## City Amends Ordinance On Livestock

The Groom City Council met in regular session on April 11, 1995. Alderman R.E. Cornett was absent. Also attending the meeting were visitors Jay Lamb, Phillis Jackson, Mark Britten, and Janelle Sustaire. A discussion was held with Phillis Jackson concerning separate water meters for sprinkler systems. The council unanimously passed a policy that states that the homeowner must pay all expenses for the meter and the hook up to the city main.
Ms. Jackson stated, "This attitude is why Groom is pot growing.", when council members took no action on her request that the city bear the expense for an additional meter and main tap.
Alderman Martin Britten moved to start condemnation proceedings on the building located at Block 1 lots 20 \& 21, owned by Curtis Whatley. The vote was unanimous.
The City studied quote: from various contractors for the $40 \times 80$ pavilion to be built in the park with a matching fund grant received from the Texas Department of Parks anc Wildlife.

The council voted to make Mark Britten the volunteer foreman of the project, working closely with the city engineer. The city of Groom and volunteers will do as much of the concrete work as possible, and award the building contract to Budget Steel.
Janelle Sustaire representing the Zoning Commission reported on their March 2, 1995 meeting.

Recommendations from the meeting are as follows: The City would make no changes in the " D " district zoning laws. "D" district are those on the outside perimeter of the city in perich the sell of alcohol permitted.

C. Wear the cheerleading uniforms that have been approved by the cheerleading sponsor when representing GISD at any athletic contest.
D. Lead cheers at athletic contests.
E. Work cooperatively with each other and the sponsors to provide unity

The cheerleader sponsor will choose a cheerleader captain after elections are made. The choice will be based on the leadership ability, attitude and work ethic of the newly elected cheerleaders.
3) ABSENCES FROM GAMES/CONTEST:
Cheerleaders are to be present at all required games, that is, all Varsity and home Junior Varsity games, unless the sponsor or principal specifically instructs you in not going. If a game is to be missed the sponsor should be the sponsor should be notified personally at least
one day before the game to be missed. Failure to do so will result in a one week's suspension from cheerieading duties; the third failure to do so will result in the cheerleader being removed from cheerleading duties for the cheerieading duties for the remainder of the year.
4) ABSENCES ITARDIES FROM PLANNED PRACTICES OR MEETINGS:
Cheerleaders are to attend all practices and meetings as called by the sponsor or cheerieader captain. If a cheerleader is more than 5 minutes late without excuse by the sponsor, it will be considered an unexcused absence from cheerieader practice. The second and third missed practice without approved excuse will result in the cheerleader being suspended from cheerleader duties from privileges for duties and privileges for one week; the fourth unexcused absence from practice may result in
the cheerleader being
removed from cheerleading duties and privileges for the remainder of the school year. Failure to contact the sponsor is considered an unexcused absence regardless of the reason.
5) Cheerleaders participating in sports will be released from cheerleading duties to participate; they will be required to up hold their responsibility as cheerleaders when it does not interfere with the sport in which they are involved.
6) Cheerleaders are to refrain from smoking, chewing, drinking of intoxicating beverages, drug usage, or being in the possession of tobacco products, alcoholic beverages of any kind or drugs. Cheerleaders are to refrain from any conduct that is unbecoming as a young adult during their term of office (this includes immoral conduct). Failure to follow this rule may result in immediate removal result in ineader dies from cheerieader duties and privileges for the remainder of that term of office.
7) Cheerieaders are to attend school regularly and not cause disruptions at any time; if a cheerleader is truant from school, disrupis class/school, etc., a two week's suspension from cheerleading duties and privileges may be assessed for the first and second violations with permanent removal from cheerleading upon the third violation. 8) Cheerleader eligibility will be determined in accordance with UIL guidelines.
