## The Rent Situation Is Serious!

The influx of seismograph workers along with a great many more railroad employees has put a heavier strain on housing in Slaton than has ever been felt here, and it is said that rental rates have soared to an all time high for this area.

Slaton was not in a good condition to withstand a heavy influx of people when the second world war started, as several hundred houses had been moved from the town during the thirties. There has been almost as many new homes built since the war as were moved away in the earlier years, but Slaton now has more population than it ever had even during the "good old days" when Slaton was as big as Lubbock.

People who rent property are at fault, to some extent, for the high rent cost. Many people have no respect for the homes and apartments they rent, furniture in rented places takes an awful beating, children mark and tear the wall paper and most everything that is used is often mistreated. There are a few folks who rent property who take care of it, but they suffer from the fact that some one else has done more damage to the owners property than the amount he can collect from them.

It is said by economists that rental from business property will pay the owner a dividend on his investment, but that even with prices as high as they are now, on homes and apartments, the investment in residential property will not pay dividends over a long period of time.

Until the renter is required to put up money in advance for damage done during his stay, then such damages will be done and all of those rent homes will have to pay high prices.

It would pay owners of rental property to investigate those who apply and make the rental more reasonable to those they feel will take care of their property.

## Its' An Old, Old Cry!

Chain store and mail order competition with individual owners of local business institutions has been a big howl in large and small towns all over the nation, for the past twenty years, although the general public has about come to accept the situation and the groans of local merchants have died down to some extent because they find that they can compete with the big outfits today and meet much of the competition with better goods and prices that are as attractive and often lower in price than what the big fellows can offer.

Since high prices have gone into effect the mail order houses, and their stores in the larger towns, cannot cut prices like in the past because the manufacturers do not have to meet the demands of the chain concerns. They can sell all they can make at prices that they set themselves and the small retailer can get as much and sometimes more deliveries than the chain concerns or the mail order houses.

The trouble with the small merchant is still that many of them have not taken advantage of the fact that they now have a much wider market for better and more varied merchandise and many of them are afraid to stock their stores as well as the market would allow.

The residents of Slaton and this area can now afford and are buying the best the market affords.

Railroad employees are making more money than ever before, they are getting about all the overtime they can take care of, the farmers have made bumper crops for the past three years, and the wives and other members of the families of these folks can, and do, buy the best that is on the market, if they cannot find what they want in Slaton they go elsewhere.

Many merchants say that the people of this area do not give them an opportunity to show their merchandise, but go out of town without even shopping the local stores.

Local buyers will say that they have been disappointed before and have found that they cannot find the higher priced lines in Slaton, so they do not take the time to do the shopping around. Most anyone will admit that the staple items and medium priced lines are here in good varieties and most every one buys in Slaton when prices are in line and the quality equal, but many people say and feel that the local merchants should not complain when some one from Slaton goes elsewhere when what they want cannot be found here.

Such controversy will likely always be felt and folks from Slaton will go to Lubbock to buy; folks from Lubbock go to Dallas and Fort Worth to buy, and a good many will go from Dallas to New York. Even in New York folks go to Paris, France to buy.

What can be done about this is a problem for some economist to figure out, in the mean time its getting easier and better to shop in Slaton, the merchants are stocking better and bigger stocks and people of this area are finding Slaton a better place to shop. It is likely that some folks who live in New York will always go to Paris, France, and some folks in Slaton will do some of their shopping in Lubbock, but the more congested Lubbock gets and the bigger the variety of good merchandise the local merchants get the more business they will do.

## It's Time To Plant Roses And Shrubs!

Now is the time of the year to plant roses, shrubs, and it is not too late to plant fruit trees. A good many folks around Slaton are busy doing so.

Slaton people have shown more and more pride each year in their homes, and it would seem that the town should support a garden club or some kind of organization for the exchange of shrubs, flowers, etc.

P. G. Meading, who admits to having had a very nice flower garden before his wife talked him into selling his former home and moving into a new one, can give some mighty good advice on what to do for run-down roses, anemic petunias and sleepy-eyed zenias, as he has been a member of a national floral club for several years and has a library of books and pamphlets as to what to do and when.

There are many things that will grow in this area that one seldom sees, and Slaton could be made an outstanding town for pretty flowers and lawns if the home owners could be organized so that a definite and planned effort could be made along this line.

Plants are not expensive and many multiplying shrubs are thrown away at this time of the year because the person on whose place they are growing must thin them out and knows of no one who would be glad to get the surplus.

