There is something to think about in what is happening in Detroit.

There are no streetcars running at the moment in the nation's fifth largest ctiy. Neither are there any buses. There haven't been any of either for four weeks now, But in spite of the inconvenience, the two million people of Detroit are managing to keep their factories, stores, schools and other establishments running on a normal, or nearly normal, schedule.

Since April 21, the 3,500 public transit workers have been idle. Their strike for higher wages was expected to paralyze more or less the city. But the private car in the nation's auto capital has risen to meet the emergency. Car pools and share-theride motorists have kept Detroit on the move.

Competition from the millions of privately owned and driven autos has, admittedly, put all city transit systems on the spot. But the average 6-passenger car on our streets morning and evening rarely carries more than one or two people. That is a lot of unused transportation. Is the Frankenstein that seems bent on strangling our transit systems capable of being tamed? There is something to think about in what is happening in Detroit. —The Dallas Morning News.

Congress in recent years has blown hot and cold—and now mostly seems to be blowing cold—on the question of universal military training to maintain the nation in an adequate state of preparedness. The Senate has passed a bill calling for a diluted form of universal military training, while the House version of the military manpower bill promises only to consider such a plan at some indefinite future date. The varying versions of this important measure are now in conference committee, and in what form it will emerge is anybody's guess.

The confusion in Washington over the age at which youths should be drafted into military service, and whether the draft should be combined with UMT, undoubtedly has been transmitted to many of our citizens. But there is one nation-wide organization which has a notable record of consistency on the subject. It is the General Federation of Women's Clubs, which has just ended its 60th annual convention in Houston.

Soon after the close of World War II, when American military might was at low ebb in comparison with this country's world obligations, the federation adopted a clear-cut resolution adocating UMT as the means of creating and maintaining armed strength necessary for national security. It is to be remembered that this was done at a time when the United States was not engaged in a shooting war and when the menace of Communism aggression to the peace of the world was not so clearly apparent as it is today.

The women of the federation have not changed their minds. By overwhelming voice vote, the delegates to the Houston convention reaffirmed their stand, indorsing universal military service for the nation's youth to begin at age 18. These were not politicians, trying to catch the winds of popular favor. They were women—many of them—who are the mothers of sons who will be called into service if UMT is made law. They are women who also see that strength is the nation's best shield of safety, and that over the long pull UMT is the best, cheapest and most democrat

A Studendous Job!

The Legislature has passed a law requiring an annual safety inspection of automobiles in Texas. The State Department of Public Safety now is studying means of setting up the machinery for the inspections, with the expectation of getting the system into operation some time this fall.

It is no small undertaking if the job is to be done properly, considering the vast size of the state and the number of motor vehicles owned and operated within its borders. As envisioned by sponsors of the law, the inspections necessarily will have to be done at first by garages or privately operated inspection stations designated by the safety department, with a gradual transition to a system under which the inspections will be made by the state at stations of its own.

Under the arrangement that will be necessary at first, there is danger that the inspections will be so cursory in many instances as to defeat the purpose of increased safety. And if the experience of other areas where inspections are made at government stations is any criterion, the safety department faces a staggering job in trying to take the system into its own hands. Consider, for example, the situation in the District of Columbia, which conducts its own motor vehicle inspection setup.

There two stations, four lanes each, six inspectors to the lane, have been established. With 48 men working full time, the District of Columbia in 1949 was able to make 307,000 vehicular inspections and 188,000 reinspections.

As chicks grow older, poultry-men should give some thought to protecting them against fowl pox and fowl laryngotracheitis, two costly diseases of growing birds and pullets. Either disease can be prevented by vaccinating.

and pullets. Either disease can be prevented by vaccinating.

Not Always Necessary.

It should be pointed out that vaccination is considered advisable only under certain conditions, circumstances under which a definite chance exists for pox or laryngo to break out unless protective measures are undertaken. These conditions are:

1. When the disease has broken out on the farm and it is desired to prevent further spread. Non-infected pens should be treated first in such an instance.

2. When the farm has been the scene of a past outbreak of pox or laryngo', and it is desired to protect young stock.

3. When susceptible fowl are added to a flock in which the disease is present or in which the disease has occurred previously; and when survivors of pox or "laryngo" are added to a susceptible flock.

4. When the disease exists on nearby poultry farms.

When To Vaccinate

If the neuttry producer's farm

If the poultry producer's farm
is free of the diseases, if neither
pox nor laryngotrachelitis was on
the farm during the past year, and
if there are no diseased flocks in
the immediate neighborhood, there
is no need to vaccinate. However,
if either disease breaks out, one
should be ready to vaccinate the
non-infected birds quickly after
the first appearance of the disease.







