Admission to the racing is \$1.00 per car load, or 50 cents for single individuals.




Judy Bishop Given Tea

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

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TELEPHONES OF THE FUTURE The other day I was having lunch with some friends and

we got to talking about how much the telephone has changed in the last few years. We talked about the development of color phones, wall phones and the latest one ... the Princess, the first compact phone.

This conversation reminded me of some of the ideas for new kinds of telephones and communications services we're working on now. Some of these ideas will never leave the drawing board. Others will fall by the wayside during the test stage. And some, of course, will be successful ... and will eventually be available for your use.

For instance, there's the dial-in-hand phone. It has the dial in the receiver. You lift the receiver, hold it in your hand, and dial. The dial lights up when you lift the receiver,

Or, how about a picturephone? This telephone of the future will transmit pictures as well as sound, so people will be able to see each other as they talk on the phone. The picturephone has been successfully tested, but it will be quite a while before it is available for widespread publicuse.


