

Things Are Changing A Lot!

Things Are Changing A Lot!

Over the years one of the loudest complaints of the business men of Slaton has been that the town is too near Lubbock, and that Lubbock merchants have been drawing too much of the business from Slaton to Lubbock to allow the merchants to get the revenue that should come.

In spite of the stiff competition Slaton has continued to grow both in population and in business activity and it seems that the tables are turning.

The two towns are closer together in that more and more business buildings are being constructed on the highways out of Lubbock and more and more firms are building on the highway leading from Slaton to Lubbock, thus decreasing the actual distance between the two towns regardless of the city limits of Slaton and Lubbock.

Since the business districts of Lubbock have become so congested that doing business is more and more difficult, the tendency has increased for the firms in Lubbock to move out of the congested areas. As time goes on it is most surely a fact that the people in Slaton will look more and more to the merchants here for what they need rather than go to Lubbock and battle for places to park or ride for miles and miles to get from one shopping center to another.

There is an opportunity and a challenge to the merchants of Slaton in this situation. 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The fact that so many people were interested in the plant exchange, that was held on the City Hall lawn a couple of weeks ago, is outstanding evidence that the people of this area are conscious of the fact that the Plains country will grow beautiful flowers and shrubs, and it is evidence that, with some encouragement, the citizens of Slaton could be induced to make Slaton the Garden Spot of West Texas.

All of the vacant places over town could be made to be beautiful instead of looking like the land God forgot and it is possible that the town could be made much more attractive.

The folks who exchanged plants, or came and got plants, are primarily interested, as they should be, in beautifying their gardens or in landscaping their homes and not particularly interested in making out of the way spots any more attractive than they are, but if the proper community spirit were built up it is possible that all of our residents could be made conscious of the fact that pretty flowers and shrubs could make Slaton a very outstanding town.

Ten years ago Slaton had a population of a few over 3600, but today there is probably 6000 people living in Slaton, and nearly 7000 in the immediate shopping area. That many have come to Slaton to make their homes is because of the crowded conditions in Lubbock and because Slaton is such a nice place to live, because there are so many paved streets, because the average merchant still wants business and is not trying to get high profits, because we have plenty of water and because the people who live here take pride in their homes, in plain words, because Slaton is a real home town.

Kill The Goose?

Texas has been industrializing rapidly in the past decade. The process is still going on at full blast. Just the other day it was announced in Washington that certificates for Texas defense industries approved during the past five months come to \$569,873,000. Only one state, Pennsylvania, is ahead of us. Texas is to get twice as much new defense industry as New York; nearly twice as much as Ohio; five times as much as New Jersey—all of them leading industrial states.

It is interesting to note that Louisiana, which like Texas has unlimited natural gas supply available for industrial use, was awarded only \$80,306,000 in defense plant certificates, or one seventh Texas' total.

Louisiana has approximately the same inducements for industry that Texas has, except for one thing. That is, tax policy. The neighboring state put a 1-cent tax on natural gas in 1948. That makes fuel more expensive for both domestic and industrial use. It also displays an attitude of indifference to the location in the state of new industries.

This is exactly what the Sewell bill, now before the legislature, would do. The 1-cent increase in tax on natural gas would be a 200 per cent jump. It could well cause many industrial concerns now interested in a Texas' favor in regard to defense where.

That 7-to-1 margin in Texas' favor in regard to defense plant authorization is significant. It cannot be explained on the basis of population, water supply, labor availability, or location in reference to raw materials and markets. It must be due in

large part to the difference in fuel taxes and to the attitude toward industy which that difference points out.

Chicks can be fed anytime after they are 24 hours of age with safety, and since most baby birds are at least this old when they go into the brooder house, feeding may commence at once on their arrival.

arrival.

Before the chicks arrive, the poultryman should see that he has an ample supply of a reliable chick starter on hand. This feed should be placed on egg flats or paper plates during the first day or two to encourage early feeding. Thereafter the birds should be able to feed at the hoppers.

Provide Green Feeds

If it is available, provide the chicks with fresh green feed such as alfalfa, clover, blue grass of kale, cutting it into short lengths of ½ inch or thereabouts. These feeds are rich in the nutrients which often are found lacking in some poultrymen's feeding programs. As the chicks grow older, they can be turned onto grassy range.

When chicks are about five weeks old, scratch grains can be fed, gradually changing at six to seven weeks to a good growing mash. Never make a sudden change in feeding methods.

Fine grit and oyster shell can be made available to chicks after the first several days. At six weeks larger sizes of grit and shell may be used.

Constant Supply Of Water

Constant Supply Of Water

Perhaps the most important thing to be said about watering the chicks is this; make sure they have an adequate supply of clean, fresh water before them at all times. If the chill is taken off the water before it is placed in the founts during the first several days, consumption will be increased.

Water should be supplied in quart-size founts during the early period of brooding. At the start there should be four quarts of water for each 100 birds per day. This should be doubled when chicks are three weeks of age. Larger size waterers may be used at this time.

Frequently baby chicks die of thrist before learning to drink or where to find water. Thus, it is a good idea to tip the beak of each bird in the water as the chicks are placed in the brooder house.
