Two numbers might mean a loss in money to you for your family.





What Happened In **Slaton Last Year**

Slaton Last real Taken from the June 30, 1950 issue of the Slatonite: Saturday, July 1, Forrest Lum-ber Company will hold the formal opening of the concern's newest store located on South Ninth in Slaton. The new building features a modern, angle-window design, with a 35' sign tower on top, vis-ible for several blocks. The sign is outlined in neon. Actual construction of the new Methodist Church building will begin as soon as the structure plans are completed, local church officials reported this week. All preliminaries leading toward the concluding blueprints are being prepared by the architect . How early do chicks get worms? That is a question which poultry-raisers in every part of the coun-try often ask. And the answer caanot be final, since the occurren-ce of worm infections in chicks varies with the climate, weather, and other growing conditions. Usually, however, growing chicks are not troubled with worms much before six or eight weeks. This is because it takes 4 weeks for a large roundworm to mature. A bird infected at 3 weeks of age would not begin to show signs of infection until about 6 weeks old. Worm Damage Worm Damage Again, in the matter of virulence or strength of the worm infec-ion, there arises a question. How nuch damage do worms do? They nay do considerable physical dam-ress to the heavy-infection stage. 'oultry can tolerate a few worms, ut when the parasites start sap-ing the birds' strength, ruining feed utilization, and causing stunt ng, it is necessary that they be climinated. The examples of progressive poultry-raisers in areas where such worms as the large roundworm (Ascaridia galli) and the ceea worm (Hetarakis gallinae) are pre valent provide a good guide as to what neuros to follow.




