O.P.S. Gin Rates Allows Increase

The Lubbock District Office of Price Stabilization announced that action has been taken to allow cotton ginners a uniform adjustment in their charges for ginning, wrapping and bailing during the 1951 season.

The action is covered by a supplementary regulation to Ceiling Price regulation 34 effective on September 1.

Section 8 of CPR 34 permits percentage increases in rates overwhose charged in 1950 to persons engaged in seasonal services, such as ginning. These percentage increases are decreased by 1 percent an each of 7 seasonal periods beginning with 8 percent in the January 26, 1950 through April 30, 1950 seasonal period, down to 2 percent in the December 18, 1950 period.

Accordingly, the supplementary regulation permits ginners to increase their rates by a flat 6 percent over rates charged during the 1950 season, rather than using the 1950 season seaso

There are more men interested in buying cotton in this property of years and

There are more men interested in buying cotton in this this season, than have been here in a number of years and teems that there is going to be more competition for what ton gets on the local market, than ever before.

The cotton ginners are getting things in readiness to go it hammer and tongs at an early date, and local business men el much better since the late rains.

There are few lines of business that represent as great a risk as farming and a great many kinds of business that produce a much greater return for the money invested, but there are none that give the independence that a farmer has.

Local farmers have had more successive good years since 1940 than come in most centuries. It is probable that most farmers have been expecting a poor crop as each season comes, and most farmers, in this part of the South Plains, will gather more cotton and grain than they hoped for or expected. We may all join with them in giving thanks for what the crops will mean, not only to the farmers, but indirectly to every one on the South Plains.

Things Are Mixed Up . . .

Few people on the South Plains and probably in most parts of the nation realize how scarce many items are now, or soon will be. Sales reports on electrical appliances and hardware show that items in these lines are overstocked and the market clogged but such items as metal desks, typewriters, steel filing cabinets are very scarce, or impossible to find.

The excuse of the manufacturers of the scarce items is that the Government allotments of steel has stopped the flow to the retail markets, but there is no explanation of why electical appliances and hardware items are in over supply. Most all of them require steel in their manufacture.

More And More Government Employees . .

According to the latest figures of the Byrd Committee on Nonessential Expenditures, the executive branch of the government is employing more than 3,360,000 civilian employees, and during the last reported month new employees were being hired at a rate of more than 1,600 a day. March was the ninth consecutive month in which net increases had been reported for civilian employment in both the military and non-military agencies of the government. Since March 1950, when civilian employment in government reached its post-war low, the military agencies have hired civilians at a rate of almost one per minute, every minute of the day, every day of the year. The total civilian payroll of the federal government is fast approaching the level of \$8 billion a year.

year. Senator Harry F. Boyd (D., Va.) has been particularly critical of the waste of civilian manpower in our military agencies. He stated in a recent speech: "There is nothing in the military budget as it has finally been presented to alter the reputation of the military services as the most wasteful agencies on earth, both in manpower and money . . There is no doubt that at least a half billion dollars could be saved by reducing requests for civilian employment.



When you're ready to select the pullets which will make up your laying flock, remember that the efficiency of your flock depends on the quality of birds you put in the laying house. Every small, underdeveloped bird you house will reduce the profitability and efficiency of your flock.


The type of bird to select is one which will come into production early, will maintain a good laying record throughout the winter, and will continue to lay well into the summer. There is no assurance that every pullet you select will equaths standard. However, there are certain markings and body char acteristics which are usually reliable indicators of a bird's capacity for laying. Likewise, the poor laying types have certain characteristics which brand them as un profitable producers.

The birds you will want to keep are those with well-developed heads, long broad backs, long keel bones, and fleshy breasts.
