Monday To Be Fifth Slaton Trades Day

Taxes Become Delinquent Jan. 31; Drewry Urges Prompt Payment

City, School, State and County taxes will become delinquent on January 31, three weeks from this date. Local tax offices are becoming overcrowded and F. A. Drewry, deputy, urged that people begin paying these taxes now in order to avoid the last minute

rush.

City and School taxes are payable at the City Hall and Drewry has the tax rolls for those who own property in the Slaton area. He is accepting tax pyaments for poll taxes and for property taxes; and also will have automobile license plates soon after February 1st when the new plates are scheduled for delivery. Although cars are not legally required to bear the new license until April 1st, they should be purchased early in the year.

According to Mr. Drewry, more automobile licenses were issued for the Slaton area during 1949 than have been in previous years. He estimated that approximately 2,000 licenses were issued for passenger cars, 500 commercial licenses, and 150 farm. This is a large increase over 1948, and Mr. Drewry said that a 1950 increase over last year's is anticipated.

The local office is maintained so that people in Slaton and this territory will not have to travel to Lubbock and stand in line for many hour and get their taxes paid. It is a convenience both for the local people and takes a great amount of work off of the office in Lubbock.

NEW YORK - More than 100, NEW YORK — More than 100,000 Protestant and Eastern Orthodox churches of 19 major denominations with a total membership of 24,479,953 are uniting in a concerted campaign for world relief, reconstruction, and inter-church aid. The program, "One Great Hour of Sharing", certain phases of which began January 4, and will come to a climax on Sunday, March 12, Harper Sibley, prominent business man of Rochester, N. Y. and campaign chairman, announced here.

The appeal is sponsored by the

The appeal is sponsored by the Federal Council of Churches of Christ in America, the Foreign Missions Conference of North America, the American Committee of the World Council of Churches, and the United Council of Church Women through Church World Service, Inc., official relief agency of the Protestant and Orthodox churches.

Characterizing the project as a new development in practical church unity, Mr. Sibley stated that the people of Europe and Asia need continued material, financial, and spiritual assistance. In addition to extensive denominational programs, minimum requests for the coming year made to American churches through Church World Service by field workers handling relief and reconstruction projects amount to 36,000,000 pounds of clothing, food, vitamin, medicine and other contributed supplies, and \$4,000,000 for education and rehabilitation projects and other forms of reconstruction, he said.



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



Report On A Mile Of Death

Curtis C. Dumm, manager of a service station on U. S. 23, about 30 miles south of Columbus, Ohio, has also a self-appointed role as rescuer of traffic-accident victims—that is, those who are not beyond rescue—on the mile or so of nearby highway. The road is smooth and the curves sweeping, Dumm says in the January Reader's Digest, but he calls this inviting highway the "Mile of Death."

In 21 recent months Dumm has towed in from Highway 23 and its tributary roads the wreckage of 142 accidents. He has helped remove the bodies of 11 men and women who died in those crashes, Thanks to his knowledge of first aid, he has saved the lives of many more.

By day and night, "like a fireman always listening for the alarm." Dumm is summoned not by a bell, however, but by a report like an explosion, followed by the grinding noise of clashing metal. "When I hear those sounds I roll out of bed before I am fully awake, jump into my clothes, grab a wrecker and am off. Meanwhile my wife telephones for the state police and calls an ambulance."

Dumm wonders—as he works with blowtorch and crowbar to untangle twisted steel and shattered arms and legs, and to remove from the wreckage human skulls split as if by an axe—"why the brains spilled all about weren't used to prevent such useless smashups."

The article's record of deaths is confirmed by a representative of the National Safety Council who checked with highway officials, the local newspaper and the sheriff, "In very few of these accidents." Dumm states, "have I found the cause to be mechanical defects, 90 percent of the trouble lies with the drivers. I refer not only to those under the influnce of liquor but to those who become intoxicated with the sense of power the moment they get behind the steering wheel, those who get so cocky they believe they are immune to accidents, those who feel they have

the right-of-way over evreybody, those who think it's adventure to flirt with death by wild driving."

The fact that 30 humans die daily—one every 16 minutes
—in U. S. motor accidents, means that good roads, good lights and efficient traffic control are not enough, Dumm emphasizes. The one thing most desperately needed is the will to drive carefully. If we can popularize highway safety, we shall have gone a long way toward keeping hospitals and graveyards empty of motorcar victims.

Can The Nation Stand It?

While there are still a good many people in this country who work long, hard hours to keep the wheels of industry turning there is a fast slowing down to a pace that allows much more leisure time than has ever been known by the average citizen. This slower tempo is beneficial in some ways, but there are also some aspects of such conditions that could mean castastrophe for the nation just as such short hours and high prices caused when France was caught short of all kinds of material when the World War Two avalanched upon them.

After years of short work hours and lethergy among the people they become unable to speed up and should this nation become embroiled in another way it is very doubtful that our workers could ever reach the heighth of production that they did at the peak of the last conflict.

Perhaps there will some day be a time when most every tiresome task can be done by machinery but we have not reached that peak of perfection yet and the time we cut from productions we cut in volume produced.

The more leisure time we have the more destructive we become, there are no good fishing places left in the United States except in the waters near the coast lines, there is little good hunting ground left and about all that most folks can find to do these days is to play golf or whoop things up at honky tonks. Before long we'll have to go to work or provide better amusements for all of the folks who have nothing to do or the whole population will be so bored with leisure time that a lot of them will be wanting to go to work in order to keep from going nuts.
