Dr. Wallace Davis To Speak At Annual Meeting

Dr. Wallace E. Davis will be the guest speaker at the Carson County Extension Service's annual meeting at 7:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Jan. 21, in the Educational Building of the Square House Museum. His address will focus on Education for the '90s with emphasis on Secondary Education.

Dr. Davis is president of Wayland Baptist University in Plainview and is widely known as a distinguished educator both in secondary and higher education. He has been an educator since earning the bachelor's degree in history and German at Baylor University in 1951. He spent 36 years in Corpus Christi in elementary, secondary and higher education. He began his career as high school teacher in Iowa Park in 1952. After serving in the U.S. Army, he moved to Corpus Christi in 1955 to teach elementary students.

In 1959 Davis began a 5-year term as principal, then was named assistant director of elementary education for the Corpus Christi ISD in 1966 and assistant superintendent for instruction in 1967, serving in that capacity until becoming one of the first four educators employed by the newly-founded Corpus Christi State University in 1973.

His career at CCSU, a member of the Texas A & M University System, included 16 years as Dean of the College of Education. He was named vice president for academic affairs in 1989, and became interim president in 1990, guiding the 3800-student institution until December 1, 1990, when Dr. Robert R. Furgason was named president.

A native of Olney and a graduate of Olney High School, Davis completed the master of science degree in history in education at Baylor in 1955 and the doctor of philosophy degree in educational administration at the University of Texas in 1971.

Dr. Davis has filled many leadership roles in school, church, professional and civic organizations. He is a



very talented speaker with exceptional wit. He is in much demand as a speaker for professional organizations, teacher convocations and university forums across the nation.

The Carson County Extension Service invites everyone associated with the schools, either as administrators, board members, teachers, counselors or parents, to attend this meeting.

GROOM CITY COUNCIL

The Groom City Council met in regular session on January 7th. All members were present.

Minutes of the previous regular meeting were approved.

The firm of Brown & Grantham of Pampa presented the completed audit for the 1990-91 year. It was unanimously accepted.

Bill Homer moved to amend the 1991-92 budget to include the \$500.00 allotted for Christmas decorations. Ronny Fields seconded and all member voted in favor.

The council reviewed a letter from city attorney Jim Shelton in regard to the Edmondson property. Legal action is still in progress at this time.

City Secretary, Pat Ashford, was instructed to up-date the current personnel handbook in regards to employee sick leave for presentation at the regular February meeting.

Greg Lamb moved to once again allow the \$9,000.00 property tax exemption for over 65 residents in 1992. All members were in favor.

Councilman Cornett moved to discontinue the discount for early payment of taxes. The City was the only entity in the county still offering the discount. Homer seconded and all members were in favor.

J P Appointee Selection Friday

Carson County Commissioners will hold court Friday, January 17th at 10:00 a.m. The purpose of the meeting will be to appoint a new Justice of the Peace to fill the interim since Max Wade's

retirement. Two people have filed to run for the office, Jesse Baker and Bill Hinson.

According to Judge Roselius, the new J.P. will be chosen on a basis of his resume, standing in the

community and ability to deal with difficult people in difficult situations.

Groom Basketball Teams Evacuate Memphis Gym Tuesday As Bomb Scare Called Into Authorities

When the word "bomb" is mentioned it is usually connected with Belfast, Beirut or Iran. Our little isolated corner of the world had a taste of the world wide menace in the form of a bomb threat.

Last Tuesday night the Groom basketball teams played in Memphis. At approximately 6:50 an unknown person called the jail in Memphis and said that a bomb had been planted in the High School.

Chief of Police Robert McGuire and Hall County Sheriff Kenny Schull immediately called in all

officers, as well as volunteer deputies to help with the evacuation and to do a thorough search of the school, gym and grounds. Nothing even remotely resembling a bomb was found.

Earlier in the day, around 4:00 p.m. the county judges office received an anonymous call saying that there was a bomb in the court house. A search of the building proved false the threat.

Sheriff Schull stated "We have no one in custody at this time but we have some

suspects that we will be questioning."

After the search of the school, players and fans were allowed to continue the games. At 7:59 the Police Department received another call saying that the bomb would go off at 8:30 p.m.

Law officials did not evacuate since the recent search did not turn up anything.

Chief of Police Robert McGuire stated "I'm really sorry that this happened, the Groom Fans and players cooperated wonderfully."

Superintendent Sweatt said "I commend the Memphis law officers on the prompt and professional manner they handled the situation."