At one time the County park had a number of attractive flower beds and the red verbena bed that used to be in the center of the walk that led to the Club House was a most colorful and attractive sight.

It would not take a lot of expense nor a great deal of work to make Slaton a place of note in the way of floral beauty. It is not as costly to plant and cultivate flowers as it is to let property grow up in weeds and it's a lot more fun to cultivate the flowers than to chop down the undergrowth.

EXAMINE LAYERS  
CLOSELY FOR LICE

You should not set aside one particular time during the year to examine your birds for parasites. You should check them regularly—the year 'round—for lice, fleas, or other parasites that endanger birds' health and your poultry profits.

Yes, winter and summer alike, birds should be examined. Right now is a good time to look over your layers. If you have noticed signs of unthriftiness in your flock, it may well be the result of lice troubling your birds.

## Lice Hurt Profits

Besides causing chickens discomfort and irritation, parasites are often responsible for reduced egg production or the poor development of birds being raised for meat poultry. When not controlled, these tiny creatures can upset the health of an entire flock. That's why the problem of poultry parasites is not neglected by wise poultry raisers. And that's why you are urged to examine your chickens carefully for lice or other parasites. It is another safeguard poultry raisers can easily put into practice.

It isn't necessary to check all birds in your flock. Just pick a few at random and part the fluffy feathers beneath the wings, through the upper thigh, and around the head. If lice are present, you will find them readily.

Because lice on chickens frequently run into many hundreds in number, and numerous others are being hatched constantly, it is important to destroy them before they cause serious trouble.

## Treatments Available

A convenient way to combat the lice problem is to use a good roost application in the laying house. These are available commercially and are well worth the few cents they cost you. The preparation can be spread on roosts in the evening. The rising fumes penetrate the feathers and kill the lice while birds roost.

Another popular method of killing lice is with louse powder. This method necessitates individual treatment of birds, but the results usually are good.

- 2 cups sugar
- ¾ cup butter or shortening
- 1 cup sweet milk
- 3½ cups sifted flour
- 3 whole eggs or 6 egg whites
- 2 tsp. baking powder
- ¾ tsp. salt
- vanilla

Cream butter and sugar thoroughly and add milk. Sift baking powder, salt, and flour three times. Add gradually to the mixture. Beat until perfectly smooth. Add flavoring and gently fold in well beaten eggs. This makes a three layer cake.

**West Texas Roundup**

Operations are slated to start April 1 on an 8,500-foot wildcat by the Standolind Oil and Gas Company which will explore through the Ellenburger in central-west Mitchell County, two and one-half miles northeast of Iatan, it was revealed today.

Standolind No. 1 F. A. Langley will be the prospector. It is to be at the center of the southwest quarter of the northwest quarter of Section 25, Block 29, T-1-N, T-8-P Survey.

Construction of the Palo Duro State Park road got underway Friday morning by the contracting firm of Bell, Braden, Barker and Gilvin of Amarillo.

Nearly fifty Canyon, Hereford and Amarillo officials and citizens were on hand to witness the first stretch of work on the new paved road. Work was started near the Park entrance and the first section extended to the Lodge in the Park.

The contract calls for paving of 7.6 miles of road. Work will be completed in about 90 days, according to the contractors.

During the past seven days nine new completions and four new locations in the Levelland area were reported to the Oil and Gas Division of the Railroad Commission of Texas.

The Cochran County field received eight of the newly completed producers.

In Hockley county, the Slaughter field reported one new producer.

Cochran and Hockley Counties each gained two new explorations.

Levelland's new fire truck was due to arrive over the weekend or early this week according to a report from the Chief's office. Fire Chief Homer Johnson left for Kenosha, Wis. where the truck is being furnished and was to chaffer it back to Levelland as soon as possible.

Only one slight fire was reported since the chief left, a blaze that was quickly extinguished at Rainey's Wrecking Yard, started by a torch.

All individual notes owed by Crosbyton Clinic hospital have now been paid, according to announcement this week by Mr. T. J. Taylor, business manager. The final payment on these notes amounted to \$5736, he said.