How To Throw Your Money Away!

While the tipping habit has not yet become a major expense in the smaller towns, like Slaton, it is one of the big problems for everyone who hopes to get any kind of services in the larger cities in the closer populated parts of the state and in the nation.

In the East at most all of the large hotels and night spots, the hat checkers, the half-naked girls who sell cigarettes and the bell hops do not get the tips themselves, but are hired at modest salaries to put the squeeze on the customers. One of the richest men in New York has made his fortune by paying cash for the hat check privileges at the popular night spots where the good looking girl checkers get twenty five dollars per week and take the jobs in order to meet rich men they hope to snag as husbands.

Bus station and railroad red caps demand at least 30c for carrying one or two pieces of luggage and the bus stations and railroads get a kick back. They build their terminal buildings so that an ill person and most women are forced to pay to have their luggage carried, and it is transported, not by the red cap, but on big trucks operated by motors.

If you want %0 feel like a first class heel you tip the red cap 30c, if you want to get a gruff "thank you" pay 50c and if you should prefer a sour smile it is 75c or a \$1.00.

A good meal at a top grade restaurant now costs about as much in tips as the meal does, in fact if you do not want to feel like you had been caught taking some of the restaurants pewter silverware, you must pay more now for tips than you paid in 1945 for a good meal.

Here are some guides on what the average weak-hearted customer is supposed to pay in tips:

Pullman train porters for one swipe with a whisk broom down the front of your suit or dress — \$1.00.

Shoe shine boy 15c for shine — 10c tip.

Sour pussed waitress, who sloshes coffee in the cup at the counter — 25c.

Long nosed waitress who keeps you waiting forty minutes at a table for an 85c merchants lunch — 50c.

Good looking waitress who keeps you a big dish of crackers and a little dab of butter so that you can be so full of erackers and a little dab of butter so that you can be so full of crackers and a little dab of butter so that you will not be hungry — \$1.50.

Bell hop in hotel for bringing up pitcher of ice water you did not want — 50c.

Barber for whom you wait thirty to sixty minutes—50c.

The Cotton Picking Machines Are Coming!

That the prosperity of this part of the state will eventually be affected by cotton picking machines cannot be successfully denied by any one who is familiar with the history of farm machinery development.

The kind of cotton that is propagated in this section and the fact that the bolls are pulled instead of the cotton picked makes the used of cotton picking machines far more profitable than the use of them in the parts of the country where better staple is important and where it is still the practice to pick cotton instead of pulling it.

The problem of securing pullers is greater each season and the interference of the government by insisting on the payment of social security taxes and the fact that the work can be done quicker with machines, point to the eventual use of cotton picking machines for the gathering of all cotton in this area, and when this condition does come the business traffic with the itinerate workers will be gone. The fall harvest time will mean the arrival of a few hundred cotton picking machines operated by skilled mechanics and the business traffic will be in the sale of tractor fuels and greases.

The local farmers will make more money but there will be no necessity for them to spend a major part of it, the local merchants will suffer and there will be a lot more folks out of work than there are at present.

The farmer will not be to blame, nor will the makers of farm machinery, but the Government is going to find that the country will be saddled with a lot of folks out if work. Not only will there be no money for the social security folks to dish out but a lot of folks who would be willing to work will be going hungry.

What About France

Hence France belongs to the North Atlantic Alliance, in which we have sent General Eisenhower to Europe and are sending large detachments of troops.


France hopes that our military presence, and our priority with the atomic bomb, may avert another European war; or, if the Russians march, our forces will defeat them east of the Rhine.

American military experts do not believe that Western Europe can be defended in a land war unless Western Europe, INCLUDING FRANCE, arms strongly for its own security.—Los Angeles Examiner.

Capt. Charles Blair of Port Washington, N.Y., probably won't ever be a national hero such as Lindbergh. His present claim to fame is that he is the first person ever to fly over the North Pole in a single engine plane. He took off in Norway, zipped over the pole and then landed in Fairbanks, Alaska. Soon thereafter he streaked toward New York, there to meet the photographers and reporters. His record will doubtless stand for a long time, for there isn't much chance that anyone will fly over the pole in a plane with fewer engines—that is until some of the bugs have been eliminated from gliders.

But we owe thanks to Captain Blair. It has been a long time since there were front-page stories of aviators doing things for the first time, or hanging up an endurance record, or setting a round-the-world time. For just a few moments the picture of Captain Blair reminded us of other days, when a young man in an airplane could make a record of some sort.

Thre was once an old claim that an explorer named Perry nailed a bunting to the North Pole. Wonder whether any reporters will be alert enough to ask Captain Blair whether he notice the flag, if it's still there.—Amarillo Globe.