Officials in Memphis felt like this was a prank played by some teenagers. No

arrests have been made as yet. The penalty for a bomb threat is very strict.

The minimum a person could be charged with is making a false report to a peace officer, which carries a sentence of one year in prison and a \$2,000.00 fine.

Not only that but when done by phone the person also breaks federal laws and F.C.C. rules. The U.S. Attorney's office may also consider such a threat to be a terrorist action and could call in the FBI.

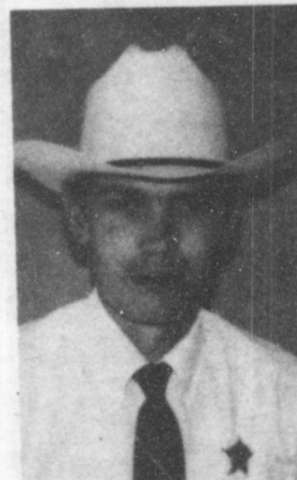
County Attorney Ed Hinshaw stated "We would take such a hoax very seriously, should anyone get ideas about trying this. I'm afraid our law officers have too much to do to find such a joker very humorous."

Also, in 1991, Carson County was involved in the implementation of the 9-1-1 Emergency System which is handled through the Sheriff's Office.

Additionally, after a great deal of work and planning by the County Judge, the Commissioners' Court and my department, we have placed a full-time Deputy



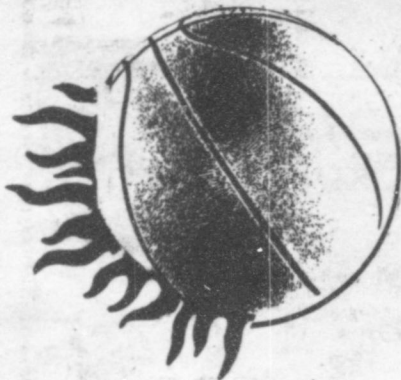

According to the American Cancer Society, one out of ten women in the United States will develop breast cancer sometime in her lifetime. It is currently estimated that over 37,000 women die each year as the result of breast cancer.

A female technologist who is highly trained in mammography will perform the examination.

On October 4, 1991, Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Southwestern Bell) filed an application with the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission) that proposes a new optional service called DigiLine™ Service. The application was assigned Docket No. 10655.

DigiLine Service uses a 144 Kbps facility, typically divided into two 64 Kbps B Channels and one 16 Kbps D Channel to provide access to and from the public switched telephone network for circuit-switched voice communications. DigiLine Service also provides transmission of circuit-switched data and packet-switched data within the customer's service office area only. This service allows the simultaneous transmission of voice and data over a single residence or business telephone line from a serving office equipped for DigiLine Service.

The monthly recurring charges for DigiLine Service consist of three major rate elements: Basic Interface Facility (\$19.00); Basic Interface Equipment (\$12.00); and, an Integrated Services Network Component for each B Channel (rate varies from \$1.90 to \$7.25 per B Channel depending on the customer's class of service and location.) Other charges may also be applicable depending on the options requested by the customer.

DigiLine Service operates only with compatibly-equipped FCC Part 68 registered equipment. The service will be offered initially in the following exchanges and within the following serving offices:

Austin	Fireside
San Antonio	Capitol, Medical Center
Houston	Clay, Medical Center

DigiLine Service may be furnished in other serving offices in any of the above exchanges in combination with foreign serving office charges. In addition, DigiLine Service may be available in other exchanges upon a customer's bona fide request. A bona fide request is a written request for service. Upon receipt of the bona fide request, Southwestern Bell will conduct an economic analysis to determine the financial viability of offering the requested service.

Southwestern Bell expects DigiLine Service to generate first-year revenues of approximately \$236,000.

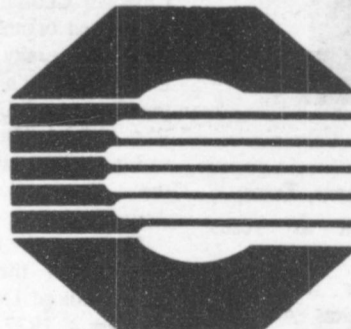

ALANREED VOTERS SPEAK OUT

January 11, 1992

To the Registered Voters of Alanreed Independent School District:

Alanreed and McLean will vote Saturday, January 18, 1992 on consolidation.
Please consider the following comments before making your decision on voting.

