BLUE LAW CONFUSION --Inder the new Texas "Blue Law," shopping for certain items on Saturday or Sunday nay prove a chore

The law that started out as a device to hit the discount houses operating on Sunday was changed to include Saturday as an alternate because the lawmakers felt a straight Sunday closing law might appear discriminatory to some religious groups who observe the Sabbath on other days.

Included in the list of items merchants are not allowed to sell on one of the two weekend days are lawn mowers, toys, motor vehicles, clothing, furniture, kitchen utensils, air conditioners, home appliances, jewelry, cameras, radios and television sets.

The law has teeth -- a fine of \$100 is provided for the first conviction, going up to \$500 and six months in jail for subsequent convictions.





Three new species have been added to the list this year-Russian olive, enonymus and buffaloberry. Other species include black locust, black walnut (stratified nuts), catalpa,

berry, osage orange, red cedar, rosa multiflora, sycamore, Austrian pine, ponderosa pine, loblolly pine, and slash

All seedling orders are packed in moss and moistureproof paper and shipped prepaid direct to the purchaser. The delivered cost of all species is \$1,50 per hundred. Orders must be in multiples of 50 and orders for less than 100 seedlings will not be accepted.




