BRIDGE OVER THE BRAZOS ...

In 1866 the growing settlement of Waco, on the banks of the Brazos River, needed a bridge to span the river. The Waco Bridge Company hired John A. Roebling, builder of the Brooklyn Bridge, to build a 475-foot suspension bridge. The bridge opened on January 6, 1870. Tolls for use were: horse and rider, ten cents; wagons, ten cents a wheel and five cents per animal; loose livestock and pedestrians, five cents a head.

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

ARB To Hear Protest July 2

Property owners in the Carson County Appraisal District will have an opportunity to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 2, 1991 from 9:00 AM to 11:30 AM.

After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will use

these appraisals to assess property taxes for 1991.

The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and who are appointed by the district's directors. Their responsibilities are outlined by the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productivity appraisal be properly granted.

Property owners may appear before the ARB to protest any of these specific actions of the appraisal

* the appraised or agricultural value of their

* unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district;

* inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;

* denial of a partial exemption, such as a home

stead exemption; * denial of agricultural-use, open-space, or timber

productivity appraisal;

* determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change-of-use and is subject to a rollback

* identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;

* determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property; any other action of the appraisal office that

adversely affects the property owner.

Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser for the district, outlined the steps by which a property owner files a

protest. First, the property owner must file a written Notice of Protest with the ARB. This must be filed by June 17 or within 30 days after the taxpayer is mailed a notice of appraised value by the chief appraiser, whichever is later.

However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, or if the chief appraiser issues a prior-year omitted property notice, the property owner has only 10 days from the mailing date to file a protest.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable," Lavake said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property that is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfies is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfaction with some decision or action of the appraisal

Each protesting property owner may offer evidence or argument, either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxingunit spending and will not hear protests on these

The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date, and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled hearing date. Lavake said that protest hearings will be held for one day and that the ARB expects to approve the final appraisal roll on approximately July 20. State law requires the ARB to review and approve the appraisal records by July 20, or when not more than 5 percent of the total property value in the district remains under protest.

The State Property Tax Board has issued a pamphlet, "Taxpayers' Rights, Remedies, Responsibilities,"

which explains how to prepare and present an appeal to the ARB. The pamphlet is available at the Carson County Appraisal District office at 102 Main, Panhandle, (806/537-3569).




Public Notice

Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase the rates for Directory Assistance calls from \$.30 to \$.40 per call after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or physical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging \$.25 per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.4 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay telephone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.

Persons who wish to intervene or otherwise participate in these proceedings should notify the Commission as soon as possible. 

McLean, Lefors, Alanreed **Consider Consolidation**

The new school finance laws are already taking their toll on local school districts. McLean, Lefors and Alanreed are working together to beat the September 1st deadline for freedom to choose what schools they will join with. After that date the decision will be up to the state commissioner of education.

Lefors was first to start action voting to circulate a petition calling for an election on the consolidation

In order to place this issue on the ballots for August, the schools must get 10 per cent of the registered voters in their respective districts to sign a

School Board members feel that when House Bill 351 goes into effect it will be a death knell for Lefors and Alanreed, with the possibility of McLean facing problems later on down the Figures from the Texas Education Agency show that the Lefors District will lose about \$166,145. and Alanreed will lose \$98,661. next year. McLean, on the other hand, will gain \$108,095.

State Representative Warren Chisum of Pampa, was on hand at Alanreed to discuss options with the

"Nothing we did (the legislature) mandates consolidation".

But small districts which are "small by choice" will most likely have consolidation on their horizon. Schools that are located at least 30 miles from another school district and have at least 90 students are defined a "small by necessity".

Chisum pointed out some of the advantages of consolidation such as gaining new facilities, offered wider more diversified curriculum, cheaper maintenance and administrative costs.

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



Most of the Company's residence customers in Texas who subscribe to one or more of the Custom Calling Service features will be affected by the proposed rate restructuring. It is expected that the proposed rate restructuring of Custom Calling Services will increase the Company's annual revenues by \$15.9 million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month period ending December 1990. The restructuring will result in an increase in the Custom Calling Services rates for approximately 2.5 million residence customers and rate decreases for approximately 15,000 residence customers. Also, the obsolesence of the optional feature Speed Calling 30 will affect approximately 156,000 residence customers.


