According to Price Director Michael DiSalle, the "general impact of the orders will be to reduce food prices in most categories" covered by the order. DiSalle \_said housewives should not look for big general reductions. He said some price changes will be upward, and the changes up or down will vary with stores across the nation.





The organizations that have promoted the ball games claim that the people do not patronize the games and many men and women who are baseball minded claim that the games are not interesting enough, however the same team playing in nearby towns used to draw good attendance.

For a while the fact that the town did not have a proper place for good games was used as an excuse, but the Lions park is now as good as any park that was in the oil belt league, so this excuse does not hold water now.

Just what will be the final outcome of baseball for Slaton will be decided before long as the folks in Slaton will have to decide whether they will support it or not.

There is a lot of money invested in the Lions athletic park and it would be a shame for all of the work and money that has been put into the park to go to waste.

It gets down to the old point of which came first, the hen or the egg, or which side is in default, the people who are promoting some of the athletic activities in Slaton, or is it the people who should patronize the events, but don't.

There are a number of faithful supporters of amusements in Slaton, but not enough to make the events worth while, and it would take a brave organization to back the things that make such activities worth while, but perhaps this is the year that it will prove successful, that is, if a good team is organized. CANNIBALISM IN SPRING FLOCK?

SPRING FLOCK?
Like people, chickens sometimes
develop vices, too, and one of the
most prominent ones is CANNIBALISM, the picking habit that
frequently breaks out in a flock.
Of course, any number of things
have an influence on cannibalism,
but it is generally caused by such
things as lack of something to do;
over-crowding; high temperatures
in the brooding room; lack of feeding space; insufficient feed; close
confinement; or a deficiency in
the ration.

confinement; or a denciency in the ration.

Cannibalism is not necessarily the result of a faulty ration. In fact, it is more likely to develop when chicks are brooded in large groups and are subjected to crowded quarters. Toe-picking, feather-pulling, or cannibalism may show up under such conditions.

Chicks Need Room
As a precaution against cannibalism, and to provide for the general well-being of your flock, make certain that chicks have plenty of room. The amount of room for each chick is important. At the start, house two chicks to 1 sq. ft. of floor space. This enables birds to eat and drink without fighting for a position at the feeder or waterer, a situation which can quickly lead to an outbreak of cannibalism.

Chicks in confinement are more likely to develop cannibalism than those running outside early in life. Consequently, a raiser growing his birds in confinement should be particularly alert for signs of cannibalism.

Darken The House

Darken The House

When cannibalism persists, it is usually advisable to darken the house so that bright light or sunlight wil not attract birds to toes or blood-filled pinfasthers. Some

light wil not attract birds to toes or blood-filled pinfeathers. Some raisers paint the windows with red lacquer or paint.

Anti-pick salves are not usually very effective for the control of cannibalism in growing and mature birds, but they may prove helpful when used on chicks. If anti-pick salves are used, they should be used on at least 10 per cent of the chicks in order to be effective. If canniablism becomes a serious problem in older birds, then debeaking or use of pickguards is advised.

The State Fair of Texas, working closely with officials of Texas A. & M. College System, is blue-printing an entirely new type of agriculture show for the 1951 exposition, Oct. 6-21, R. L. Thornton, Fair president, has announced.

The show will be a balanced, correlated and highly-educational panorama of he state's agriculture as represented by the 14 agricultural extension districts of the A. & M. System.

All of Hale, Lubbock, Parmer and Swisher counties and parts of 17 other High Plains counties are included in an underground water reservoir designated by the State Board of Water Engineers.

The designation was delivered by James S. Guleke, member of the board, at a meeting Thursday in Lubbock of the High Plains Water Conservation and Users As-

represented by the 14 agricultural extension districts of the A. & M. System.

Each district will have its own large exhibit, built from information on scientific agriculture furnished "from the grass roots level" by district and home agents and districts, Thornton said.

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




