When it comes time for a manetrimming session at Boy's Ranch in Amarillo, Texas, the job usually falls to one of the boys in the tonsorial department of the Ranch vocational school.

Several of the older boys are learning the barbering trade, and with over 120 victims to practice on, they are becoming quite proficient. Only the art of shaving is neglected at present because no staff member is willing to risk an ear or Adam's apple.

In addition to barbering, the boys at Boy's Ranch have the opportunity to learn carpentry, automobile mechanics and shoe repair. The list of trades being taught now is small, but it is hoped that a vocational school can be built in the very near future where 12 or 14 trades can be taught.



Feather-bedding scheme of Firemen's Union to put an additional fireman on diesel locomotives has been

Fact Finding Boards appointed by Presidents Roosevelt and Truman have said these demands were "devoid of merit" and they were

Now the Firemen's leaders seek to paralyze railroad transportation to compel the railroads to employ a wholly unnecessary additional fireman to ride on diesel locomotives. This scheme is plain

called a nationwide strike starting with four great railroads on April 26. These railroads are the New York Central, Pennsylvania, Santa Fe, and Southern.

The union claim that a second fireman needed on grounds of safety hypocrisy. Safety has been dragged into this dispute only in an unsuccessful effort to give a cloak of respectability to vicious feather-bedding demands.

After a careful study of the first demands of this union, a Presidential Fact Finding Board on May 21, 1943, reported to President Roosevelt that there was no need for an extra fireman on diesel locomotives.

Again, on September 19, 1949, after a second hearing on the union leaders' demands, a second Board reported to President Truman that: "there presently exists no need for an additional fireman . . . upon either the ground of safety or that of efficiency and economy of operation."

> Safety Record of Diesels is Outstandingly Good

Although the railroads accepted the Board findings, the union leaders have brazenly rejected them. They represent that an

extra fireman is needed for "safety" rea sons. Here's what the Board had to say on that point:

"The safety and on-time performance of diesel electric locomotives operated under current rules have been notably

good . . . "Upon careful analysis of the data submitted on safety, we have concluded that no valid reasons have been shown as a support for the Brotherhood proposal under which a fireman would be required to be at all times continuously in the cab of road diesels. The proposal must be rejected."

The real reason behind these demands is that the union leaders are trying to make jobs where there is no work. In other words, a plain case of "feather-bedding." The railroads have no intention of yielding to these wasteful make-work demands.

Slaton Women GiveTheir Favorite Tested Recipes

First we must correct a mis-take made in last week's recipe for chocolate ice box pudding. The ingredient list should have read: 8 well beaten egg yolks, and 8 stiffly beaten egg whites— rather than whites in both plac-es.

This week's recipe is one which has been recommended to us by several as being especially good, although Mrs. Claud Porter, who gave it to us, says, "It's just plain ordinary Devil's Food Cake."

- Ingredients call for:
 3/4 cups oleo
 2 cups sugar
 3 eggs, well beaten
 1 tablespoon vanilla
 2/3 cup sifted cocoa
 1 cup sweet milk
 3 cups sifted flour
 1 package dry yeast
 1/4 cup lukewarm water
 1/4 teaspoon sugar
 1 teaspoon baking soda
 1/4 cup warm water

1/4 cup warm water

Cream oleo and sugar and add beaten eggs, vanilla and cocoa. Next, add portions of the milk and four alternately. Mix yeast in 1/4 cup luke warm water with 1/4 teaspoon sugar and allow to stand five minutes until soft, then stir yeast into above sugar, flour, oleo, etc., mixture.

Cover batter and let stand over night in cool place. Next morning dissolve baking soda in remaining 1/4 cup warm water and add to cake mixture. If batter is too thick add a little more warm water.

Bake at once in a moderately.

Bake at once in a moderately hot oven, about 350 degrees F, for twenty-five minutes or until done. Put the layers together with soft white or fudge frost-

 1/4 pound butter
 4 ounces chocolate
 1 teaspon vanilla
 1 cup nuts finely chopped

Melt butter and add chocolate, Melt butter and add chocolate, cooking until chocolate is thorocoughly melted. To chocolate and butter add milk and sugar and boil until soft ball forms in cold water. Remove from fire and place pan in larger pan of cold water and beat until frosting thickens. Stir in vanilla and nuts and pour over cake while still warm.

WILL TIGER TOWN WORK?