Only remaining indebtedness against the local institution is \$34,000 of the original \$40,000 loan made by an insurance company against the property. 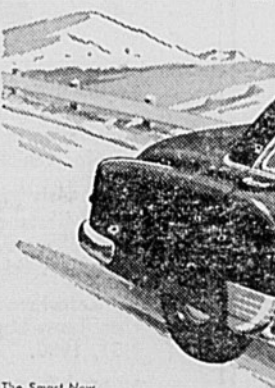

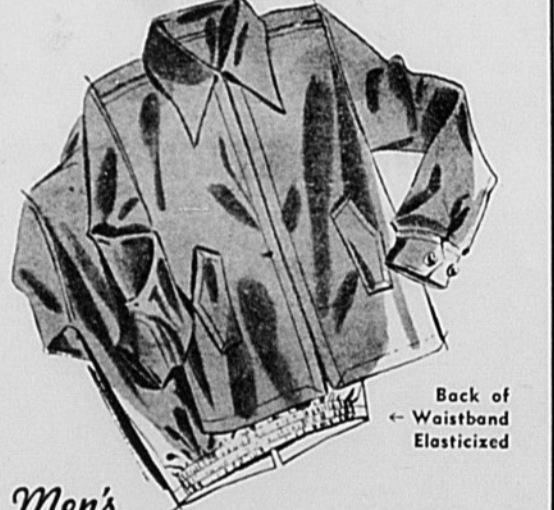

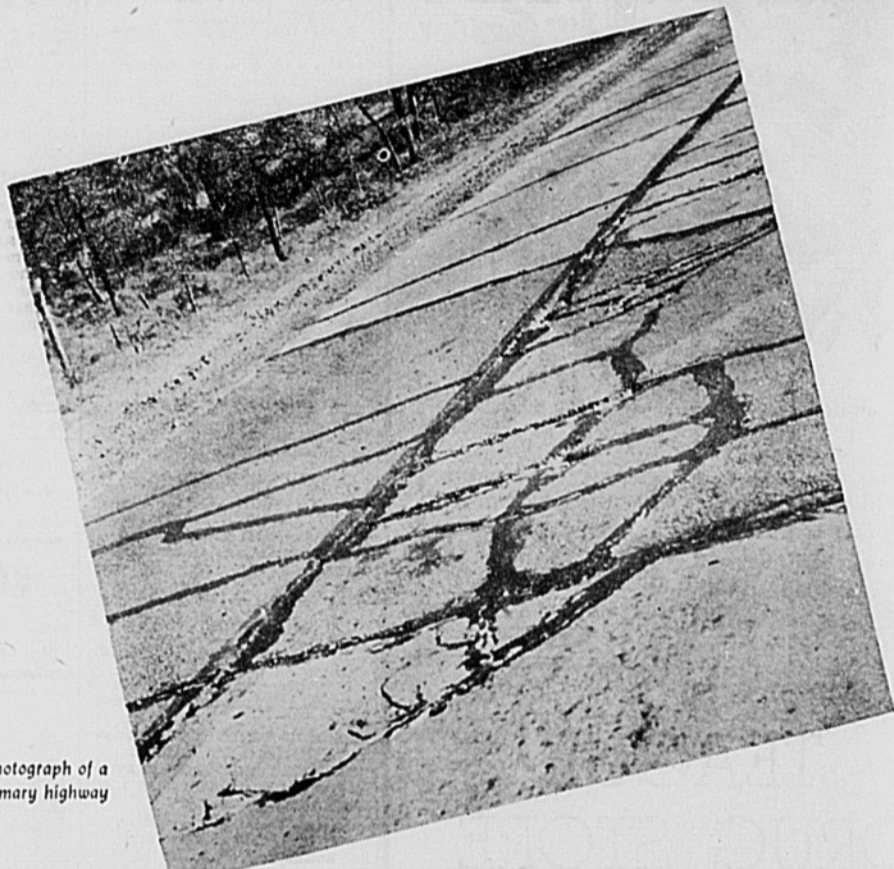

Damaged highways, such as the Texas highway shown in this picture, are a hazard to the safe operation of automobiles, farm trucks and other motor vehicles.

It costs three times as much to build roads that will withstand the loads of big trucks now being operated over them than it does for the smaller trucks and automobiles.

Latest records show **\$115,282,344** was spent on Texas highways for the year ending August 31, 1950.

A bill sponsored by the big truck operators is before the Texas Legislature. This bill proposes . . .

- (1) to increase the load limit from the present 48,000 pounds to 72,000 pounds, and
- (2) to increase the maximum truck length from 45 feet to 50 feet.

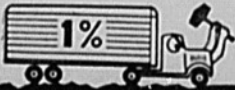
