## ARB To Hear Protest July 2

Property owners in the Carson County Appraisal District will have an opportunity to protest proposed appraisals of their property for local taxes. The district's appraisal review board (ARB) will begin hearing taxpayer protests on July 2, 1991 from 9:00 AM to 11:30 AM.
After the ARB concludes its hearings and approves final property appraisals, local governments will us these appraisals to assess property taxes for 1991.
The ARB is a group of citizens who live in the appraisal district and who are appointed by the dis the Texas Constitution, which requires that property be appraised equally and uniformly and that exemptions and productivity appraisal be properly granted.

Property owners may appear before the ARB to protest any of these specific actions of the appraisal office:
*the appraised or agricultural value of their property;

* unequal appraisal of the taxpayer's property compared to other property in the district;
* inclusion of the property on the appraisal records;
* denial of a partial exemption, such as a home stead exemption;
* denial of agricultural-use, open-space, or timber productivity appraisal;
* determination that agricultural or timber land has had a change-of-use and is subject to a rollback $\stackrel{\text { tax; }}{\text { - }}$
* identification of the taxing unit or units in which the property is located;
* determination that the taxpayer is the owner of the property;
any other action of the appraisal office that adversely affects the property owner.
Dianne Lavake, chief appraiser for the distric
protest. First, the property owner must file a written Notice of Protest" with the ARB. This must be filed by June 17 or within 30 days after the taxpayer is mailed a notice of appraised value by the chief appraiser, whichever is later.
However, if the ARB sends a property owner a notice of any other kind of change in the appraisal records, or if the chief appraiser issues a prior-yea omitted property notice, the property owner has only 10 days from the mailing date to file a protest.

Official forms for a notice of protest are available at the appraisal district office. "A letter from the taxpayer is also acceptable," Lavake said, "as long as it identifies the property owner and the property that is the subject of the protest and indicates dissatisfac tion with some decision or action of the appraisal office."
Each protesting property owner may offer evidence or argument, either in person or by filing an affidavit with the ARB. Property owners should be aware that the ARB has no authority over tax rates or taxingunit spending and will not hear protests on these matters.
The ARB will schedule hearings as property owners file protests and will inform them of the time, date and place of their individual hearings at least 15 days before the scheduled hearing date. Lavake said that prote expects approximately July 20 . Southwestern Bell Telephone Company (Company), in accordance with the rules of the Public Utility Commission of Texas (Commission), hereby gives notice of its intent to implement a new schedule of telephone rates in Texas for Directory Assistance Services, effective August 1, 1991, unless otherwise determined by the Commission. The Company has filed an application with the Commission to restructure and change the rates for Directory Assistance Service.

To help recover its costs, the Company is proposing to increase he rates for Directory Assistance calls from $\$ .30$ to $\$ .40$ per call (after the three-call allowance). Southwestern Bell is proposing that there be no change in the number of free Directory Assistance calls allowed each month (currently three) and that customers who qualify for exemption of Directory Assistance charges because of visual or ohysical handicaps continue to be exempt from these charges. The company also proposes to begin charging $\$ .25$ per call for Directory Assistance from pay telephones.

If approved by the Commission, this proposed rate change for Directory Assistance will increase the Company's annual revenues y $\$ 15.4$ million, which is an increase of approximately one half of 1 percent in the Company's adjusted revenue for the twelve-month jeriod ending December 1990. This proposed rate change would affect approximately 900,000 residence customers, approximately 155,000 business customers, approximately 500 private pay teleohone owners and all customers who make Directory Assistance calls from public pay telephones.
