





Better Drive Where You're Looking . . .

As the opening dates for schools draw near the traffic problem should get immediate attention, and all regulations

tightened.

A recent article in a small town daily quoted the police chief as saying that after repeated warnings and many appeals there was nothing left for the police force to do to combat the traffic offenders, but to enforce the law.

It is evident that just such conditions are now present in most of the towns in this section of the country, and it is about time that the laws be enforced. The crippling or death of one child, or adult, cannot be corrected by any fine, or law, and when the final responsibility is pinned down it is the person who is driving a car who is carelessly criminal when an accident occurs.

Therefore each person who gets behind the wheel of any kind of car should bear in mind that double parking, fast turns and selfish driving habits, not only are against the law, but show a disregard for every other motorist on the streets, and often, cause hazards that could cause fatal accidents.

Double parking is one of the biggest hazards in the smaller communities, and with blocking of streets it causes other motorists to have to break traffic regulations. Such habits obstruct the view, particularly of children, and often cause damages that cannot be estimated in dollars and cents.

Those who have been careless in their driving habits should stop and take stock, turn over a new leaf, and obey traffic regulations. DON'T HARM A CHILD.

It's Time To Do Some Chopping . . .

Late rains in this section have not only caused the crops to grow, but it has also given the weeds and high grass a lift and if the Johnson grass, and other vegetation, is allowed to get out of control the future danger will be considerable.

There are parts of the South Plains where Johnson grass is a big problem and unless the South Plains farmers become more co-operative in their fight against Johnson grass this part of the country will be in as bad a condition as many parts of Central and Northern Texas where the farm land has become Johnson grass grazing land exclusively.

A close observe will find a considerable amount of Johnson grass growing on the vacant lots and on neglected sidewalks of the towns where the seed scatter to the four winds to spread the scourge more and more. Not only is the grass and weeds a breeding ground for more and more trouble for the farmers, but they form a grave danger to the communities later in the year when dry grass and weeds become fire hazards of first magnitude. They are unsightly and mar the appearance of a town. A glance down many outlying streets in most any town in this area is a scene of ugliness and disenchantment.

How these conditions could be corrected can be answered with but only one suggestion and, that is work. Work by individuals or by cooperation within the community. The problem should be attended to soon.

Still More Government Jobs . . .

With the big appropriation now being planned by Mr. Truman and his cohorts, special plans are being made to employ 450,000 more workers to put on the government payroll. That means that almost another half million people are going to leave production jobs and be placed in jobs that can be considered, for business economy at least, predatory. That simple little measure of removing those men and women now from active civilian jobs where they are producting material for civilian production and war production, such production tending to keep inflation down, to non-civilian jobs, means that we left here must pay more to keep them going. There is one and ONLY ONE way they can get their salary check each month. That is from you and me, the taxpayer. It means that they no longer produce, but are consumers of tax money primarily. That means that labor shortages are going to become a bit acute where they left jobs. That basically means that with a continued shortage of labor, labor will demand more money. When labor demands more money the spiral of inflation continues, leaving the laborer with less than he had, with taxes more, and a continued disruption of American economy.

The pathetic part of this plan is two fold. First let us ponder a question—are these needed men and women actually needed in government employ? Second—are we going again into another Presidential election with the winning votes by men and women with government jobs? Think those things over. It may do a little good to think, but somehow I am taking a more optimistic view of what the American voter is stinking now. I believe he is finally viewing this continued merry-go-around with alarm. 

Wholesale distributors of gaso in this area this week awoke he realization that a new law ed by the Texas legislature, become effective on Septen-

ber 1, that will change a long-time custom in relations between the wholesaler and his customer in the handling of refunds claims.

The wholesalers have, in effect, been keeping their customer's refund claim records for them since the refund law became effective now a quarter of a century ago, Beginning September 1 the law requires that not only must the refund dealer:

(1) Not keep any records, not arize papers or otherwise lend aid to his customers in preparing and presenting their claims to the comptrolers department, but also;