Now that the Slaton Youth Center, known as "Tiger Town," has finally had its formal opening, another problem arises—that of making it a real and working success. This of course can be done with the complete cooperation of parents and students

alike. First of all, parents of teen age youngsters should realize the important role a successful youth center can play. It is only natural for young people to want to be with others of their own ages and to have a place to meet, chat and have fun in general.

general.

Teen age youngsters cannot be entertained with childhood games, and still they are not ready to take up the more stable and less energetic life of adults. And for this reason they are happier when they are together doing the things which might appeal to them at the moment whether this happens to be talking together, playing dominoes or cards or ping pong, or merely drinking a coke and listening to the latest record of Harry James.

In order for a person to grow up normally and happily, he must learn how to get along with other people, and he must be accepted by them. In short, he must be liked; and to be liked he must be around many, many people and learn how to act, how to talk courtesly yet without shynes, and how to express his personality and sense of humor.

Young people have a tendancy to place themselves in one particular group of friends, and from here they often become clickish and sometimes snobbish without even meaning to be. But if Tiger Town is patronized by most of the teen agers, it will help break down this barrier and it will help more youngsters grow up without having felt left out of school activities.

But the complete success of the youth center will not be determined entirely by whether or not parents approve of their youngsters going to Tiger Town. A lot of it will depend upon each individual student himself. Unless the student is intereted and wants to be friendly when he goes to the center, he can't expect people to beg him to have a good time.

Yet the teen agers should caution themselves against being over aggressive. A person who is too loud, too boisterous is neither cute nor impressive.

Often times youngsters are so anxious for attention and so anxious to be noticed that they will go to any extreme to find it—even to the extent of damaging property. Slaton students should remember that obtaining a youth center has taken a great deal of work, effort, planning and hard-to-get money; and a lot of people have worked hard to get it for them. Much of the furniture in the building is used furniture, and unless it is taken care of it will not last long.

It must be remembered that Tiger Town belongs to Slaton youths. They must develop a sense of responsibility toward it, and must have the desire to keep it a place to be enjoyed.

Slaton Needs More Industries

What would happen to Slaton should the railroad shops close down and the Division headquarters be moved away is a question that has been coming up at intervals ever since the town was founded.

question that has been coming up at intervals ever since the town was founded.

It is probable that the Santa Fe would have a tough time moving the Division headquarters if they should want to do so however there is no indication that any such plans are being contemplated. With building materials at the present prices and real estate equally as costly there is little or no danger of such a thing happening, however the closing down or practical closing down of the shops is another proposition. With diesel engines coming more and more into use the type of shop that is in Slaton will become more and more obsolete and should diesels become universal in use then the shops here will likely become inactive. To some extent the diesels have already had marked effect on the shop here.

It is estimated that from a fourth to one half of the business activity in Slaton is dependent upon the Santa Fe. It is admittedly not a good thing for any town or community to be dependent entirely, or to a major extent upon any one industry and Slaton is dependent upon the Santa Fe railroad. . . True not as much as at one time but still too much to be able to asily stand a set back that could come from any radical changes in the operation of the railroad here.

Slaton has an excellent farm market, several big intustries that are built upon cotton production, but the town needs still more to be self supporting and not at the mercy of the railroad and the business interests of the town should endeavor to interest one or more industries to come to Slaton or if this cannot be done the business men of the town should band together and investigate the possibility of investing in something hat would keep the business activity of the town up regardless of there activities.

Good Produce Can Be Raised Here

It would seem that the South Plains and the Panhandle with its prolific land would be in a position to produce much if not all of the better quality vegetables that are consumed in the seterritories but this does not seem to be the case.

There are no better onions grown that can be raised on the South Plains but most of the onions consumed in this area are brought in, carrots grow prolifically on the South Plains, but our carrots come from the valley, irish potatoes are raised commercially on the South Plains but most of these items draw better prices than the same items do in other sections. We do not set the top grade in these items and they do not come to us all when the market is short on vegetables.

Either there is more money in raising cotton and grain there is too much work in truck growing in this area. This addition will not likely be so always and some day this section will be a vast truck garden. 

This week the members of the Slaton Rotary Club are celebrating the twenty-fifth anniversary of the organization, the club having been organized in 1925 by 25 charter members. On Feb. 23, 1905, at the invitation of Paul P. Harris, an attorney, four men met in an office in the Unity building in Chicago, Ill. — Harris, Silvester Schiele, a coal dealer, Gustavus E. Loehr, a mining engineer, and Hiram Shorey, a merchant tailor. It was agreed that evening that these men would organize a club which would be based on the idea that Harris had been developing for the past five years—that men in business could be and should be personal friends.
