Capitol Gains
-The Wall Street Journal Cougress's pay has gone up again - without even a vote. That's because our lawmakers, who received a 39 -percent pay hike from 1989 to 1991, have their own "entitlement program," which pays automatic cost-of-living increases every year. Except for six in leadership positions who get more, members of Congress now make $\$ 133,644$, up $\$ 4144$ from last year.
But there's paycheck gold in Capitol Hill for many others, too. Today, according to the Cato Institute, more than 1000 Congressional aides pull down over $\$ 80,090$ a year.
Those staffers also share some wonderful perks They often take "fact finding" junkets to resorts where they are entertained by lobbyists. Members and staffers who began service after 1983 are generally eligible for a federal pension at age 50 , with only 20 years of employment.
It's no wonder the budget of Congress and its support agencies now tops $\$ 2.7$ billion a year, or more than $\$ 5$ million per member Since 1960, this budget has soared at six times the rate of inflation.

## Carson County Sheriff's Report

By Loren Brani, Sheriff The Carson Count Sheriff's Department has taken persons into custody this past week for the following offenses: 5 Unauthorized Use of Motor Vehicle 1-DWI a Motor Vehicle, 1-DWI (2nd Offense_, 1-DWI (1s Offense), 1-Possession of Marijuana, 1-Driving While License Suspended, 2 Violation of Family Violence Act, and 1 Indecency with a Child.

A Gatesville man was taken into custody in White Deer after alert residents called the Sheriff's Department to report a suspicious person trying to get money and hand-outs from White Deer residents. Further investigation showed that the man had outstanding felony warrants from Gatesville and Clay County, Texas and that he had previously been arrested for injuring an Oklahoma law officer. This subject had an extensive criminal history and he was apparently planning to remove as much money and property as possible from White Deer before moving on. His plan was thwarted by the information received from White Deer citizens.

Increased investigation of persons wanted on outstanding warrants has resulted in the arrests of persons in Amarillo, Lincoln County, New Mexico and Bartlesville, Oklanoma charges of DWI (3rd elony charges of DWI (3rd Offense), Possession of Prohibited Weapons and Arson. These subjects will be transported back to Carson County to await tria on the charges.
Our department is investigating the death of a Skellytown man which was reported the evening of March 15. The man wa found in his home by his family and initia investigation has indicated
that the subject died from a self-inflicted gunshot wound. An autopsy has been conducted and we ar continuing our investigation pending the receipt of official laboratory test information.

Governor Ann Richards signed into law an AntiStalking bill which makes it a criminal offense for perpetrators to "stalk" their victims in Texas. Until now there was little law officers could do to stop stalkers unless they actually committed a crime of violence.

The new law makes it a Class A Misdemeanor (up to one year in jail and a $\$ 3,000$ fine) for the first offense. Repeat offender can be charged with a Third Degree Felony (punishable by up to ten years in prison and a $\$ 10,000$ fine) upon conviction.

Under this law, victims must notify law enforcemen authorities of threats made by the subjects so that the matter can be investigated and the suspect arrested. This law also allows the court to bar the stalker frum any contact with from any contact with the victim as a requirement for bond. These restrictions
can also be made as a condition of probation or parole.

## Proposed BTU Tax Hits Oil Hardest

The debate has begun on a proposed energy tax based on the Btu content of fuels. While details of how such a tax would be implemented are still a bit murky, the general tax structure as it applies to specific fuels applies that the levy will be more than twice as tough on oil as it is on natural gas and coal.

The rates disturbed many natural gas producers, who hoped the tax structure would help their product displace coal as a source for electrical power generation. electrical power generation. Many producers who had come to expect favorable tax treatment from the Clinton Administration were surprised at a proposal which applies the same rate
of Btu tax to coal as it does to natural gas.

President Clinton's proposal calls for a tax of 59.9 cents for each million Btu's of oil, or about $\$ 3.50$ per barrel, and about 25.7 cents for each million Btu's of natural gas, coal or nuclear power. The tax would be phased in over three years.
The expected impact for natural gas (averaging 1030 Btu per Cf ) in the first year of taxation would be 8.75
cents per Mcf, according to government estimates. In the second year, the effect would increase to 17.5 cents per Mcf; by the third year it would rise to 26.5 cents per Mcf.
