Homer, Lamb File For Mayor's Seat

Groom voters will have a choice for mayor after two more candidates filed their intentions on Wednesday afternoon.

Greg Lamb, a longtime resident of the Groom area, announced that he would seek the mayorial seat. He has had a wealth of experience as an alderman, serving several terms of office in two different stints in that position.

His wife, Janetta is well known as the former head of the English Department of Groom ISD. She now teaches in Pampa. Joe Homer was another last minute candidate who filed for Mayor. A lifetime resident of Groom, Homer has served in many volunteer positions in the community. Homer has two children in school, Stanley and Robert. His wife Barbara works at Ingersol-Rand.

As reported in last weeks issue of The Groom News, Kerry Jenkins has also filed for this seat.

For the two alderman slots, Mary Sue Lyles, Jerry Thornton and Ronny Fields announced their intention to seek office. As to the Board of Trustees for Groom ISD, newcomers Forrest McLaughlin, Gary Davis as well as Tony Treadwell, incumbent, will vie for the two open positions. It appears that Groom

voters will have some crutial decisions to make come May 1st. Early voting will begin April 12th and continue through April 26. You may vote early at the City of Groom office or at Groom ISD business office, respectively.

The May 1 election will be at the school superintendents office.

Groom Tracksters Run Away With 1st

Groom tracksters did a great job despite the cold and wind last week at Groom's Tiger Relays. Two divisions ran in the meet: Eleven-man consisting of Sanford-Fritch, Panhandle, White Deer, Wheeler, Highland Park, Booker and Claude; and the six-man division consisting of Groom, Valley, McLean, Panhandle JV, Miami, Follett, Silverton, Lefors, Channing, Adrian and These also Higgins. included Junior High in the competition.

Groom High School teams both placed first. The boys won with 160.5 points, sailing past their next closest opponent Valley with 139. McLean placed third with 67 points.

Groom boys actually won only two events outright. Bryan Crowell won the 800 meter race with a time of 2:14.44 (Incendentlly Groom swept that event with Bart Britten and Seth Ritter placing 2nd and 3rd.) Corkey Hickey won the 200 meter race with a time of 24.19.

Many seconds and thirds put Groom in first place, consistently getting points in most all the events.

The high school girls walked away with their win with a total of 157 points. The second place team was Miami with 99, Follett was third with 88.

The girls had a little more success coming in first place in several events. Sandie Conrad tied for first place in the high jump with a Follett girl named Wingfield. Melanie Friemel placed first in the 3200 race. Rebecca Conrad placed first in the 800 meter race, and Groom's 800 meter relay team also won their division. Marie Conrad placed first in the 400 meter race.

The junior high teams did nearly as well, placing second in the meet. The boys had a final total of 124 points. Valley led the way with 156. The big winners were Justin Ritter in the 1200 meter run, Michael Lewis in the shot put, Jason Prather in the discus, and both relay teams; the 400 and 1600.

The girls also placed second with a team score of 73 points. Stephanie Ollinger won the 200 meter dash. She was the only junior high member to win first place in the girls division. Several second's kept Groom junior high girls in contention.



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Congressional Pay Up 6 Times Inflation Rate

Capitol Gains

-The Wall Street Journal Congress's pay has gone up again - without even a vote. That's because our lawmakers, who received a 39-percent pay hike from 1989 to 1991, have their own "entitlement program," which pays automatic costof-living increases every year. Except for six in leadership positions who get more, members of Congress now make \$133,644, up \$4144 from last year.

But there's paycheck gold in Capitol Hill for many Today, others, too. according to the Cato Institute, more than 1000 Congressional aides pull down over \$80,000 a year.

Those staffers also share some wonderful perks. They often take "factfinding" junkets to resorts where they are entertained by lobbyists. Members and staffers who began service after 1983 are generally eligible for a federal pension at age 50, with only 20 years of employment.

It's no wonder the budget of Congress and its support agencies now tops \$2.7 billion a year, or more than \$5 million per member. Since 1960, this budget has soared at six times the rate of inflation.

signed into law an Anti-Stalking bill which makes it a criminal offense for perpetrators to "stalk" their victims in Texas. Until now. there was little law officers could do to stop stalkers unless they actually committed a crime of violence.

Class A Misdemeanor (up to one year in jail and a \$3,000 fine) for the first offense. Repeat offenders can be charged with a Third Degree Felony (punishable by up to ten years in prison and a \$10,000 fine) upon conviction.

Under this law, victims must notify law enforcement authorities of threats made by the subjects so that the matter can be investigated and the suspect arrested. This law also allows the court to bar the stalker from any contact with the victim as a requirement for bond. These restrictions can also be made as a condition of probation or

parole.





The debate has begun on a proposed energy tax based on the Btu content of fuels. While details of how such a tax would be implemented are still a bit murky, the general tax structure as it applies to specific fuels reveals that the levy will be more than twice as tough on oil as it is on natural gas and coal.

The rates disturbed many natural gas producers, who hoped the tax structure would help their product displace coal as a source for electrical power generation. Many producers who had come to expect favorable tax treatment from the Clinton Administration were surprised at a proposal which applies the same rate of Btu tax to coal as it does to natural gas.

Clinton's President proposal calls for a tax of 59.9 cents for each million Btu's of oil, or about \$3.50 per barrel, and about 25.7 cents for each million Btu's of natural gas, coal or nuclear power. The tax would be phased in over three years.

The expected impact for natural gas (averaging 1030 Btu per Cf) in the first year of taxation would be 8.75

cents per Mcf, according to government estimates. In the second year, the effect would increase to 17.5 cents per Mcf; by the third year it would rise to 26.5 cents per Mcf.



Ida Mae Stockton Henderson


Mrs. Ida Mae Stockton Henderson, 70, formerly of McLean died Tuesday, March 16, 1993, Copperas Cove, Texas.




