## Same Old Bureaucrats Shape U.S. Policy

THE DECLINE in American prestige, as highlighted I by the recent debacle in Cuba, is due to wrong policy, wrong strategy, wrong evaluation, and wrong

The most culpable of the personnel are among some 8,500 State Department employes housed in the 62 million dollar beehive, which is situated appropriately enough in the capital area known as foggy bottom.

One needs only to walk through the network of corridors in the structure that sprawls over a dozen acres to recognize he is in a hive of drones. Charcoal gray suits are almost a uniform. Conversation is a curious gobbledygook of internationalism which subordinates American interest to the interests of a gantlet of nations which have the outstretched palm.

Blunders of many of this strange crew are not to be charged to actionable betraval of the national interest, as was the case with George Blake, the 38-year-old British vice consul, who put the finger on Britain's counter-espionage agents in eight years of spying for Russia. The fault lies more in the fact that so many State Department men feel they must subordinate national interest, so that they place hemselves, like Mohammed's coffin, somewhere between the heaven of hope and the earth of reality.

Many State Department careerists feel that they must not deal with problems as Americans but as superior beings. They consider themselves wiser and far better informed than their fellow Americans, just as they frequently feel above natives when assigned to foreign posts.



This is not an indictment of all foreign service officers, but only of the wing which we know as ugly Americans. Under four administrations, a group of policy planners and memo makers has directed American foreign policy with generally disastrous results.

The names change somewhat, though not too much, but the policy remains consistently foggy. The voice may be the voice of John Foster Dulles or Christian A. Herter or Dean Rusk, but the hand is that of the group which lost China to communism and Cuba to communism.

Insiders were confident that the group would bring disaster on President Kennedy, but they did not expect it to come so soon. Dean Rusk and Chester Bowles and Adlai Stevenson are all proteges of Dean Acheson.

Secretary of State Rusk was one of those who helped Acheson sell the idea that the Chinese Communists were agrarian revolutionaries.

Those who sold him on that idea are pushing behind the scenes to get Red China into the United Nations on the argument that the action is inevitable, so why not now?

Rusk has confessed his fault on China and Acheson has acknowledged his innocence of Russia in his State Department days. No fewer than four Ambassadors have blamed the blundering in Cuba and in other areas on those who supply information to the Secretary of State, and thus indirectly to the White House. These have been designated as members of the "in basket brigade"-those who fill the "in basket" on the Secretary of State's desk.

In olden days it was the man who had the king's ear who was the actual king. Today the men who supply the information are the ones who determine American policy. This clique has been in power under four Presidents.

The major diseases and the estimated losses caused by each were bacterial blight, 5.64 percent; root rot, 5.22 percent; seedling disease, 2.68 percent; Pseudomonas wilt, 2.1 percent; root knot, 2.04 percent; Verticillium wilt, 2.03 percent and boll rots, .63 percent. Other diseases, listed by Smith, as causing losses were Fusarium wilt and Ascochyta blight. Texas ranked second among cotton producing states in percentage loss, over 21 percent, Smith

Average figures don't give the true picture, the pathologist said, because in the areas where diseases struck hardest losses ran into ruinous figures. Root rot, for example, caused an estimated 30 percent loss in the Central Blacklands and increased in many areas over the 1959 losses. Bacterial blight continues to be the most important disease though it does not kill plants, Smith said.

## Your City Government by J. J. Maxey, City Secretary

I would like to reminisce just a little and talk about what was in the past, what has been done up until now and what we would like to do in the future.

As everyone knows (or should know) Slaton will celebrate its' fiftieth anniversary on June 10th. As we look back we are able to evaluate some of the happenings of the past in the light of results. In 1929 Slaton citizens must have been reasonably sure that there were at least 5,000 people here. A charter was voted and according to State Law the first requisite is to have 5,000 people. The census in 1930 only showed a little over 3,500. Of course we know that the beginning of the depression in late 1929 was the direct cause of the population loss. Prior to that time Slaton had been a very progressive town. From that time until early in 1947 no further capital improvements were made. We can remember that as late as 1945 the streets were being swept with push brooms, the trash and garbage was being picked up in an old flat bed truck and this service was only being provided every three to four weeks. The tax roll was producing \$30,000.00, the Water System was producing \$30,000.00, and many of the employees were working for \$90.00 per month. The Water and Sewer systems were in comparable condition and the only paving we had was the brick paving that was installed in 1926 and the W.P.A. paving that was installed in 1939.

Today the only thing that we have to be ashamed of is a City Hall that will be 40 years old next year. Our Water and Sewer systems are as modern and ifficient as any in cities of comparable size. Our police force is recognized throughout the area for its organization and efficiency and our Street and Sanitation Departments are being improved constantly with the addition of equipment and personnel. Needed water and sewer facilities have been added, streets have been paved where property owners were willing and able, the fire department has been enlarged and new equipment added. All of this has been done with only two increases in taxes since 1945. In 1946 we had a re-evaluation tax program that raised and equalized taxes and again in 1958 we had a 10% increase in taxes.

Your present City Commission is of the opinion that the citizens of Slaton want the best City services that can be afforded. Realizing that two heads are usually better than one, the Commission has appointed some twenty-seven different citizens to serve on various boards to help attain this goal. One meeting has been held with the Financial Planning Commission, composed of ten citizens representing most every walk of life here. At this meeting the two commissions discussed the City budget and ways and means of improving services and to raise needed revenue to pay for the service. It was mutually agreed that all services should eventually be self-sufficient. Of course, all of the improvements that were enumerated above cost money, and any other improvement will cost additional money. Believing that we have a City that has all of the ingredients with which to build, your City government is making every effort to furnish the kind of services that you want and will keep you as well-informed on progress as is possible.
