioner in favor of such a proposition.

Shop, Gossip, Speed In Slaton

Where do you do your shopping? Slaton is fast becoming a better place to shop than Lubbock is and the more you buy in Slaton and the better merchandise you demand, the better and more varied will be the kind of merchandise you will receive.

There are so many places in which to shop in Lubbock that it is confusing to even try to look around through the many shopping centers, their prices are so varied that you do not know whether you are getting gypped or are getting bargains, the traffic problem is so great that it takes a half a day to visit three stores and you will walk several miles doing so.

You take your life in your hands when you cross a Lubbock street and the pedestrians are fair targets out on 19th street where it is a question of the quick and the dead.

The shoppers in Slaton are allowed to park in the middle of the street, turn in the middle of the block and block the entire street with a truck. It is not against the rules to stop your car next to a friend's car on any street in town and do your week's gossiping. There are no rules against teen agers playing ditch the contender's car and it is O.K. to go through town at 60 miles per hour.

Shopping is slightly hazardous here, but it is not as big a risk as it is in Lubbock and most of the time the prices are better in Slaton. Try doing your shopping in Slaton, you'll get your money's worth.

Slaton Has Its Advantages

What are the requirements for an ideal town? Should it be large or small, crowded or spread out, fast moving or leisurely?

If laws are enforced to the strictest rules many people will complain that the town or city is too slow; if some of the regulations are overlooked, the criminal elements are quick to take advantage of conditions and soon gambling and crimes of all kinds are rampant.

The larger the town the more danger one is in not only from robbery, attacks by hoodlums, but also from traffic

only from robbery, attacks by hoodiums, but also from traffic hazards.

If the people in a community cease to try to make their town more attractive to more people the town soon becomes smaller and if the citizens become too industrious the evils described above become greater.

Slaton is the size town now that is just irght in many ways, most of the people are law abiding; while there are a few robberies now and then, this danger has not become a major risk, traffic accidents are few although the hazards seem greater than they are in most communities, there are enough amusements to provide enough but not too much excitements. In fact, Slaton is a mightly fine place in which to live, but if too many people find this out then Slaton might become as crowded, as infested with crime, as aggressive, as rich and as dangerous a place in which to live as Lubbock. We should watch our step.


