



Darwood Hilbers, City Cab Owner, Survey of Wage Picture Puzzle Killed In Tragic Car-Train Wreck Rates To Be Made Contest Ended

Services were held Tuesday, February 6, for Darwood G. Hilbers, 26, owner of the City Cab Company, who was killed in a cartrain collision early Sunday morning in North Slaton.

Hilber's 1950 Plymouth convertible collided with the rear of a freight train which was being switched off to a cotton compress siding. Mrs. Hilbers and Edward Leon (Pete) Phillips were treated for head injuries at Mercy Hospital. The car turned over several times. The two other passengers in the car, Elliott Foster and Isabel Hanrion, both of Slaton, were released after examinations. However, Miss Hanrion was readmitted to the hospital late Sunday.

In the early nineties, under the leadership of two outstanding Baptist women, Mrs. Helen Barrett Montgomery, a day was designated for united prayer for foreign missions. For many years home and foreign missions groups observed days of prayer seperately, but in 1919 they came together. In 1920 the women of Canada joined them. The first Friday in Lent, was chosen as the day of prayer for missions; spread the idea of a day of prayer and at the re-

Missionaries spread the idea of a day of prayer and at the request of many friends in other lands, it became a World Day of Prayer in 1927. Today the program is sent by request in advance to nincty-two countries.



Farm-To-Market Road Program Upheld by Senator

AUSTIN—Continuation of the full \$15,000,000-a-year farm-to-market road program was put at the head of his list today by Senator Kilmer B. Corbin of Lubbock and Lames.

"I am opposed to any schemes aimed at cutting down on the farm-to-market road program, and I am opposed to any schemes for taking road money away from the counties and giving it to the State Highway Department," the senator declared.

Corbin referred particularly to the plan announced last week which would take

to the plan announced last week which would take money now allocated to counties for lateral road construction, amounting to about \$8,000,000 next year, and giving it to the Highway Department to replace the present \$15,000,000 annual rural road program.



Sunday afternoons at four-thirty, N.B.C. takes its cameras to the Lincoln Park Zoo, in Chicago, for a highly entertaining and informative half-hour program called "Zoo Parade."

An assistant helped disengage the python, and Mr. Perkins, still quite casual about the matter, informed us that left to itself, the python would have squeezed the life out of him.

No More Frontiers!

Condensed from Life

Jack Kapp, president of Decca Records before his death in 1948, was interested in talking to college students. On every campus, said Mr. Kapp, he was asked, "What chance have I got in this system?" The students added such wistful remarks as, "Everything is in the hands of a few people."

Well, college students have always been skeptical before diving into the somewhat disconcerting whirlpool of that first job hunt. But today the disbelief is part of a world weariness that afflicts even those who have good jobs and secure riches in adult society. Undergraduates can hardly be blamed for reflecting a phiolosophical attitude that is cultivated not merely by the young but by practically everybody, even some of the professors. There was a peculiar irony, however, when disbelieving questions were addressed to Jack Kapp, of all people; For Mr. Kapp was proof that no man in America is destined by circumstances to spend his life behind a large and immovable eight ball. Mr. Kapp was born in Chicago in 1901, the son of a house-to-house canvasser for the old Columbia Phongraph Co. He worked his way through high school as an errand boy. In 1926 he was in charge of the Brunswick Co.'s "race record division"—meaning that his business was to go around the country making recordings by Negro talent.

In 1934 Mr. Kapp decided the time had come to strike out on his own. "What chance did he have?" The record business was near the all-time low, Radio had forced the bankruptcy of hundreds of record companies, only two remained. "Everything was in the hands of a few people."

Mr. Kapp proceeded to prove that a "closed" field is the softest of touches. As he himself put it, any company which casts itself in the role of "custodian of the status quo" is destined to die. With the record business on the rocks because of status quo custodians, Mr. Kapp hived up in the public library for a week to study old record catalogues. He discovered that the business was oriented toward Europe; there were 1200 recordings of Chopin

foreign voice, but U. S. singers such as Bing Crosby were considered infra dig.

All of this gave Mr. Kapp an idea. Bucking the rest of the industry, which considered it foolish to put entire musical-comedy scores into album form. Mr. Kapp made thousands of dollars by selling Gershwin scores complete. He made Bing Crosby a rich man.

Mr. Kapp liked to repeat the words from Emerson's The American Scholar: "We will walk on our own feet; we will work with our own hands; we will speak our own minds." Emerson isn't much favored these days, and the modern American scholar might insist that Mr. Kapp had a monopoly in four-leaf clovers.

But the college student who has spent winter weekends riding up a few of America's 1000 ski tows might reflect on the fact that in 1932 there wasn't a single ski tow in the whole United States. Maybe it is impossible to start a new automobile company today, but General Motors is going to need a new president in a few years, and it is certainly going to need new production men. According to a recent survey this country needs to train 15,000 new doctors; indeed, if present trends continue, we may be faced with a doctor shortage of 30,000 to 50,000 by 1960.

LAYERS NEED A MID-WINTER BOOST?

With a productive laying flock in the hen house and sizable egg checks rolling in each week, poultrymen sometimes overlook the needs of their birds, believing (erroneously) that a good flock once given adequate feed and water, will practically take care of itself. Such lax thinking may frequently lead to sudden drops in production and sickness among valuable layers.

To keep worm.

To keep your layers healthy and productive, you should con-stantly be alert for flock irregul-arities, taking care to correct any faulty management as soon as it's noticed.

Give Birds A Lift

It is of special importance this time of year to watch for weak, run-down layers, Mid-winter often brings reduction in egg output, mainly because layers begin to feel the strain of heavy egg production. Birds in heavy production for several months will usually benefit considerably from a little special care, extra attention, or some additional disease control measures. Since feeding is all-important, you can do a great deal for your laying flock by concentrating on feed consumption. Take an interest in nutrition. See to it that your birds get plenty of green, succulent feeds. Trimmings from vegetable stores, cabbage, carrots, raw apples, silage and mangel beets are excellent because they help perk up sluggish appetites. Alfalfa hay is a valuable protein and vitamin source, so feed it when possible.

Fresh Water Supply
In addition to a good feeding program, you should also pay particular attention to birds' drinking water. During the remaining cold days there is the danger that water vessels may freeze over. If this happens, throats of your layers may get pretty dry. And when birds stop drinking, they soon stop laying. So provide your layers with plenty of fresh drinking water—and keep it warm. Well insulated heating cable coiled and bound against water pipes is good protection against frozen drinking water.

Also help your layers do better by giving them a longer laying day. Artificial lighting, used to give the laying flock a 14-hour day, can greatly increase total egg production. Light bulbs in the laying house also help furnish a degree of heat, a factor which is importan tduring chilly winter weather.
