Barring any unforseen complications, the new educational building of the First Baptist Church will be formally opened on March 18, less than one year after construction began. The opening of the building will be a fulfilled dream of the pastor, Rev. J. T. Bolding and his congregation, who have worked diligently for several years to make possible the building of the \$94,000 brick structure.

The three story building is located directly south of the old church, at 255 S. 9th Street. A new sanctuary is to be built "sometime within the next five years" onto the east side of the education building. When plans have been completed and it is possible to construct the sanctuary, the east wall of the educational building will be torn out, which will join the choir with the sanctuary. Big, double door entrances are located at each end of the east side of the building.

The third floor of the building; to be used as the young people's department later on, will be used now for primary work. There are two assembly rooms, each surrounded with four classroom for a passageway. The south end of the floor will be occupied by the young people's classes and the north end will be for the Junior Adult classes. A dressing room is provided on each side of the Baptistry, with stairs leading down into the Baptistry. A large study is located on the southwest corner for the pastor.

The church office, with a heavy glass window containing small cut out places for communication to keep traffic out of the office as much as possible, is located on the second floor. It will be used by the church secretary to keep all records of the church. At the present time, the secretary shares a small office with the pastor, in the old building. Also, on the second floor are two large nursery rooms to be equipped with several cribs, and other nursery furniture. Each floor is equipped with separate heating units. The basement and third floor each have one heating unit and the second floor has two so that each end of the floor may be heated separately.

The rooms in the new educational building will be painted with light, two-tone shades.

For many years the local Baptists have been overcrowded in their present church building. It has been necessary to have Sunday School classes in the balcony, overlooking the main floor of the sanctuary, without any means of separating the classes. There has been no convenient place in the church for social functions. Some of the younger groups in the church have been meeting in temporary Sunday School rooms which have been erected to the north of the main building.

Approximately \$4,000 has been spent on new furniture for the new educational building.

### TAX RECEIPTS ARE GREATER

Collector of State and County faxes for the Slaton area. F. A. Drewry, reported that 837 poll taxes for 1950 were paid during the collecting season. This is considerable more than the number paid for the pervious year. This is unusual as a number of state elections were held last year and there are no elections scheduled for this year except the election for mayor and two commissioners and a school board election.





#### Slaton's A Good Town, But . . . .

The minister of the Church of Christ in Lubbock made a talk before the Rotary Club at the meeting of the organization Thursday noon, February 15. The minister began his talk with the observation that Slaton makes a different impression upon him than do other communities of the same size or of greater population, Slaton, said Minister Spain, has an air of progress and activity, he has the feeling, when visiting in Slaton, that the people here are endeavoring to build a sound, God Fearing community where the home life is of chief importance and he predicted that Slaton would continue to progress as a community, of people who prize clean living and a faith in the future.

These are not the exact words he used, but one had the feeling that Slaton impressed him as the kind of town most folks believe a town should be.

Some of these compliments are due Slaton, and we as citizens might accept them, but there are some things that are being overlooked and will eventually keep Slaton from being the kind of town that it should be unless something is done.

There are not likely to be many opportunities for great expansion in either large homes or in impressive business buildings, but the people who own homes and business buildings, that are already built, can and should keep them in top repair as long as possible. There are more old awnings swaying in the wind in Slaton, that remind one of the early nineteen hundreds, than there are in most any West Texas town, There are more lod, faded signs on buildings that were put there by firms now long out of business than one would likely find on the walls of the ghost towns in the mining districts in Nevada and Colorado, and the need for naming the streets so that strangers can find their way around, is most distressing.

Unless the entire community is kept abreast the weak spots will stand out more and more and be harder and harder to rectify as times goes on.

#### It's Not Easy To Loaf . . . .

The Slaton American Legion is sponsoring Heart Week in Slaton and the spotlight is on the danger of heart trouble. Dr. W. H. Gordon, of Lubbock, who has devoted a great deal of time to the national campaign to do something about heart trouble, says that the fact that most men and a great many women are neglecting the duty of taking vacations at least once each year are doing themselves a great injury and are contributing to the increase in heart trouble in the United States.

This is probably good advice. Some folks find it possible to take regular vacations, but most men feel that the cost of taking time off is too great under present day circumstances. The actual cost in dollars and cents so far as the vacations are concerned might not be so great, but it is getting so that more and more of the work of operating the businesses fall upon the shoulders of one individual and when he leaves loss in production is greater than the cost of vacations. If the good doctor could work out this problem for the business men then he could help the heart campaign a great deal.

To be a good loafer takes a lot of training, and the man who has spent a large part of his life in active work seldom wants to quit, regardless of financial standing.

There is no middle ground for most folks, they must work long and hard or do nothing. Its easy to believe that travel or some light hobby can take the place of active work, but those who try it soon are the scourge of their former friends, a misery to themselves and a trial to their family.

It could be that a lot of research should be made as to how to make people happy, particularly in their middle and later life. The old heart gets troubled in more ways than one and the kind of medicine it needs is something that will take worry off the mind and nervousness out of the old system.



1 tsp. vanilla

Sift all dry ingredients together. After water over dates has cooled, add the other ingredients and beat thoroughly. Bake in two large or three small cake pans.



whether eggs are produced on the farm, and used on the farm, r sold to a hatchery or an indivi-ual, the care and handling of atching eggs will have an impor-ant influence on them.

Selection of Eggs

When selecting eggs for the incubator or for sale, use good judgment and choose only those eggs that are of normal shape and good ize. Discard poorly shaped and undersized eggs, as well as any that may be unusually large. Select eggs that weigh at least 2 oz. each, but be careful not to use hin-shelled eggs.

Since both extreme cold and extreme heat will destroy the fertility of an egg, it is important to keep hatching eggs under regulation temperatures. Excessive chilling will eventually kill the embryos. High temperatures hasten breincubation development and excaken the embryos before the ggs are set. As a safeguard, you should maintain proper storage emperatures between 50 and 60 legrees.

Humidity is also important. Be-

legrees.

Humidity is also important. Beause an egg is about 60 per centwater, the humidity outside the gg should be 60 per cent, too. this helps prevent evaporation and loes not deprive the embryo of water for growth.

Additional Pointers

Here are some other suggestions that may prove helpful in caring for hatching eggs:

1. Place freshly laid eggs in a ray where they can cool immediately.

2. Remove dirt from eggs with Memove dirt from eggs with m water, or a solution warmer the temperature of the eggs. Store eggs in clean cases with Il ends down .A moist atmos-re is desirable in storage

oom.
4. Gather eggs frequently so that here will be a minimum of dirty, racked, broken, or frozen eggs.
5. If eggs are shipped, label rates plainly and protect them gainst breakage and chilling.