The tax rate in Alanreed Independent School District is \$.97/\$100. (.215/.755) and the taxable value is approximately \$23,091,000. The tax rate in McLean Independent School District is \$1.235/\$100. (.48/.755) and the taxable value is approximately \$54,466,000. Alanreed ISD has no bonded indebtedness tax rate. Alanreed ISD will send CED#14 approximately \$168,000. in tax dollars and the return from the CED will be \$85,511.(50%). McLean ISD will send to the CED approximately \$393,972. in tax dollars and the return from the CED will be \$523,831. (133%). If consolidation takes place your taxes will be increased considerably.

At the present time the constitutionality of the County Education District (CED) is in question, and if ruled unconstitutional, Alanreed ISD tax dollars may return.

The state formula for financial aid to schools is based on the number of students in attendance. The number of students in Alanreed School will make no impact on McLean's enrollment. If consolidation takes place there will be no need for additional personnel in any category of employment. By consolidating it will have no influence in increasing student enrollment to insure security in keeping the school.

The various statements made that if we do not consolidate with McLean we will all be sent to Pampa, or other larger school districts are untrue. Under current law a school district determines its own destiny. There is no school law that would close a school district and send it to another district, unless that district is not meeting the accreditation standards. If warned, it is still up to the district to determine what actions should be taken.

True, Alanreed ISD is located in Donley and Gray counties, but there have been no commitments or considerations given to divide, move, annex, or send Alanreed ISD to any other district.

We have an excellent school building because it has been properly maintained since construction in 1964. We also have an excellent gymnasium, bus barn, storage building and two teacherages. The gym and bus barn was built in 1982. The buildings are used for special occasions and needs of the families of the community. The gym is used for Homecoming in June of each year with 200 to 300 people attending. If consolidation passes, by law, all school owned properties - land, buildings, equipment, and monetary assets become the property of McLean ISD. McLean ISD can remove, demolish, sell, or dispose of this property in any manner they so desire.

A vote for consolidation is giving away everything to McLean ISD. There is no legal assurance of anything, representation, input, or choice concerning our school. A vote for consolidation is a vote for higher taxes and a give away of Alanreed Independent School District.

We need to keep our school and the ability to decide its future and the future of Alanreed Community.

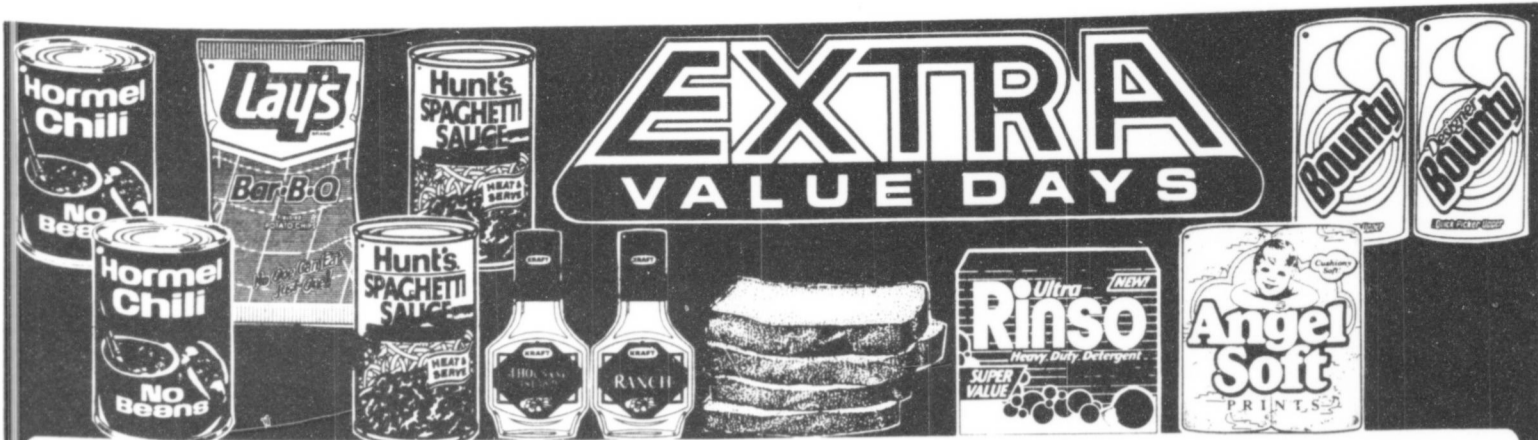
