





Plants are not expensive and many multiplying shrubs are thrown away at this time of the year because the person on whose place they are growing must thin them out and knows of no one who would be glad to get the surplus. At one time the County park had a number of at-tractive flower beds and the red verbena bed that used to be in the center of the walk that led to the Club House was a most colorful and attractive sight. It would not take a lot of expense nor a great deal of work to make Slaton a place of note in the way of floral beauty. It is not as costly to plant and cultivate flowers as it is to let property grow up in weeds and it's a lot more fun to cultivate the flowers than to chop down the undergrowth.
