McLean To Be First In Area To Have Ten Commandment Monument

"McLean wants to tell the world what we believe in," stated Reverend Archie Cooper at the Ten Commandment Monument meeting at the city park Monday evening.

The community meeting which was represented by every church in McLean and also many local businesses was held to get the public consensus on a

mo nument which will bear the Ten Commandments. The gathered crowd voted un nimously to start a fund to lay for the monument. "McLean wants to be the first in the panhandle to har e a monument such as this," stated Cooper.

The monument will be housed on the private property of Maggie Vines on the corner of First and Gray Street, in which she intends to deed to the monument. Mayor Bob Martin has done the necessary work required for easement purposes with regards to the Route 66 and the City of McLean.

During the business part of the meeting, Rev. Cooper was nominated by Pastor Larry Perking to be Chairman of the committee. "Archie is the man with the vision," stated Perking. "And I believe he should be the one to lead it."

Nona Turpin will serve as Secretary/Treasurer. Pastor Jim Reyna will serve as 1st Vice-Chairman and Pastor Thacker Haynes will serve as 2nd Vice-Chairman. These two men will be co-signers on the two signature checks.

A Ten Commandment fund has been set up at the McLean Bank of Commerce. Rev. Cooper gave the first \$100.00 to the account and stated that he was thankful that he had it to give.

Kim Fowler of Clarendon gave estimates and descriptions of different types of monuments that can be made. Cooper will get back with her later on specifics.






his roll as quarter back. We have many options for receivers.



St. Ann's In Panhandle Named A Top Nursing Home

Panhandle—In a national survey of one hundred and fifty-nine nursing homes conducted in 1995 by Parkside Associates of Illinois, a healthcare survey and research company, St. Ann's Nursing Home here was ranked eleventh best in the United States.

A recent survey of Texas non-profit nursing homes rated St. Ann's with three others as best in the state.

The survey checked resident's comfort, general cleanliness, quality of nursing staff and care and food service.

"When I was invited by the board of directors to apply for this position, I jumped, I jumped at the opportunity," she said. "I love this place."

Chisum, who is not a member of the Catholic Church, was appointed administrator at St. Ann's by the board of directors on January 2, 2003.

St. Ann's began in 1962 under the ownership and direct management of the Roman Catholic Diocese of Amarillo. In 1994 it was chartered by the state of Texas as the St. Ann's Nursing Home Corporation, a separate non-profit corporation, with Bishop L.T. Matthiesen, Monsignor M.J. Matthiesen and Ben Smart as

incorporators

Matthiesen then appointed the first board of directors, consisting of the three incorporators.

The bylaws of the corporation stimulate that the bishop of the Diocese of Amarillo is an ex-officio member of the board and has authority over the moral and ethical codes and practices of the home.

Board members elect replacement and additional directors after nominees are approved the bishop to insure their adherence to the home's code of conduct.

Current directors of the home are Monsignor

Joseph E. Bixenman, pastor of Immaculate Conception Church, Perryton, chairman; Leroy T. Matthiesen, bishop emeritus of the diocese; Incarnate Word Sister Annette Marie Peqold, Baptist-St. Anthony's Healthcare System, St. Anthony's Campus; Ms. Carol Hergert, BSA Health Care System, Baptist Campus; and Phillip Whitson, chief finance officer of the diocese.

Deacon Floyd Ashley, Bishop John W. Yanta's administrative assistant, attends board meetings as h is non-voting representative. Fred Griffin, diocesan attorney, serves as the boards legal counsel.

Chisum came to her position as administrator of "St. Ann's with extensive background experience in n u r s i n g h o m e administration.

Her husband, Troy died in 1992. They have two children. A year later she received a call from the Sears Methodist Corporation of Abiliene, which had bought the Good Samaritan Home operated by the Lutheran Church in the former Northwest Texas Hospital.

Three years later, the corporation announced its

plan to build the huge Craig Methodist Retirement Community, an all-purpose facility along Amarillo Blvd. and Ninth Street.

Chisum, was offered a non-administrative position, declined and retired.

"My heart is in administering nursing homes," she says. "It was a good home."

The home was once staffed by the School Sisters of St. Francis, whose regional motherhouse is on campus. Asking only for minimal financial support, the Sisters contributed much of their services. Like other religious communities, however, Amarillo is an ex-officio member of the board and has authority over the moral and ethical codes and practices of the home.

Like other religious communities, however their membership has diminished.

Added to the problem of increased staffing costs is a significant reduction in state Medicaid funding legislated by the Texas Congress this year in an effort to balance the state budget. All fifty-six beds in St. Ann's are certified Medicaid beds.

Along with other nursing homes that offer them, it welcomes private residents, as well as Medicaid residents who must submit proof of need for nursing care and ability to pay the full cost.
