Homer, Lamb File For Mayor's Seat

Groom voters will have a choice for mayor after two more candidates filed their intentions on Wednesday afternoon.

Greg Lamb, a longtime resident of the Groom area, announced that he would seek the mayoral seat. He has had a wealth of experience as an alderman, serving several terms of office in two different stints in that position.

His wife, Janetta is well known as the former head of the English Department of Groom ISD. She now teaches in Pampa.

Joe Homer was another last minute candidate who filed for Mayor. A lifetime resident of Groom, Homer has served in many volunteer positions in the community. Homer has two children in school, Stanley and Robert. His wife Barbara works at Ingersol-Rand.

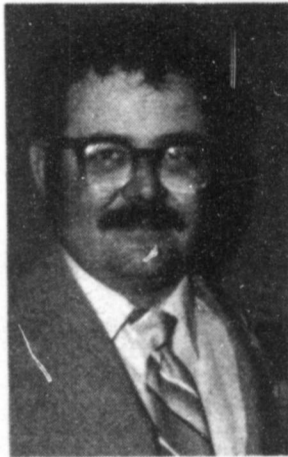
As reported in last weeks issue of The Groom News, Kerry Jenkins has also filed for this seat.

For the two alderman slots, Mary Sue Lyles, Jerry Thornton and Ronny Fields announced their intention to seek office.

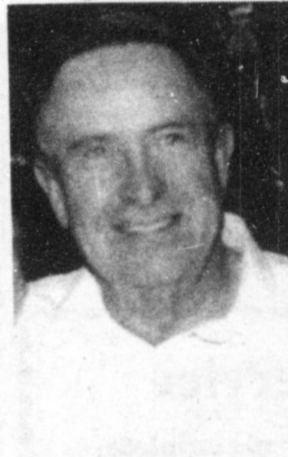

It appears that Groom voters will have some crucial decisions to make come May 1st. Early voting will begin April 12th and continue through April 26. You may vote early at the City of Groom office or at Groom ISD business office, respectively.

The May 1 election will be at the school superintendents office.

Groom Tracksters Run Away With 1st

Groom tracksters did a great job despite the cold and wind last week at Groom's Tiger Relays. Two divisions ran in the meet: Eleven-man consisting of Sanford-Fritch, Panhandle, White Deer, Wheeler, Highland Park, Booker and Claude; and the six-man division consisting of Groom, Valley, McLean, Panhandle JV, Miami, Follett, Silverton, Lefors, Channing, Adrian and Higgins. These also included Junior High in the competition.

Groom High School teams both placed first. The boys won with 160.5 points, sailing past their next closest opponent Valley with

139. McLean placed third with 67 points.

Groom boys actually won only two events outright. Bryan Crowell won the 800 meter race with a time of 2:14.44 (Incidentally Groom swept that event with Bart Britten and Seth Ritter placing 2nd and 3rd.) Corkey Hickey won the 200 meter race with a time of 24.19.

Many seconds and thirds put Groom in first place, consistently getting points in most all the events.

The high school girls walked away with their win with a total of 157 points. The second place team was Miami with 99, Follett was third with 88.

The girls had a little more success coming in first place in several events. Sandie Conrad tied for first place in the high jump with a Follett girl named Wingfield. Melanie Friemel placed first in the 3200 race. Rebecca Conrad placed first in the 800 meter race, and Groom's 800 meter relay team also won their division. Marie Conrad placed first in the 400 meter race.

The junior high teams did nearly as well, placing second in the meet. The boys had a final total of 124 points. Valley led the way with 156. The big winners were Justin Ritter in the 1200 meter run, Michael Lewis in the shot put, Jason

Prather in the discus, and both relay teams; the 400 and 1600.

The girls also placed second with a team score of 73 points. Stephanie Ollinger won the 200 meter dash. She was the only junior high member to win first place in the girls division. Several second's kept Groom junior high girls in contention.

Proposed BTU Tax Hits Oil Hardest

The debate has begun on a proposed energy tax based on the Btu content of fuels. While details of how such a tax would be implemented are still a bit murky, the general tax structure as it applies to specific fuels reveals that the levy will be more than twice as tough on oil as it is on natural gas and coal.

of Btu tax to coal as it does to natural gas.

President Clinton's proposal calls for a tax of 59.9 cents for each million Btu's of oil, or about \$3.50 per barrel, and about 25.7 cents for each million Btu's of natural gas, coal or nuclear power. The tax would be phased in over three years.

The rates disturbed many natural gas producers, who hoped the tax structure would help their product displace coal as a source for electrical power generation. Many producers who had come to expect favorable tax treatment from the Clinton Administration were surprised at a proposal which applies the same rate

The expected impact for natural gas (averaging 1030 Btu per Cf) in the first year of taxation would be 8.75

cents per Mcf, according to government estimates. In the second year, the effect would increase to 17.5 cents per Mcf; by the third year it would rise to 26.5 cents per Mcf.

everyone enjoyed a delicious meal catered by the Cattle Call.

