Opportunity Is Beating And Banging . . .

The smaller towns on the South Plains, and in most all parts of the state, have better opportunities to become better trade centers than they have had in many, many years, and some of them are taking advantage of conditions to some extent, but none are reaping as much benefit from their opportunities as could be done.

With traffic conditions becoming more and more involved every day and with the prospect of more and more cars crowding streets and highways even the larger cities are breaking up into trading centers and more and more folks are shopping in the less congested areas when the opportunity is offered.

The people who live on the farms and in the suberbs are becoming more and more conscious of the convenience of buying in the smaller communities and the only reasons that they do fight their way through the traffic congestions of Lubbock and other bigger communities is because of price and variety of choice. When the merchants in the smaller and medium size towns get up nerve enough to carry most all of the grades of goods that prosperous farm people want, and are willing to pay for, then the more prosperous the smaller towns will be.

Of course the more business increases in the smaller towns the more congested their traffic will become, and if such business activity is to help the smaller communities, then the traffic problem will have to be considered. This could be done by providing adequate parking space before the problem gets out of hand as it has in many communities where the parking meters have been found to make the shopping problem even more difficult to solve than if they were not in use.

The folks from out of town should be encouraged in every way, and the town that accepts the responsibility of catering to the out of town shoppers will be doing more for the home folks than could be done in any other way.

Small town folks should go out of their way to make shopping easy in Slaton, Wilson, Posey, Idalou and all other communities where new business will help.

If more free parking space is needed the town should pecome to secure such facilities.

This is the time of the year when most of us write or receive post cards and short notes about how BEAUTIFUL the scenery is in Colorado, Wyoming, California, or in most any spot on earth except where our homes is out here on the South Plains.

Have you ever returned from any of your trips and not felt that the good old South Plains is not the best place in the world to live? State Highway Upkeep . . .

Texas Highway Commission Chairman Thornton has raised the pertinent question whether we are not spreading our highway resources too thinly—unless the people are reconciled to an increase in gasoline taxes for financing an expanding system. The commission has authorized an appropriation of \$23,076,900 for maintenance alone in the coming year, a total that is only \$3 million less than the entire outlay for highways in 1945. Upkeep will be required for 12,961 miles of farm-to-market roads and 25,623 miles of the primary highway system.

The last two Legislatures made provision for building farm-to-market roads, but the problem of maintenance of them is the highway commission's worry. Record costs of upkeep for the coming year are attributed to addition of 3,062 miles to the road system and wear-and-tear on aging roads.

The legislative desire for more roads is a characteristic sentiment of the times, which favors more and more public works without regard for subsequent operation and maintenance. As a result of this naive policy modernization of the state's primary road system would require \$602 million. Current revenues would finance no such high expenditure. Hence, the people should be forewarned of possible resort to the easy expediency of a bond issue for putting the highway system in order.

Texas has a 38,340-mile state road system which is built and maintained by the state. In 1948, the TEXAS ALMANAC reports, the mileage was 30,146, the 30-year cost of which had been more than \$1 billion. Progress has been evident in this development of highways. But the system has expanded so fast that the problem presented by the highway commission chairman. It bolls down to the proposition that, if the people want more and better roads, they will have to pay more.

Senator Douglas's "Sunday pitch" had all the stuff on the ball he claimed it would. He could merely have let "senatorial courtesy" take its course and reject the two judges for Illinois federal posts whom Mr. Truman nominated after ignoring Senator Douglas's recommendations.

But the senator refused to fight it out only on grounds of politics or precedent. He asked the Chicago Bar Association to ballot on his choices versus the President's, and to consider only filness for judicial office. And he promised to abide by the results of the poll. Bar association members cast 6,000 out of 6,400 ballots sent out. Mr. Douglas's candidates bested Mr. Truman's, 3,656 to 553 and 3,003 to 1,310.

This puts Senator Douglas in the position of playing the very best sort of polities and the President, unless he sees the light and reverses himself, in the position of playing the worst. No wonder Washington correspondents have just voted the freshman from Illinois the best man in the United States Senate. —The Christian Science Monitor.