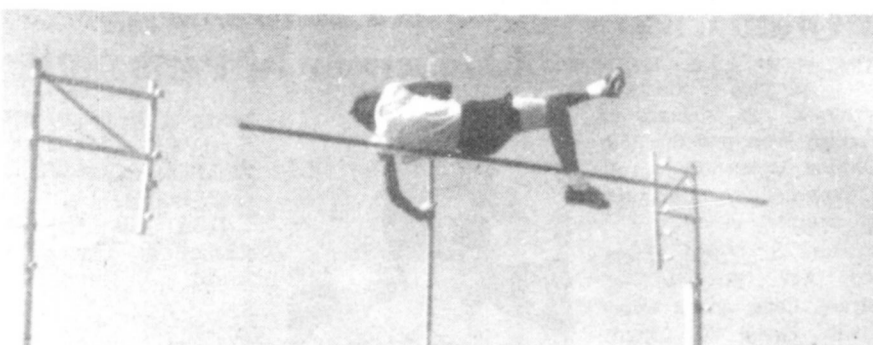

Obituaries

Cecil H. Rhoades

Cecil H. Rhoades, 73, of Amarillo, died Monday, March 15, 1993.

Services were at 10 a.m. Thursday in Memorial Park Funeral Home Chapel of Memories, with Dean Robertson, minister of Olsen Park Church of Christ, officiating. Burial was in Memorial Park Cemetery.

Mr. Rhoades was born in Jerico and moved to Amarillo in 1949 from Groom. He married Wilena Byrd Muncy in 1959 at Amarillo. He was a member of the Church of Christ. He served in the Army from 1940 to 1947, in H. Company, 142 Infantry, 36th Division. In World War II he was awarded the Purple Heart for injuries sustained in France. He was commander of Veteran's of Foreign War Post 1475 from 1959 to 1961. He was the District 9 commander in 1965 and 1966 and was the state VFW surgeon in 1978 and 1980. He was a member of

the Disabled American Veterans, the Veterans of Foreign Wars and the 36th Division Association.

Survivors include his wife; two brothers, Floyd Rhoades of Grand Prairie and J.W. Rhoades of Hemet, Calif.; and a sister, Bessie Posey of Cherry Valley, Calif.

DIASTER RELIEF GRANT AWARDED TO CARSON COUNTY

The Texas Department of Housing and Community Affairs (TDHCA) has awarded a \$350,000 diaster relief grant to Carson County. The grant is awarded through the Texas Community Development Program.

The county will use the grant to help dispose of debris left from tornados, which struck the area on June 27, 1992. The total storm damages were in excess of 41 million. On July 4, President Bush declared the county a disaster area at the request of Gov. Richards.

Services Held For Lamberson In Panhandle



Stocky Lamberson, one of Groom's more famous native sons, died last week at the age of 50.

Behind him he leaves a legacy of success in the lives he touched as hundreds of former students, friends, and coaching rivals came to pay their last respects to him in services at the Panhandle High School Auditorium.

He began his career as an assistant coach at Gruver and Levelland before

becoming the head coach at Gruver, Memphis, Panhandle, Randall and finally Borger.

Todd, his son, now coaches at Claude High School. "All give some," he said during the services Saturday, "Some give all."

Born in Sunray, Lamberson married Aimee Babcock of Groom in 1950. He was a member of the Texas High School Coaches Association and St. Andrew's United Methodist Church in Borger.

Survivors include his wife, Aimee; a son, Todd of Claude; two daughters Melanie of the home and Renae Freeman of Panhandle; his parents, Earnest and Shirley Lamberson of Lelia Lake; a brother Larry Lamberson of Amarillo and three grandchildren.

A memorial fund has been established at the First National Bank of Panhandle.

Gerald O. York, Sr., 76, died Sunday, March 21, 1993.

Services were at 2 p.m. Wednesday, March 24, 1993 in Brown's Chapel of the Fountains with the Rev. Brad Reeves, pastor of Wesley United Methodist Church, officiating. Cremation was by Ed Brown and Sons Funeral Home.

Mr. York, born in Panhandle, lived in Borger 52 years. He married Myrtle May Quante in 1940 at Austin. He was a retired self-employed salesman and a member of Wesley United Methodist Church.

Survivors include his wife; three sons, Gerald O. York, Jr. of Pampa, and William O. York, Sr. and Richard O. 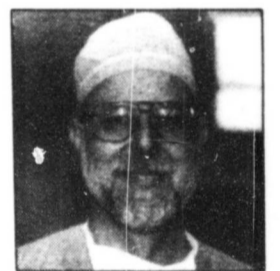

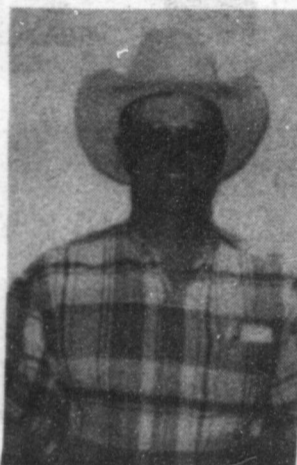


